## Schoolboard Meeting

The Stratford Independent Schoolboard met in regular session at 7:00 p.m. Thursday, January 7, 1988. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved and the board approved the payment of January bills.

The board reviewed the transportation for the 1988-89 school year and decided to order a 36 passenger bus. This bus will be delivered in August or September. President of the Board, Jerry Dyess, appointed a committee to look into the purchasing of another bus to replace one of the activity buses that needs to be replaced. Jerry Johnson, Frank Vaughn, Sam Brite, and Superintendent Bass were appointed to the committee.

The board reviewed and approved the annual report for the 1986-87 school year. This is a detailed report of instruction and achievement for the past year. Copies of this report are sent to the Texas Education Agency in Austin, placed in each school's library, and are available in each administrative office at the school.

Superintendent Bass gave reports on tax collection of 84.67% collected as of January 1, 1988, reviewed the maintenance work done during the Christmas holidays, and gave an in depth report of the school budget.

The board did the annual evaluation of Superintendent Bass and extended his contract one more year.

Foregoing minutes read and approved.

Motion by Commissioner Dale Hamilton and seconded by Darrell Cotney to amend the agenda to include Items 15 and 16 to wit: 15. Jim Allison, County Agent to meet with the court to discuss sand for the stock show, a barn heater for the show barn and overhead door repairs.

16. Consider the request of the District Attorney for the purchase of new dictating equipment at a cost of \$185.50 for Sherman County. All ayes. Motion carried.

This being the date to receive and consider bids for the 69th Judicial District Public Defender. The follow-

ing bids were received and tabulated.

Motion made by Commissioner Darrell Cotney seconded by Commissioner Boyd Spurlock that the bid of David M. Green in the amount of a total of \$63,000.00 for an annual fee for the 69th District Public Defender office be accepted on behalf of Sherman County. The Judge be authorized to enter into contract on behalf of Sherman County for 1 year, and Sherman County cost not to exceed 11% of the total amount per year. All ayes. Motion carried.

Sheriff Tom Wade met with Court to request permission to advertise for bids on a mobile radio unit. Request of GTE to install a buried cable on Sherman County R. O. W. along the side of Section #238 and 241, Block 1T in Precinct 3. Motion by Commissioner Dale Hamilton seconded by Commissioner Darrell Cotney that GTE be granted permission to install the proposed buried cable on R.O.W. all ayes. Motion carried.

Motion by Commissioner Wayne Cummings seconded by Commissioner Dale Hamilton that a height restriction zoning ordinance

for Texhoma Municipal Airport be approved by the Sherman County Commissioners Court. All ayes. Motion carried.

Mr. Henry Davis with Doshier, Pickens, and Francis met with court discussing and reviewing the 1987 Sherman County Audit. A good report was given.

Marilyn Albert, Chief Tax appraiser for the Sherman County Appraisal District met with the Court at the Court's request to explain the tax cost for collections. The report given was self-explanatory.

Motion by Commissioner Wayne Cummings seconded by Commissioner Darrell Cotney that Doris Parsons be appointed to the Sherman County Child Welfare Board for three years-January 1988 to January 1991. All ayes. Motion carried.

Jim Allison county agent met with the Court to discuss sand for the show barn also a barn hot water heater for the show barn, and overhead door repairs. Motion by Commissioner Boyd Spurlock seconded by Commissioner Darrell Cotney that the proposal of Mungia's Heating and Air conditioning for two tankless gas water heaters in the total amount of \$1,039.49 be accepted. The proposal submitted included that Mungia's furnished 1/2 cost of the second unit as a donation to the livestock show. All ayes. Motion carried.

Motion by Commissioner Darrell Cotney seconded by Commissioner Dale Hamilton that the District Attorney Barry Blackwell be given the authority to purchase new dictating equipment for the office of District Attorney 69th Judicial District at a cost of \$185.50 total cost to Sherman County. All ayes. Motion carried.

## Tax Assessor Collector Seminar

Sherman County Tax Assessor-Collector Zelda Pickens joined some 150 other tax officials at the College Station Hilton for the fifth annual County Tax Assessor-Collectors' Seminar, January 10-12. The educational program is sponsored by the V.G. Young Institute of County Government of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. County Tax Assessor-Collectors are required by law to achieve certification by successfully completing continuing education courses.

Tax Assessor Collectors can prepare themselves to meet future challenges by participating in professional seminars such as the one at Texas A & M University. "One way to insure smooth operation of the Tax Office is to stay proficient in your field and this requires training on a continual basis," said Zelda Pickens. Just keeping up with the

changes in the law can be a monumental task. Over 1700 bills were introduced during the 70th Legislature that directly related to county government. Of these that were enacted into law, approximately 45 affected the County Tax Assessor-Collector.

The three day program at College Station included training on topics such as "Voter Registration"; "Office Security"; "Tinting and Registration of Motor Vehicles"; "Office Management"; and "Public Relations". Most of the training during the seminar was provided by various state agencies that work closely with Tax Assessor-Collector's office on a daily basis such as the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation-Motor Vehicle Division, the Secretary of State's Election Division, Texas Parks and Wildlife, and the Attorney General's Office.

## Strain & Sons Low Bidder

A Tye contractor, J.H. Strain & Sons, Inc., is the apparent low bidder to seal coat 320.74 miles of northern Texas Panhandle highways next summer.

Strain & Sons' \$2,060,907.13 bid was the lowest of seven recently submitted on the entire project to the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission in Austin.

The contract calls for seal coating FM 2014, from U.S.

54 south and west 6.5 miles; also, FM 2232, from State 15 south 4 miles.

The contract is expected to be awarded by the highway commission when it meets again later this month.

Seal coat work on Texas Panhandle highways is planned to be started and completed during the summer. A seal coat—a placement of asphalt and

The Capitol Committee and the State Preservation Board are pleased to announce that Sherman County will be represented among those etched on the Great Walk leading to the Texas State Capitol in Austin and want to thank the Sherman County Commissioners Court for this accomplishment.

The Texas Association of Counties is sponsoring a project to have all 254 Texas counties' names included in a special section of the walk.

Over the past several years, plans have been underway for the restoration of the state Capitol, which will celebrate its 100th anniversary on May 16, 1988. To complete the first phase of the restoration, the Capitol committee has enlisted the support of all Texans to share in this historic restoration by means of "A Walk in History" project.

Years of continued use and weather have deteriorated the Capitol's walkways. These approaches to the Capitol will be restored using 28 inch concrete diamond-shaped pavers upon which will be etched the name of each contributor. Completion of the "Walk in History" is scheduled prior to the May 16, 1988 centennial celebration of the Capitol's completion and dedication.

The Dean's list each semester contains the names of students who have carried twelve hours or more, have at least a 3.3 grade point average on a 4.0 scale and have no F's or I's.

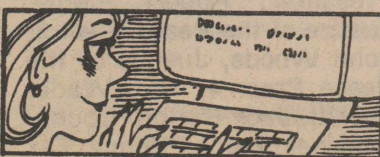

## Letter To Editor

Dear Editor,

Last May, the U.S. House of Representatives passed the "School Improvement Act of 1987", which is also known as H.R.5. The bill is now before the Senate as S.373 and needs to be defeated. The Act alone is almost 500 pages long, and it involves 1.2 billion tax dollars in 1988 alone.

The problem is that these and all other Federal intrusions into education are simply unconstitutional, and therefore, illegal.

Our Constitution makes no mention of education whatsoever. The tenth amendment proscribes that "the powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution...are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people." What this means is that the federal government can legally do what the Constitution specifically says it can do, and no more. All other powers belong to individuals, or to state governments that the individuals may empower. This provision is easy to understand, for the Found-

ing Fathers knew from personal experience that great distance between the government and citizens results in less liberty and security for the people.

Even though Texas taxpayers pay plenty to support the Federal Department of Education, we have very little say in how it operates. If the same money that we now pay to the Federal bureaucracy were instead kept closer to home, the individual citizens would have a much stronger voice in how their money is being spent.

Instead, the Department of Education is at the mercy of extremely powerful and influential pressure groups, most notably the National Education Association.

Nationalized education has never been a good idea, and the tree has produced bitter fruit. Perhaps it's time to pull up our federal education bureaucracy by the roots and defeat H.R.5 and S.373!

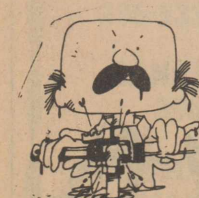

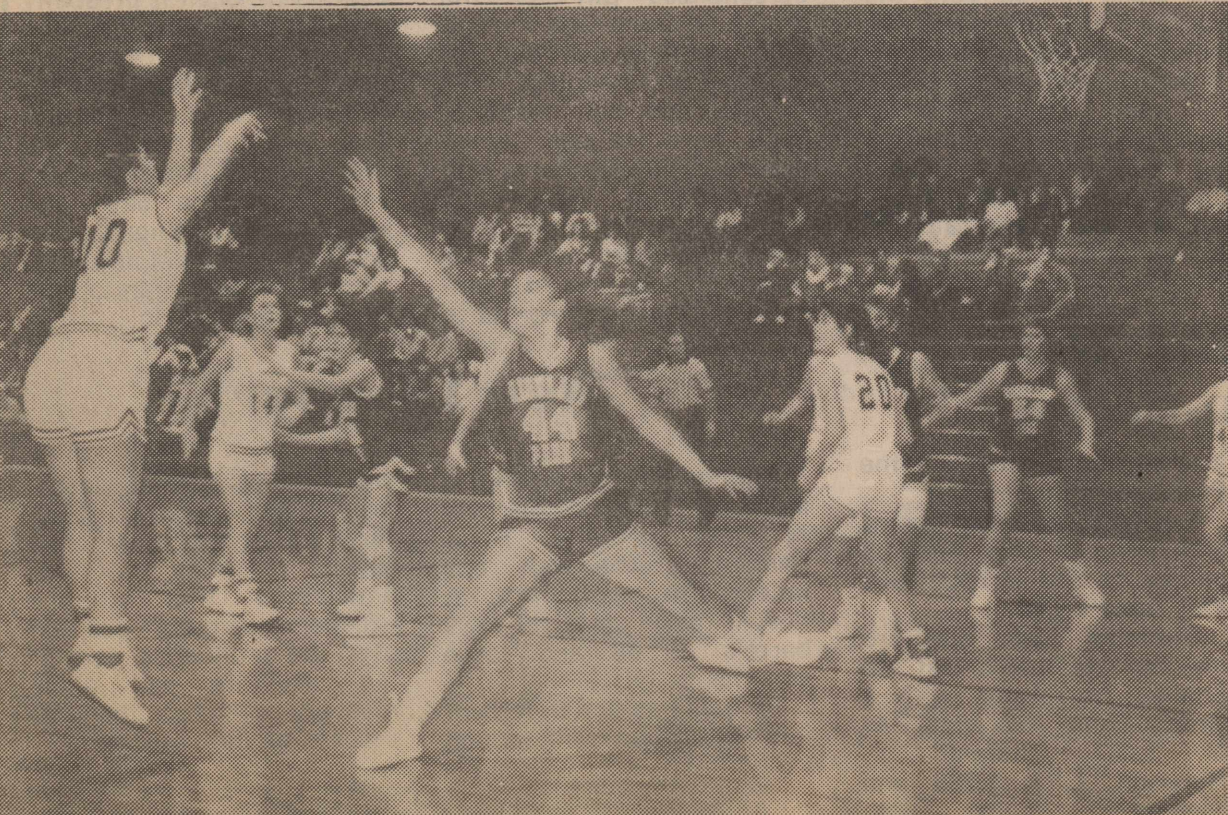

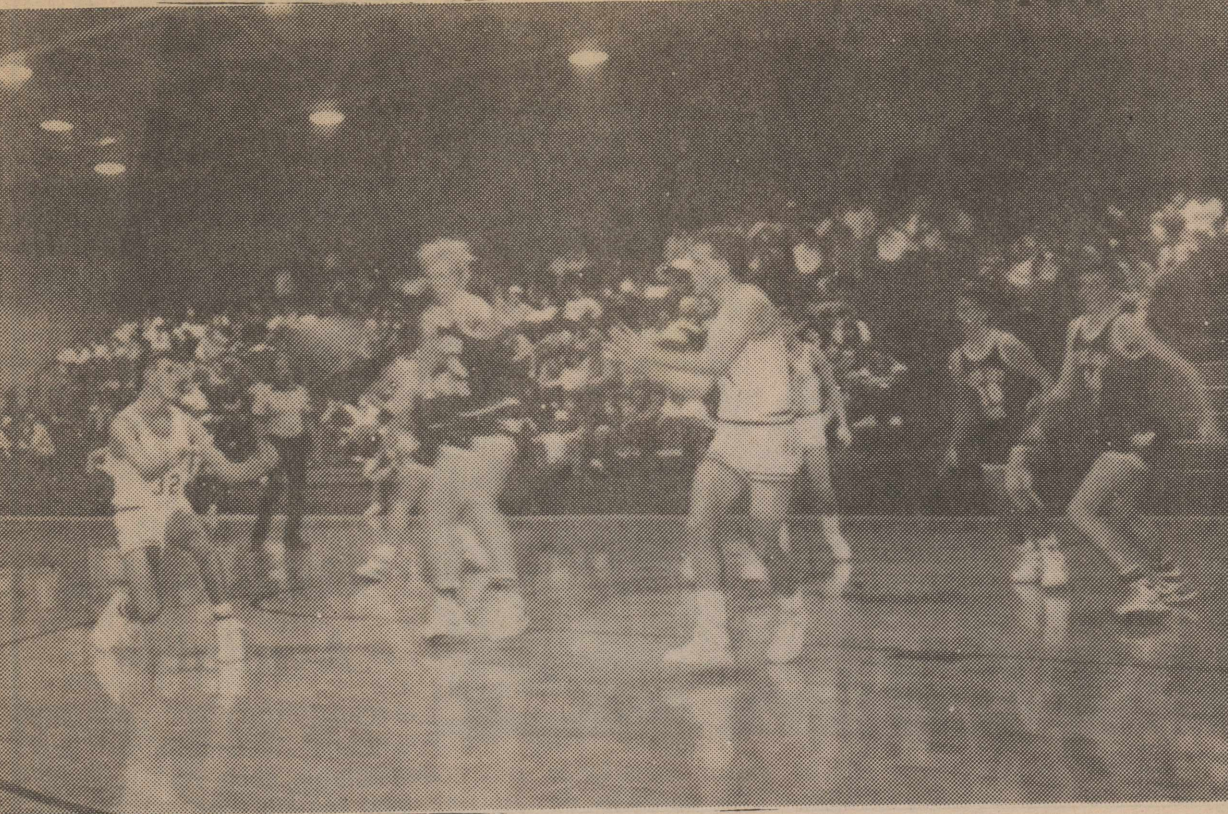

one each. Michelle Durham had four assists.

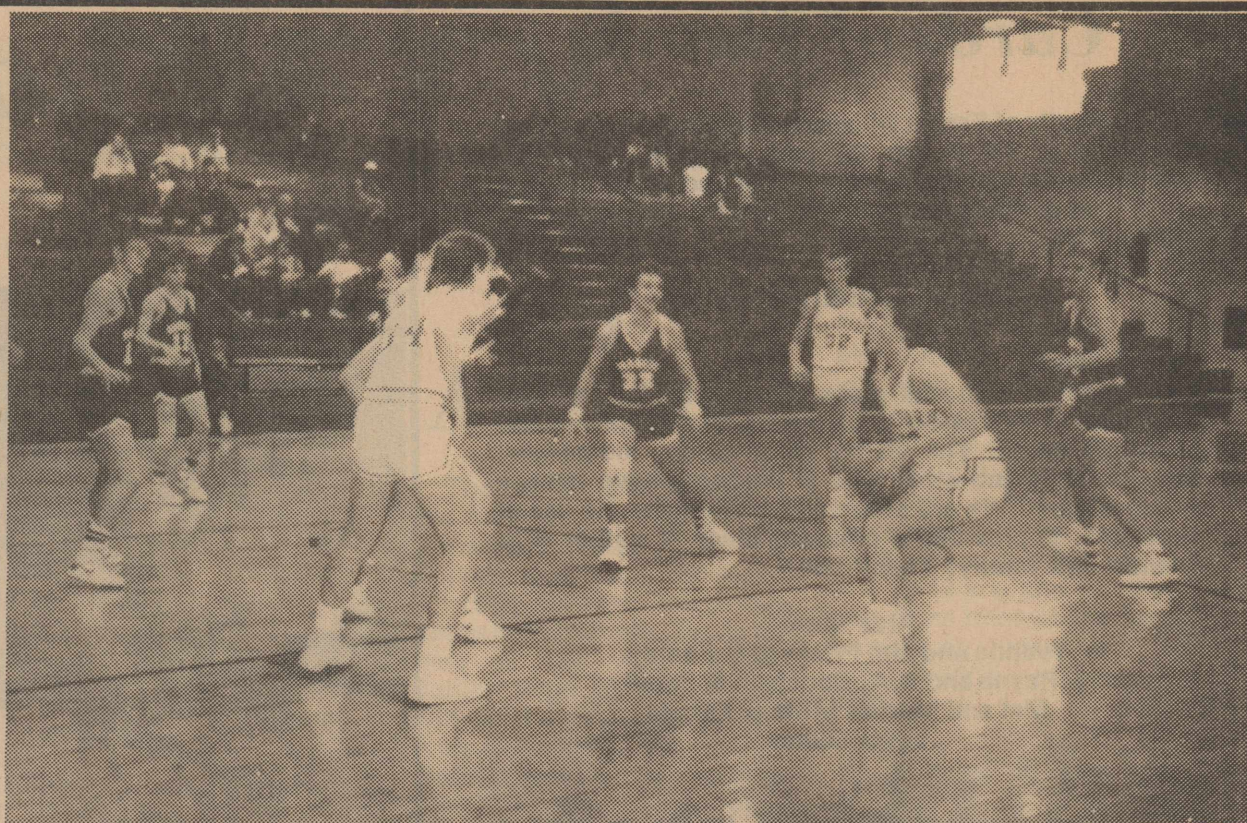
