

Applications Being Accepted For County Judge

Regarding the vacancy for County Judge, we should point out that the Sherman County Commissioners Court will appoint an interim County Judge to serve until November 8, 1988 or until the elected person qualifies.

The Democratic and Republican Committees, respectively, will nominate a candidate to be printed on the ballot. These nominations must be made prior to the deadline for printing the ballots, being early September, 1988.

The usual provisions for independent candidates getting on the ballot and the sixty (60) days requirement for filing as a write-in

candidate will apply. The Sherman County Commissioners Court will receive applications for the appointment of Sherman County Judge. Applications will be received in the County Judge's office up to 10:00 a.m. on Monday, June 20, 1988. Application forms are available in the County Judge's Office.





Try Oats To Reduce Cholesterol Level

It's long been known that the fiber in oats lowers blood cholesterol in people who have high levels, thus reducing their risk of developing heart disease. Now researchers have also

found it lowers blood cholesterol of people who have what are considered normal levels.

Research scientists at Northwestern University School of Medicine have found that just two ounces a day of either oatmeal or oat bran, which equals about two cups of hot cereal or two muffins, can lower cholesterol by almost 5 percent in a

matter of weeks.

Before you start eating bowl upon bowl of oatmeal be aware of two factors. First, the oat products in the studies were found to be helpful only as part of a moderate-fat, moderatecholesterol diet. So don't count on oatmeal to combat

the effects of a fatty diet. Second, it hasn't been shown that just because two ounces of oats are effective in lowering cholesterol levels that more than two ounces will be even better. So don't go overboard on oats to the exclusion of other carbohy-
