SPS Reaches Agreement For Texas Rate Decrease

Customers in Texas cities served by Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) soon should receive their second electric-rate decrease of the year. Also, SPS's rural customers should have their rates lowered to match rates within city limits, SPS announced today.

The decreases in effect and proposed total \$20.6 million, or 4.3 per cent, and reflect lower SPS expenses resulting primarily from federal tax reform, said Sam Hunter, SPS vice president of rates and economic research.

Staff of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT), the state's office of public utility counsel, the Texas Industrial Energy Consumers and the U.S. Department of Energy.

Details of the agreement are being worked out, and once approved, the reduction would be considered effective as of July 8, Hunter said. Approval from city and state regulators is expected within 35 to 60 days. A customer's first bill on which the reduction is calculated would include a credit recognizing the effect of the lower rate

since July 8.

"This timing allows our customers to, in effect, receive lower rates even before the regulatory process is complete," Hunter said. "We worked out this arrangement in order to extend lower rates to all of our customers as soon as possible."

Effective March 28, upon approval from the cities, these customers will receive an additional 1.2 percent decrease, Hunter said, to match the rural reduction of 4.3 percent.

In Texas, cities have original jurisdiction over rates within their city limits. The PUCT regulates rates in rural areas. SPS will file with the PUCT for approval of the rural rate decrease and with 74 Texas cities it serves for approval of the rural rate decrease and with 74 Texas cities it serves for approval of the rate decrease within city limits.

The percentage of rate decrease varies slightly among types of electric customers. Residential customers will receive a net 5.2 percent decrease compared to rates in effect at the first of the year.

A monthly electric bill for a rural residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours would drop \$4.09, from \$73.51 to \$69.42. The bill for a customer within the city limits using 1,000 kilowatt hours dropped \$3 on March 28 and should decline another \$1.09, resulting in a bill of \$69.42.

"These rate reductions represent a cooperative effort among all parties," Hunter said. "We believe these rate decreases can help stimulate economic development and enhance opportunities for growth in our service territory."

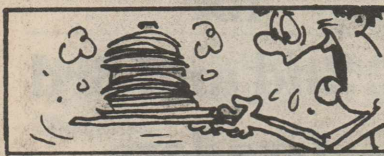

1988 Grasshopper Outlook

Amid growing public concern over the increasing use of chemical pesticides, an emerging Colorado biotech firm is using natural organisms to control major agricultural pests on range and crop land worldwide.

Evans BioControl Inc., located in the Interlocken Business Pk. in Broomfield, Co. believes the world is ready for the use of biological insecticides to control insect pests, rather than continue with the use of toxic chemicals which can cause permanent damage to the environment.

Grasshoppers, for instance are a major pest problem around the globe. In 1985 and 1986, nearly 20 million acres of U.S. rangeland were treated with chemical insecticides. The USDA states that an infestation of more than eight grasshoppers per square yard requires control to avoid adverse economic impact.

Evans BioControl's first product Nolo Bait, a biological grasshopper control agent, is specific to 58 most damaging species of grasshopper and some crickets. The active

Ingredient in Nolo Bait is a live organism, Nosema, a single-celled parasite, which is applied to wheat bran and spread by aerial or broadcast application. When the wheat bran is ingested by the grasshopper, the organism infects the fat bodies, competes for energy reserves, causes loss of appetite and eventually death. It is pest-specific; environmentally safe, leaving no toxic residue; pests do not become resistant to them and they have long-term control action.

If natural Spring conditions are favorable the Southern Plains area has definite potential for serious grasshopper problems. New Mexico's USDA Fall adult survey is the first published for 1987 and shows projections for 1988 infestation possibilities. West Texas will probably follow the New Mexico pattern as could Oklahoma. In the Central Plains, a sustaining moderate population pattern has been maintained with a declining trend. There are 'hot spots' which could cause localized problems in 1988.

How Do You Like Your Denim?

The popularity of denim clothing is a wonderful example of the old saying that "you can't please all of the people all of the time." For every person who likes faded denim, there seems to be another who is unhappy about creases, streaking or color loss.

Denims Always Lose Dye. Changes in most denim fabrics are inevitable because they're indigo piece dyed fabrics. The dye is applied in a heavily concentrated form so the residuals are mostly on the surface of the fabric. Friction with the body, rubbing or mechanical action during laundering will dislodge the dye particles from clothing.

The loss of color will be most apparent on creases, double seam thicknesses and edges, since they receive greater abrasion. Heavy denim lacks draping capabilities and retain the same position of creases in the washer and dryer, this also contributes to color loss and streaking.

Reducing color loss, creases and streaks.

So what if you don't like the creases and streaks? They can't be eliminated, but you can reduce them. Turn the garment inside out for washing if it's not heavily soiled. Underload the washer, increase the water level and shake out the garment before putting in the dryer.

Another alternative is to buy jeans made from a polyester-cotton blend. The dyes used on blends are different from the dyes used on 100% cotton, and are less likely to fade.

Fading your denim and

jeans. Do you like the faded, streaked look for your jeans and other denim clothes? If you do, you can save some money by purchasing regular denim cloth or clothes and fading them yourself.

At least two companies are marketing products for fading denim clothing. Fast Fade For Jeans is made by the Rit Company. It's a concentrated pre-wash product designed to fade and soften jeans and denim. The product claims that it fades and softens jeans right in the washer without damage to the fabric.

Old Blue is a denim pre-wash that softens and fades in one washing. It's manufactured by Malco Products, Inc.

Cautions on Bleaching and Fading.

Bleaching jeans will weaken the fibers, so they will not be as strong and durable as they were before the bleaching process. Commercial pre-wash products may also have a similar effect.

Rubbing wet denim with a pumice stone or rubbing an emery board on seam edges, pockets and other areas to produce a stone-washed or worn look also weakens the fabric in those places.

However, people who like the faded look will gladly trade durability for fashion.

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water; let cool to room temperature. Set aside.

Beat eggs in large bowl on medium speed of electric mixer until frothy. Add sugar, flour, salt and half and half, mixing to blend. Place mixture in heavy saucepan over medium heat, stirring constantly until mixture coats back of a spoon (soft custard), about 10 minutes. (Mixture may also be cooked in a microwave.) Cool; stir in gelatin mixture and pineapple, condensed milk, whipped topping and juice concentrate. Chill ingredients thoroughly (overnight is best). Pour into freezer can of a 1 gallon ice cream maker. Freeze according to manufacturer's directions. Allow ice cream flavors to ripen at least 1 hour before serving. Yields: 1 gallon.

Financial Counseling Offered To Area Farmers, Ranchers

Help in assessing the financial situations and options for the family farm or ranch is available to families of the Texas Panhandle and Plains. It is offered through a new project, Texas Volunteers for Rural Families, conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The project provides trained volunteer counselors who will help farm and ranch families assess the financial situation in their operation, identify problem areas and offer alternative strategies to improve profitability, explained Dick Cummins, project coordinator of volunteers. It is funded by a grant from ACTION-Center for Volunteers, Inc., which administers domestic volunteer programs sponsored by the federal government, announced earlier this year by U.S. Senator Phil Gramm (R-Tx).

The volunteer counselors have backgrounds in agriculture and related business and have undergone extensive training by professional specialists of the Extension Service, an arm of the Texas A&M System, Cummins said.

Counties where trained volunteers are ready to serve are: Castro, Dawson, Deaf Smith, Donley Knox, Lamb, Lynn and Shackelford. Volunteers are being secured and trained for other counties, including Randall, Briscoe, Hale Lubbock and Jones.

"Those volunteers know how to help you look at your business figures and determine what they really mean to you," said Bonnie Piernot, Extension consumer economic specialist at College Station who is project

administrator. "They're not going to tell you how to run your business, but they will suggest your options".

Cummins said the volunteers have been trained in procedures to follow for family budgeting and for financial planning of businesses of farming, ranching or which are agriculturally related.

"This includes financial structuring, debt restructuring and reorganization of business to maximize the resources which are available," Cummins said.

"It's a hands-on process, it isn't theoretical, and it is completely confidential," he stresses.

"Our goal is to help rebuild rural Texas, one family at a time," Cummins said.

The project resulted from a national competition to find ways to assist financially distressed rural families, Gramm said. Texas A&M won an \$84,000 grant to conduct the effort.

"These funds are important because they apply the resources of Texas A&M and ACTION to the real problems faced by many Texas farmers," Gramm said. The senator said he hopes the Texas volunteer network will serve as a model for other industries confronted with financial difficulties.

Rhyming Rancher Tries To Portray Modern West

EDITOR'S NOTE:

This article on Ted Bouldin was taken out of the News-Press, Moore County, Dumas, Texas. Thought our readers would enjoy it.

The life of the working cowboy, the hardships of the modern rancher and the humor of western life, all are the world of a Panhandle poet, Ted Bouldin.

In fact, Bouldin's world includes more than just poetry, although his art has begun to receive a good deal of attention in western poetry circles.

Something of a Renaissance man, he also sketches and carves, and has learned the craft of saddle and tack making, in addition to running 27 head of cattle, all while working full time for Diamond Shamrock, where he has been employed for 13 years.

If that isn't enough, Bouldin and his wife, Judy, are planning to build a log cabin home in the future, and he is learning dirt work as part of the project.

The poetic side of the many-faceted Bouldin actually started a couple of years ago when he began keeping his compositions rather than throwing them away.

"I was taking the tackmaking course at TSTIL when a guest speaker suggested that I send a sample of my poetry to her," says Bouldin "I did, she like it, and entered it in a contest."

His poem, "Cow Poor," received honorable mention in the contest and won the budding poet the "Golden Poet" award from the competition sponsor, The World of Poetry.

The award led, in turn, to invitations from a couple of

cowboy poetry festivals, including the prestigious event held annually in Elko, Nev., and to the second annual Texas Cowboy Poetry Gathering in Alpine, where he was scheduled to recite in the "Rhyming Ranchers" session.

So far, conflicting schedules and inclement weather have played a part in keeping Bouldin from being able to attend any of the events.

"When the sponsors presented the Golden Poet award in Las Vegas, Nev., I couldn't get off work to accept it," reports Bouldin. "Same thing happened with the big festival at Elko."

"So my wife and I scheduled our vacation to coincide with the Alpine gathering, on March 3, but it snowed so much before we left that we got snowed in," he laughs.

The poet deals primarily with western themes in his work, and while many of his poems poke fun at the cowboy lifestyle, others focus on the hardships of farming and ranching, natural subjects for a man who spent his early years on ranches, the son of "an old Matador cowboy."

"My ideas just come to me," declares Bouldin. "I don't make myself write. I use discipline in other areas of my life, but my poetry ideas have to be fresh."

"If I'm driving along and something comes to me, it's usually gone before I have a chance to write it down," he laughs. "And unfortunately, when I lose it, it's gone forever."

A 25-minute drive, each way between work and home, gives Bouldin time to think while he listens to

favorite music, "old time" rock and roll and country western.

There are a few subjects that have stumped Bouldin when it comes to turning them into poetry, the most recent one concerns a black felt cowboy hat.

"You know the old saying, 'I'm not a cowboy, I just found the hat,'" says Bouldin "Well I found this hat in a bar ditch one morning on my way to work. It was filled with the results of someone's overindulgence the night before, so I took it to a professional hat cleaner and they made it look brand new. I've tried three times to write about that hat, but I still haven't been successful."

Not all of Bouldin's poetry is about cowboy life, the Vietnam veteran has written about his experiences during that time of his life, as well.

If some of his co-workers tend to ridicule him about his writing, Bouldin seems unconcerned.

"When I won the contest they all wanted to read the poem. Some of them like it and some of them didn't, but most of them don't read a great deal of poetry, anyway," he explains.

His wife, Judy, keeps tabs on the energetic poet's business ventures, doing bookwork for the ranch, his saddle making business, and the various activities he is involved in and the couple's daughter, Kimberly, 12, has written poetry for school assignments, but by her father's account "prefers new rock and roll and television to poetry."

The family's spacious plan for a log cabin home is being designed to appeal to

Bouldin's love of the outdoors. And his hopes for the future include goals for his ranching and poetry enterprises.

"I dream of running 200 head of cattle," he says. "But I'd also like to see my poetry take off, maybe as the lyrics for country western music."
