This week's review are mystery titles in large print format. What was the trigger that apparently reopened such an old wound and sent someone over the edge? When Eve discovers that other young women, who physically resemble the first victim, have vanished, the clock starts ticking louder. But to solve this case she will need to find her way into a hidden place of dim light and concrete, into the distant past, and into the cold depths of a shattered mind.

NFL 'Sunday Ticket' headed to YouTube beginning next season

Fans will have to Google it beginning next season if they want to access the NFL's "Sunday Ticket" package.

The NFL announced an agreement on Thursday for Google to distribute the package of out-of-market Sunday afternoon games on YouTube TV and YouTube Primetime Channels.

The seven-year deal is worth a little more than \$2 billion per season. The package has been on DirecTV since 1994. The satellite provider has paid \$1.5 billion per year on an eight-year contract that expires at the end of this season.

The NFL had been seeking \$2.5 billion per season for the package. It could still reach that total since the league retains commercial rights to bars and restaurants and is in the midst of selling those

Commissioner Roger Goodell said during an interview with CNBC over the summer that the next move for "Sunday Ticket" would be to a streaming service because that would be the best option for

Goodell reiterated that with Thursday's an

"For a number of years we have been focused on increased digital distribution of our games and this partnership is yet another example of us looking towards the future and building the next generation of NFL fans," he said in a statement.

It is the second time in less than two years that the NFL has partnered with a streaming service to air games. The league's 11-year contract with Amazon Prime Video for Thursday night games started this season.

Besides Amazon, Apple and ESPN also expressed interest in "NFL Sunday Ticket."

"As the ways fans enjoy NFL football evolve in a changing media landscape, partnerships with innovators like YouTube will ensure that more games are available to more fans," said New England Patriots owner Robert Kraft, who is also chairman of the NFL's media committee. "This partnership will grow our game for future generations and allow

them to follow their favorite sport." The NFL has had a presence on YouTube since 2015, when it launched its official NFL channel. That has increased to include channels for all 32 teams and 10 official league channels, including

NFL Films, NFL Network and Mundo NFL. NFL Network and NFL RedZone have been avail-

Her client is a woman next door who thinks someone is following her, Megan, who's purchased the house next to Jane's, needs some help from her snooping neighbor. Megan's been having blackouts, hearing voices, and feeling like someone's following her. Are these symptoms of an illness, or signs that she's in danger? Considering the extensive security system in Megan's house, it seems like she should be safe, yet she soon vanishes into thin air. Some think she's run away, but would this ambitious young lawyer on the partner track really miss a meeting with an important client? And where's Megan's cat? The mystery is about to deepen when the cat is finally located in a hidden panic room, and as Jane and the police look into Megan's

friends, family, and past, it may be time to sound the alarm.

Walk has never left the coastal California town where he grew up in, We Begin at the End (LP M WHI C) by Chris Whitaker. He may have become the chief of police, but he's still trying to heal the old wound of having given the testimony that sent his best friend, Vincent King, to prison decades before. Now, thirty years later, Vincent is being released. Duchess is a thirteen-year-old self-proclaimed outlaw. Her mother, Star, grew up with Walk and Vincent. Walk is in overdrive trying to protect them, but Vincent and Star seem bent on sliding deeper into self-destruction. Star always burned bright, but recently that light has dimmed, leaving Duchess to parent not only her mother but her five-yearold brother. At school the other kids make fun of Duchess, her clothes are torn, her hair a mess. But let them throw their sticks, because she'll throw stones. Rules are for other people. She's just trying to survive and keep her family together. A fortysomething-year-old sheriff and a thirteen-year-old girl may not seem to have a lot in common. But they both have come to expect that people will disappoint you, loved ones will leave you, and if you open your heart, it will be broken. So, when trouble arrives with Vincent King, Walk and Duchess find they will be unable to do anything but usher it in, arms wide closed.

Buddy Smith built his law practice around tracking down missing children in "Trial and Error" (LP M WHI R) by Robert Whitlow. After all, he knows the agony of being separated from a child. Not long after his daughter's birth, her mother ran away and Buddy never saw either one again. Gracie Blaylock has known Buddy her entire life, and now that she is clerk of court for the county, their paths cross frequently. When Gracie hears that a teenager in town, Reagan, has gone missing, she knows Buddy is the one for the case. Reagan's parents are desperate for answers. Together with Gracie and Mayleah--the new detective in town--Buddy chases all leads, hoping to reach Reagan before it's too late. And as he pursues one teen girl, he uncovers clues that could bring him closer to the girl he thought he lost forever: his own daughter.

Boras: Giants wouldn't seal Correa deal, so he called Mets

NEW YORK (AP) — Carlos Correa was in the St. Regis San Francisco with his parents, brother and in-laws, ready to head to Oracle Park for his introductory news conference. That's when agent Scott Boras asked the prized player to meet him in room 1212.

Farhan Zaidi, the Giants' president of baseball operations, had called Boras at 8 a.m. PST Tuesday morning, three hours before the scheduled announcement.

"He reported to me that they needed more time, more evaluation," Boras said Thursday. "They had not made any decisions, but they weren't prepared to go ahead with a news conference because they didn't feel they would be able to collect the information within that short period of time." Boras conveyed the development to Correa.

"He was obviously surprised, as we all were," Boras said.

Instead of finalizing a \$350 million, 13-year agreement with the Giants, Boras struck a \$315 million, 12-year deal with the freespending Mets, and Correa headed to New York for a physical Thursday. Boras said results usually come back within 24-48 hours and timing of an announcement was up to the team. A news conference likely won't be scheduled until next month, after the holiday break.

Correa had taken his physical with the Giants on Monday and the club asked for more time to evaluate the findings. The timeframe for San Francisco's medical process never reached 48

"We've had three teams offer this player contracts in excess of 10 years," Boras said. "Obviously, every one of them had their medicals. There is no current issue with Carlos' health whatso ever. There's been a lot of discussion about backs and ankles. There's nothing about him that is currently any form of medical issue. All the conjecture and evaluation of him has been about physicians using their crystal ball for years to come." Boras spoke after pitcher Carlos Rodón's introductory news

conference with the New York Yankees. The agent said all teams

had been provided results of Correa's end-of-season physical

conducted by Dr. Christopher Camp, the Twins' medical director and director of high performance and an orthopedist at the "They have a full account of the player prior to doing anything that has to do with offers," Boras said. "Got a long letter passing him, and with that came a recommendation for over a 10-year contract. So that was the known of the Minnesota team physi-

cian who was with him all year long.' Boras maintained Correa's 2014 surgery to repair a broken right tibia should not have been an issue. Dr. Kevin Varner, chairman of the Department of Orthopedics at Houston Methodist Hospital, operated on Correa.

"He talked and was available to talk about the stability and functionality of what he felt," Boras said. "The player has never, ever had any form of treatment, anything to do with anything about that since that occurred when he was 19 years old."

San Francisco told Boras on Tuesday it still wanted to sign Correa, a discussion Boras said included chairman Greg Johnson, Zaidi and team counsel. "I said, `How much time do you need?' They set the time, they

told me that they needed - 1 o'clock they would let us know,' Boras said. "Then we received notice from them that they wanted to continue to talk and that they needed more time. But at that point in time, I told them I had to have a decision whether they were going to honor their letter of agreement that we had reached. And they said at that point in time they needed more information, they needed more discussion. They wanted to continue to talk but at this time they couldn't go forward. And then I advised them that I had to pursue alternative measures on behalf of Carlos with other teams."

It's unclear where in the process the Giants were in evaluating Correa's medicals. Zaidi, speaking to The Associated Press by phone Thursday night, declined to comment publicly, citing confidentiality of the player medical process.

Boras said his staff was in place to reopen talks and he limited the number of teams, given each discussion began with a 45-minute accounting of the aborted deal with the Giants — which Boras termed a Magna Carta of explanation.

New York had expressed interest while Boras had been negotiating with the Giants. He contacted Mets owner Steve Cohen, who was in Hawaii.

"Welcome to Correa-mas. This is your lucky day," Boras recalled telling Cohen.

"He was at a dinner, which was 10:30, 11 o'clock," Boras added. "He just mentioned he had a martini, and I said, do you have three olives for a great third baseman? That's kind of how we began our process of working through this, and a lot of back and forth of discussions of many alternatives. Around 12 midnight, we were able to reach an agreement."

Boras then asked Correa to return to room 1212 and told him of the new deal.

"This guy tackled me," Boras said. "He threw me down on the bed. This guy is a little bit bigger than me. He's got a little bit of linebacker in him, because he flopped me pretty good. He was really happy."

Correa, the 2015 AL Rookie of the Year, would move from shortstop to third base with the Mets, who already have Francisco Lindor at short. Correa has a .279 career batting average with 155 homers and 553 RBIs in eight big league seasons, including a .291 average with 22 homers and 64 RBIs this year.

Boras said he then informed the Giants ownership he had struck a deal with the Mets

"I think they have beds in those hotel rooms. I assure you I didn't use one for two days," Boras said.

Trevor Bauer reinstated by MLB's independent arbitrator

NEW YORK (AP) — Trevor Bauer was reinstated Thursday by Major League Baseball's independent arbitrator, allowing the pitcher to resume his career at the start of the 2023 season.

The 31-year-old Los Angeles Dodgers star was given an unprecedented two-season suspension without pay by baseball Commissioner Rob Manfred on April 29 for violating the league's domestic violence and sexual assault policy after a San Diego woman said Bauer beat and sexually abused her last year, an accusation the pitcher denied.

The players' association filed a grievance on behalf of the former Cy Young Award winner, and a three-person panel headed by independent arbitrator Martin Scheinman started hearing the case on May 23.

Scheinman upheld a 194-game suspension rather than Manfred's intended 324game penalty but reinstated Bauer immediately, assigning 50 games to cover part of the lengthy time Bauer was put on administrative leave while MLB investigated during the 2021 season and early this

"Can't wait to see y'all out at a stadium soon!" Bauer wrote on Twitter.

Bauer will lose more than \$37 million in salary for the final 144 games of last season and for the first 50 games of next season, through May 23. The lost salary next year is effectively a clawback from part of his administrative leave, when he continued to receive pay.

MLB said Scheinman affirmed that Bauer violated the domestic violence policy. "While we believe a longer suspension

was warranted, MLB will abide by the neutral arbitrator's decision, which upholds baseball's longest-ever active player suspension for sexual assault or domestic violence," MLB said in a statement. "We understand this process was difficult for the witnesses involved and we thank them for their participation."

While Scheinman issued his award to

the parties, a full written decision is not

"While we are pleased that Mr. Bauer has been reinstated immediately, we disagree that any discipline should have been imposed," Bauer's representatives, Jon Fetterolf, Shawn Holley and Rachel Luba, said in a statement. "That said, Mr. Bauer looks forward to his return to the field, where his goal remains to help his team win a World Series."

The players' association declined com-

ment on Scheinman's decision. Bauer was never charged with a crime. His accuser sought but was denied a restraining order against him, and Los Angeles prosecutors said in February there was insufficient evidence to prove the woman's accusations beyond a reasonable doubt.

Bauer, who hasn't played since the allegations surfaced and MLB began investigating, repeatedly has said that everything that happened between him and the woman was consensual.

An email sent after business hours Thursday seeking comment from the woman's attorney, Bryan Freedman, wasn't immediately returned.

Bauer sued his accuser in federal court, a move that came less than three months after prosecutors decided not to file criminal charges against the pitcher. Bauer named the woman and one of her attorneys, Niranjan Fred Thiagarajah, as defendants in the lawsuit. The Associated Press does not typically identify people who say they have been victims of sexual assault. The lawsuit said that "the damage to Mr.

Bauer has been extreme" after the woman alleged that he had choked her into unconsciousness, punched her repeatedly and had anal sex with her without her consent during two sexual encounters last year.

> wholly consensual." The suspension will cost Bauer \$37,594,233 from his \$102 million, threeyear contract: \$28,131,868 of his \$32 million salary in 2022 and \$9,462,365 of his \$32 million salary in 2023.

> Under Major League Rule 2, Bauer will not count against the Dodgers' player limits for 14 days, giving the team until Jan. 6 to decide whether to cut ties. If the Dodgers jettison Bauer, they would remain responsible for the roughly \$22.6 million he is owed next season and he would be free to sign with any club.

> "We have just been informed of the arbitrator's ruling and will comment as soon as practical," the Dodgers said in a statement.

> The money not paid to Bauer will be reflected on the Dodgers' luxury tax payroll, cutting the amount of tax they must pay this year and are projected to pay in 2023.

After winning his first Cy Young with the Cincinnati Reds in 2020, Bauer agreed to join his hometown Dodgers. He did not pitch after June 29 in 2021 and finished with an 8-2 record and a 2.59 ERA in 17 appearances.

Bauer was placed on administrative leave on July 2, 2021, under the domestic violence policy, a leave extended 13 times.

Among 15 players previously disciplined under the policy, the longest suspension was a full season and postseason for free agent pitcher Sam Dyson in 2021. None of the players previously disciplined under the policy appear to have challenged the penalty before an arbitrator. Bauer's suspension was the longest of

any MLB player since pitcher Jenrry Mejia was given a lifetime ban in 2016 for a third violation of the drug agreement. Mejia was reinstated for 2019 and returned in the minor leagues.



1 teaspoon soy sauce

4 cups cooked cut green beans

11/3 cups French's® Fried Onions (divided)

Heat the oven to 350 F. Stir the soup, milk, soy sauce, beans and 2/3 cup onions in a 11/2-quart casserole. Season the mixture with salt and pepper.

Bake for 25 minutes or until hot. Stir the bean mixture. Sprinkle with the remaining 2/3 cup onions.

3 to 4 hours, until tender. Then add the remaining onions and transfer the casserole to the oven to crisp up for 5 minutes. (Check that the slow cooker crock is

oven-safe; otherwise, spoon the mixture into an oven-safe dish for the final baking

and serving.)

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


