

- structures. •Never climb on or go inside a substation fence. Call SPS to help you retrieve anything thrown
- into the substation or acaught in its fence. Avoid using electrical tools like lawn mowers or hedge clippers when grass

and leaves are wet.

- ·Be careful when digging. Call SPS to find out if there are any buried electrical lines in the area.
- Electrical cords should not be spliced or taped. Repair by shortening them or replace them entirely.
- ·Beware of exposed wires. •Don't touch portable appliances (coffee makers, radios, hair dryers, etc.) with wet hands or while

standing or sitting in water.

•Don'f post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation

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
