

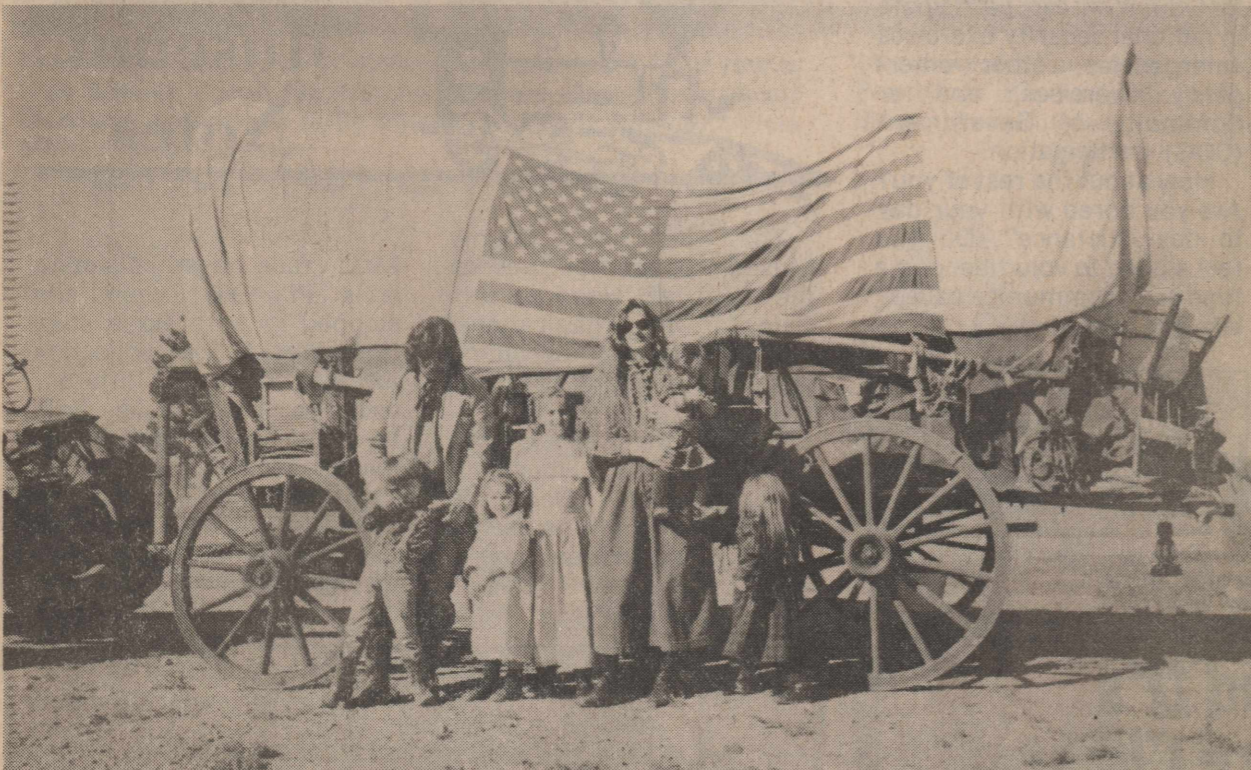

Tom and Pam DeMarko and their five children of Kipton, Ohio, population 350, arrived in Stratford Saturday in a covered wagon drawn by an antique Minneapolis moline tractor. Tom worked in the family business restoring antique items and furniture and old Victorian homes, he also did some cabinet work.

After some difficulty in the business Tom and Pam discussed moving, Pam made a joke about heading for California in a covered wagon. Then later they discussed it as a possibility as it would be a good learning experience for their

five children, Danielle age 8, David age 5, Marissa age 4, Martina age 3 and Marielle 14 months.

Tom began work on the handmade covered wagon using floor boards from the attic of their home. The boards are 170 years old. After completing the wagon the family sold everything and began their journey.

The family travels 20 to 25 miles per day and said that people have been so wonderful to them. Tom said they had encountered some bad weather and a few close calls one of which was an 18 wheeler trying to pass to the right of the wagon. Tom

The family plans to go into Amarillo and cut off the main road at Lubbock and travel the lower part of New Mexico. They hope to cross the border of California by Christmas then travel on to L.A. where they have friends. Tom will begin job hunting there.

DPS Is Seeking Applicants

Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety in Lubbock has announced that the D.P.S. is seeking applicants for a recruit training school scheduled to begin March 27, 1990. He stated, "We are seeking qualified men and women who are interested in becoming DPS Troopers."

Applicants will be accepted through January 19, 1990 at the Lubbock, Amarillo and Wichita Falls offices. Entrance examinations will be given beginning at 8:00 a.m. each Wednesday at the Amarillo and Wichita Falls offices and at 8:00 a.m. each

Tuesday and Thursday at the Lubbock office. Tests will take all day to complete.

Approximately 140 men and women will be selected to begin training in the exciting career of law enforcement. Beginning monthly salary is \$1,622.00 while attending the 22 week academy, \$1,865.00 a month upon graduation and \$2,362.50 a month after completion of twelve months probation.

Applicants must be 20 to 35 years old, of good moral character, in excellent physical condition and a U.S. citizen. Sixty semesters hours of college or equivalent military or police experience are required. Graduates of the DPS

Local Men Attend Convention

Mr. and Mrs. Mack Macias and Mr. and Mrs. Odell Pugh attended the State Soil and Water Conservation Convention in McAllen, Texas on October 24, 25 and 26, 1989. There were approximately 800 members in attendance. Speakers for the Convention included, U.S. Secretary of Agriculture, Clayton Yeutter the minister of Agriculture for Mexico, Jorge de la Vega and U.S. Representative, Kika de la Garza chairman of the House Agriculture Committee.

At a press conference Wednesday, Yeutter and Jorge de la Vega, minister of Agriculture for Mexico, said they will discuss trade agreements between the two countries.

"One issue that certainly will be raised by me is continued usage by Mexico of its import licensing systems on several agricultural products," Yeutter said. "We've been encouraging the government of Mexico to phase out import

licensing for a lot of products coming into Mexico, industrial as well as agricultural. Mexico has an obligation to do that under the GATT (General Agreement on Tariffs & Trade)."

Yeutter said the U.S. still faces import licensing for oil seeds, soybean products, apples, peaches and nectaries.

De la Vega said trade is improving between the two countries under new Mexican President Carlos Salinas de Gortari. He said there are many agricultural trade issues for the two agriculture secretaries to discuss.

"I will talk with Mr. Yeutter in terms of the bilateral arrangement that we would need in order to promote better understanding between both countries in terms of agriculture and livestock," de la Vega said through a translator.

Yeutter said open trade across the U.S. Mexico border is not likely anytime soon but is a high possibility in the future as trade with Mexico increases.

TPRDC Held Its Annual Meeting

The Texas Panhandle Regional Development Corporation (TPRDC) held its annual meeting on October 18, 1989. The following members were elected to the Board of Directors: Sam Aldrich, owner of Aldrich's Men's Wear in Dumas; B.A. Donelson, President of the First State Bank in Stratford; R.W. "Bud" Eades, Hereford City Commissioner; Wanda Herd, Mayor of Wheeler; Donnie Johnston, Vice President with the First State Bank in Canadian; Jeff Richards, Assistant Vice President with the First National Bank in Amarillo; Luther Robinson, President of the First National Bank in Tulla; Steve Rogers, owner

of the Steve Rogers Company in Amarillo; and Gary Stevens, Area Manager External Affairs with Southwestern Bell Telephone in Amarillo. The Board elected Jeff Richards as President; Gary Stevens, Vice President Steve Rogers, Secretary; and Wanda Herd, Treasurer.

The Texas Panhandle Regional Development Corporation provides long-term, fixed rate loans to small businesses for purchase of land & buildings, and for construction and remodeling. Loans range from \$50,000 to \$750,000 for projects totalling \$125,000 to \$1,875,000. The program has fifty percent participation by a private lender, forty percent by the Small Business Administration and ten percent by the borrower.

The Board of Directors meets once a month to review loan applications.

Perna Strickland serves as Administrative Director of the TPRDC.

Workers' Compensation System is Costing All Of Us Money

It's costing you money... it's costing this town new jobs... it's costing Texas by losing new investments. Time and time again, our out-dated, costly Workers Compensation System is costing all of us money.

Did you see the news article about Rymer Foods of Chicago building a \$40 million poultry center employing 1500 in Oklahoma? Quote the company spokesman "What scared us away (from Texas) was the high cost of doing business, especially workers compensation".

We need a strong state agency to handle cases instead of going to court on every case. We need a way to stabilize costs of injuries and get injured workers their money quicker. We need a safer workplace.

Our rates have increased 148 percent in five years, with an additional 35 percent requested in the sixth year. Despite dramatic rate increases, insurers are abandoning Texas.

These are the signs of a broken system.

A sound reform bill will provide for restraints or medical costs, objective standards for determining payments and a simplified system for resolving disputes. We need real reform, not just a band-aid stated Larry Milner, President of Texas Chamber Of Commerce.

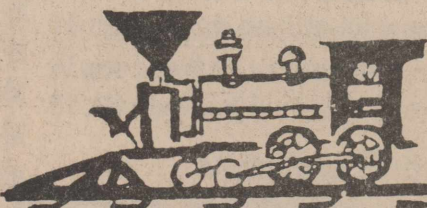

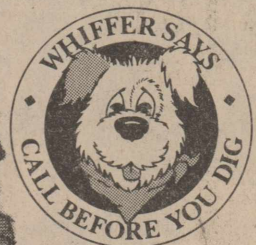
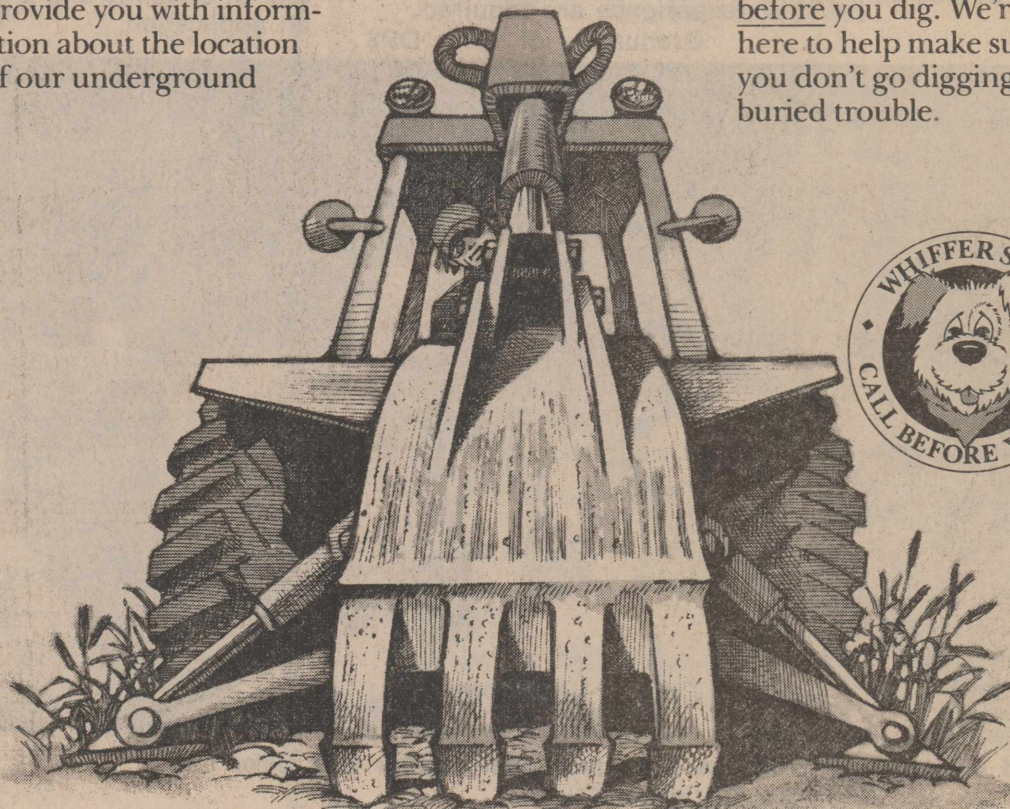

Winter Season Is Just Around The Corner

The Texas Department of Public Safety reminds motorists that the winter season is upon us, and it's time, once again, to get both the driver and the vehicle in the best possible condition for this most grueling driving season.

Major V.J. Cawthon, Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, region 5 said, "Winter driving can be very hazardous. Driver's are faced with many dangerous obstacles: nights are longer, freezing temperatures, snow, sleet, and ice covered roads, all creating handicaps for the driver."

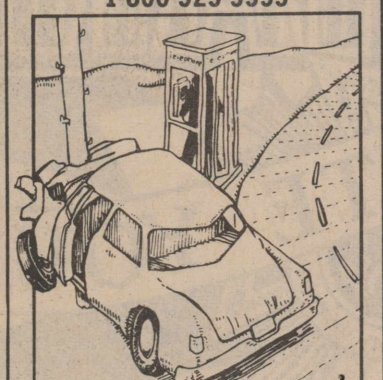
The most important safety tip for winter driving is to "slow down". On ice covered roads, only drive when it is necessary and realize that it's going to take you at least twice as long to cover the same distance as when the road was dry and clear of ice. So, remember to set more time aside for driving under winter conditions.

When temperatures drop below the freezing point, drivers must guard against reduced visibility caused by frosted windows and windshields. Allow your car's engine to warm up and for the defroster to become effective before driving. Be sure your windows and headlights are clear and free of any obstructions, like mud or snow. Do all this in advance, before you hit the road.

Major Cawthon stated, "During adverse weather conditions, allow yourself plenty of travel time and try not to make your vehicle a wristwatch and the highway a magic time machine by trying to make up lost time on the streets and highways."

The Texas Department of Public Safety reminds you that the hazards of winter driving can be reduced. It's in your hands, the defensive driver, to make for a safer winter.

Grazing of certain frost-damaged pastures and forages can lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock.

Many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning, those causing the highest mortality in livestock when grazing after they have been frozen and wilted are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these.

The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt. Livestock should not be allowed access to the wilted material until it has dried completely. This usually takes three or four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes nontoxic and can be grazed within 10 days to two weeks following a rain.

As far as the actual poisoning is concerned, the poison acts rapidly and can kill animals within minutes. In most acute cases, animals become affected within 10-15 minutes.

Symptoms of prussic acid poisoning may include a brief period of stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be present. Stupor (loss of sensibility), difficult breathing and frequent convulsions may result. Death is caused by suffocation since oxygen remains in the blood and is not exchanged to the tissues. This also causes the blood to

appear bright red.

Here are some steps to prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock:

1. Allow plant material affected by frost to dry thoroughly before grazing. This may require a week or more of good sunlight.

2. Feed animals hay or a supplement before turning them in on plants that may contain prussic acid. Animals that are not hungry will not be affected as seriously by toxic material since their intake will be limited.

3. Remove all animals from the pasture if one in the herd shows any signs of poisoning.

4. Call a veterinarian immediately if an animal appears to be poisoned. An antidote to treat affected animals is highly efficient if given early. This product is available from veterinarians.

5. Have suspect plant material checked by the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratories at College Station or Amarillo. Local veterinarians will be happy to submit samples for you.

The overall key to prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock is to be aware of plant materials that may cause poisoning and them to keep cattle from grazing such plants until a safe period has passed.

This information is provided by Dr. Buddy Farles, Extension veterinarian.

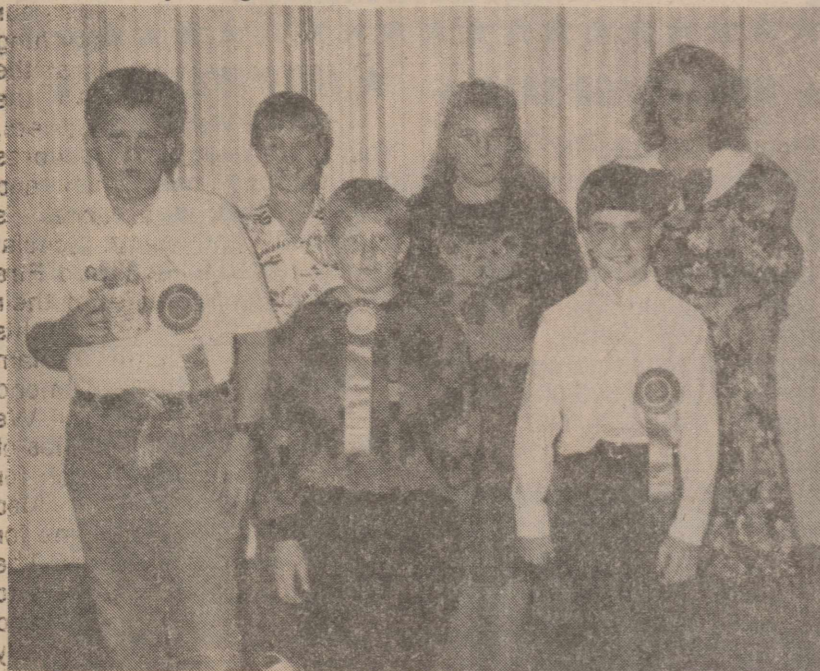
