





### The Good Earth

by MRS. B. F. COBB

When the ground thaws again tree planting will begin in earnest. We do not have many more weeks of planting time left. Well-rotted compost in the planting hole will help to eradicate nematodes. It will also

gles to become established. Agitating the tree as it is wa-tered will force out air pockets. Once the soil is well settled around plants, all air pockets are sealed out.

Give pot plants a feeding at least once a month. Hyponex is to use and very good. Ferti-loam is good also. I use I teaspoon of it to a 4 or 6 inch pot. Applied once a month, this fertilizer keeps my plants healthy, with dark green luxuriant

At this writing we have nine amaryllis buds from 1 meh high to six inches. It will possibly be a week or more before the blossoms are open.

The collards in our planter box are interesting to watch during this changeable weather. When a hard freeze comes the collards wilt down and look black. Then a thaw comes and the greens spring back up. their color as dark green as before they froze.

There is a new chemical on the market that will be a boon to the busy gardener. A liquid spray that will keep grass from growing. The grass is mowed a week after using the chemical, then it doesn't have to be mowed again for weeks.

It would be expensive to use on a complete lawn, but would be great to use near sidewalks. around flower beds and shrubs. Just think, no more trimming the edges of the lawn, or around flower beds. Boots of the grass are not injured by the chemical neither will it injure flowers if

some should wash into the bed. a cold frame to plant our seed for early vegetables. One year we dug a pit about 3 feet wide and 4 feet long. Dirt was removed to the depth of about a foot. We then put in about four inches of manure and finished filling the hole with soil. After planting bell pepper and tomato seed we covered the bed with a large window pane. since 1918 when 10 million died throughout the world as a re-sult of having influenza. No country was spared. 450 thousand deaths occurred among 20 million cases of flu in the United States in the 1918-1919 While there is no modern

"cure", there are definite preventive measures to be taken. Persons of all ages are attacked, but the incidence is highest in young adults. Flu inoculations are recommended, with booster shots for "highgroups - people whose

with influenza. This group includes anyone over 45, pregnant women, and persons suffering from chronic heart disease, bronchitis, asthma, diabetes, and nursing-home patients. The initial immunization should consist of two doses about two

months apart. Influenza symptoms are sud-den in onset and include high fever, headache and muscular pains, prostration, congestion and some sneezing.

When influenza is suspected, consultation with your family physician is mandatory, for the above symptoms require medical diagnosis and treatment.

Sore throats constitute another winter health hazard. Again, because a sort throat may be the first indication of a more severe illness, one should seek the advice of his family physician whenever a sore throat is persistent, accompanied by high fever or other complications. But, for prompt temporary relief from the pain and discomfort of throat soreness due to colds or other minor conditions, I recommend Chloraseptic, an anesthetic-antiseptic oral solution. #### Senior Citizens Should Plan **Balanced Meals**

By Barbara Elliott H. D. Agent

Older citizens need to well-balanced meals just as much as do youngsters. But too often they neglect to do it.

A problem that often makes cooking seem dull is using the leftovers that tend to accumulate in cooking for only one or two people. One can cut this problem down to size by using the leftovers imaginatively, instead of just serving them the same way over and over.

Home economists with the U. S. Department of Agriculture and Extension home economists offer these tips:

1. Combine leftovers in a onedish meal. Meat combines beautifully with vegetables, macaroni or rice. Add a cheese or tomato sauce or just plain white sauce and heat in a bak-ing dish. Get extra flavor by adding chopped tomatoes or green onions or chives.

2. Top a tossed salad with cut strips of leftovers cooked meat or poultry.

3. Mix leftover cooked vegetables with raw fresh ones, such as chopped celery, cucumber slices, tomatoes, green pepper, and shredded cabbage.

4. Cream vegetables, meat, fish or chicken. Or serve them with a tasty sauce. Use a can of tomatoes, or mushroom soup for quick and easy sauce. If dish is a bit skimpy, hard-cooked egg may stretch it

to serving size.

Add a bit of relish, snappy cheese or diced cucumber to a cooked dressing for meat or vegetable salad.



### Peace Corps To Test On February 12

ested in putting their skills to use in developing nations around the world are invited to take the Peace Corps placement test at 9 a. m. on Saturday, February 12, at Room 2201, New Post Of fice Building, Abilene.

The Peace Corps uses the placement test to determine how an applicant can best be how an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. (If test scores indicated a limited language-learning ability, for example, the Peace Corps tries to place the applicant in an English-speaking country.) The placement test requires no The placement test requires no preparation and is non-competitive - an applicant can neither pass nor fail.

The application form, not the placement test, is the most important factor in the selection of volunteers. Persons interested in serving in the Peace Corps must fill out an application, if they have not already done so. and present it to the tester be-fore taking the test. Applica-tions may be obtained from lo-cal post offices or from the Peace Corps, Washington, D. C.

The placement test takes about an hour and a half. An optional achievement test for applicants who have studied Spansh or French requires another







# Draft Boards Men In February

State draft boards are sched-uled to induct 1,372 men into the armed forces in February, Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Selection Service director, said

This compares with a quota of 1.475 in January and 1.523 in December. The February quota of 1,372 is the Texas share of a national call for 29,400 men, 26,400 for the Army and 3,000 for the Marine Corps.

Col. Schwartz also amounced that 8.640 men will be forwarded to examining and entrance stations during February to undergo the draft physical and mental examination.

Local board quotas for both induction and examination already have been figured and sent to the state's 137 local boards

The February quota for induction will be filled with single and childless married men, 19 through 25 years old, and volunteers who have not attained the are of 26.

No married man with children or an expected child, will be selected to fill the February

"Draft boards must have the information about children, of course," Col. Schwartz said, "and an unborn child must be certified by a physician. Other-wise, a young husband and father may find himself select-
