

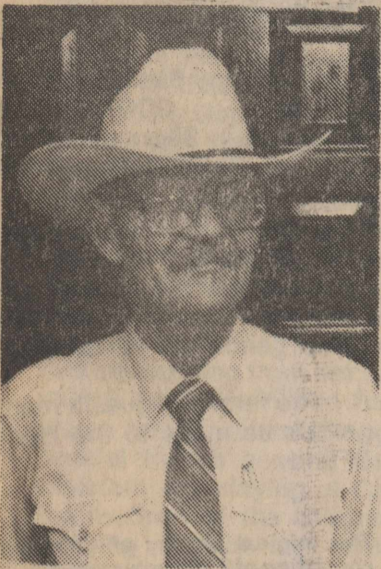

Stratford To Vie For New Water Tower

In the near future, the City of Stratford will be conducting a door to door survey in order to apply for a Community Development Grant. This grant, if approved, will enable the City to obtain a new water tower.

The survey will ask questions pertaining to the number of persons in the household, income levels (example: \$0-\$21,500, \$21,500-\$45,000, over), length of time at the residence, and other general information. It is extremely important that these questions be answered as truthfully as possible. Applications of this nature have been turned down in the past due to the fact the per-capita income in Stratford seemed to be high. Although we had some reservations on the validity of the past survey conducted

for this purpose, because of lack of communications, we are confident the economy here now warrants another look at the possibility of obtaining this grant for the citizens of Stratford.

We urge each and every individual who participates in this survey to answer these questions as thoroughly and completely as possible. Our only interest for doing the survey, is to supply the citizens of Stratford with a sound water system. By no means do we wish to intimidate or embarrass anyone.

The City hopes to start the survey in the next 60 days, according to the City Manager. He also stated that every effort will be made to make the survey as easy to understand as possible. Please be ready to answer these simple, straight forward questions.

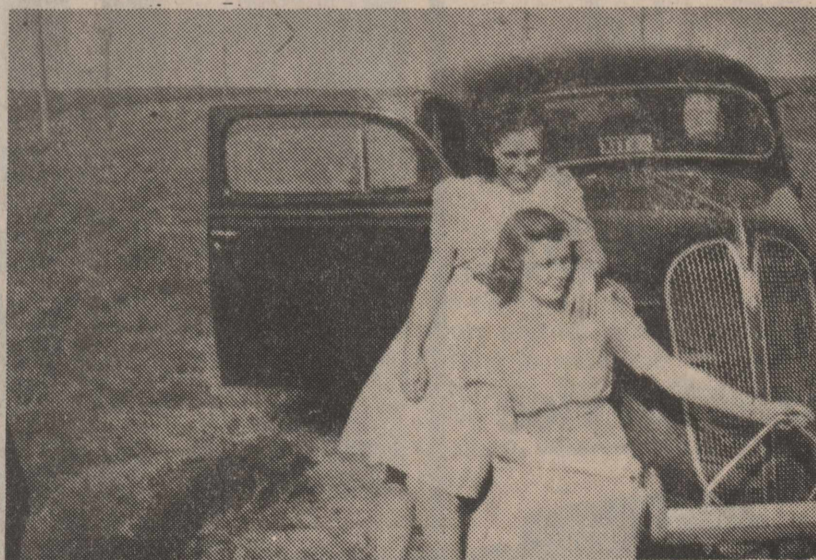

Hunter Education Classes Set

A complete course in Hunter Education has been scheduled for August 15th and 16th at 7:00 p.m. at the County Barn.

The course is open to adults and youngsters and will include instruction in rifle, shotgun and bow hunting handling and safety, outdoor ethics, laws and regulations, conservation, wildlife ID, field care of game, wilderness first aid and survival.

Those students 12 years of age or older successfully completing the course will be issued a Hunter Safety Card from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. The 10 hour course fee is \$5.00 per student to cover registration and materials.

The class will be limited to 40 students.

Stratford's water is well below acceptable limits for lead and is tested monthly to insure delivery of minimally corrosive water to you. However, tap water may contain higher levels of lead leached from pipes in your home. Some home water treatment devices make water more corrosive and thus can increase the amount of lead leached from your pipes.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short term exposure, is young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest: If your home or water system has lead pipes or if your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and if the home is less than five years old, or if you have soft or acidic water, or if water sits in the pipes for several hours.

Ways to avoid potential lead exposure are to 'flush' faucets before use and to use cold water for drinking and cooking. You may wish to

have your home tap water tested for lead content by a competent laboratory. You may also wish to check to see if lead pipes, solder, or flux were used in your home plumbing.

If the City becomes aware of any source of lead contamination within the City's distribution system, corrective measures will be taken.

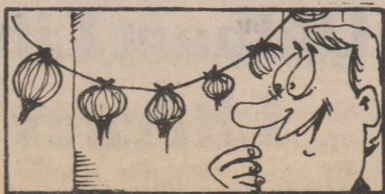

Use Pesticides Safely

For most of us, pesticides are commonplace in the home or apartment. At the first sign of insects or other types of critters, we reach for whatever is handy to get rid of the pests.

"This kind of familiarity with pesticides can lead to carelessness and potential problems," said Dr. Phil Hamman, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"There are so many different products on the market today, all aimed at taking care of specific problems, such as home pests, lawn and garden pests, and plant diseases. Use of pesticides has become quite complicated over the years, and that's where the danger lies," Hamman said.

"With specific products for specific pest problems, safety with pesticides is all the more important today," said the entomologist. "There are hosts of potential risks associated with the use of all of these products as well as specific risks with certain ones."

"That's why it's so important to read the label of a particular product before

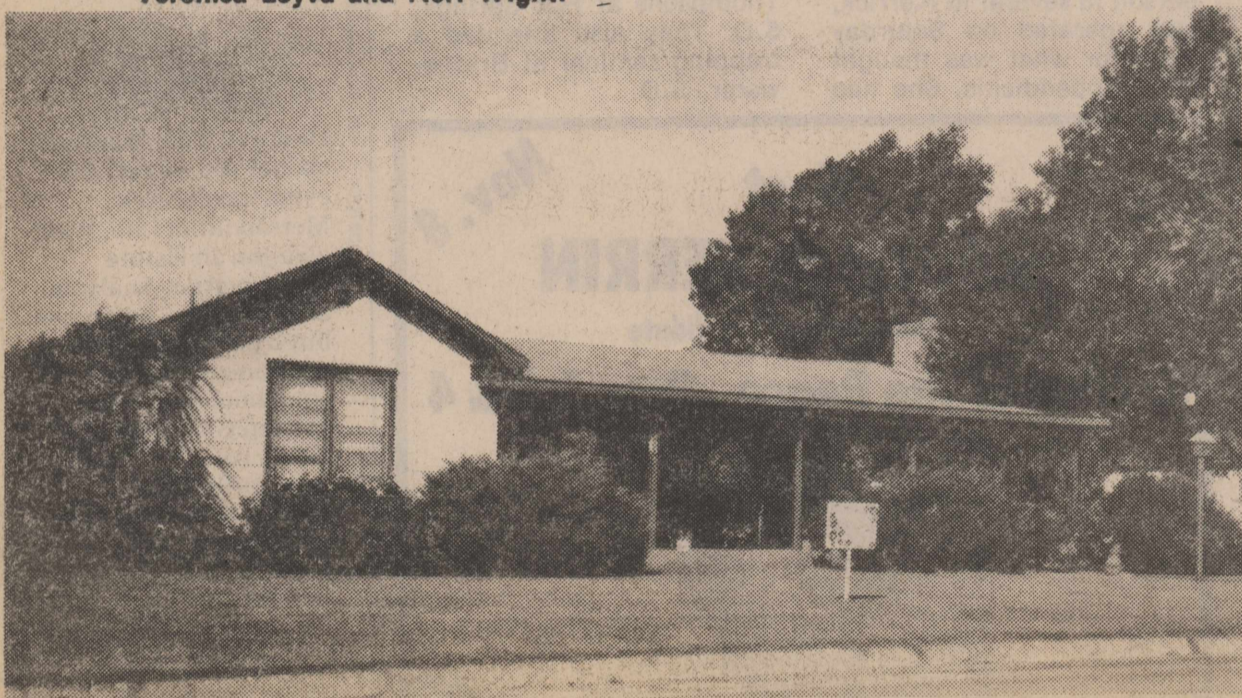

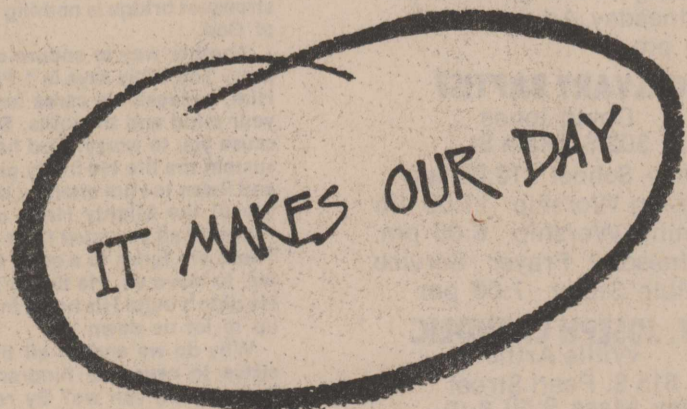

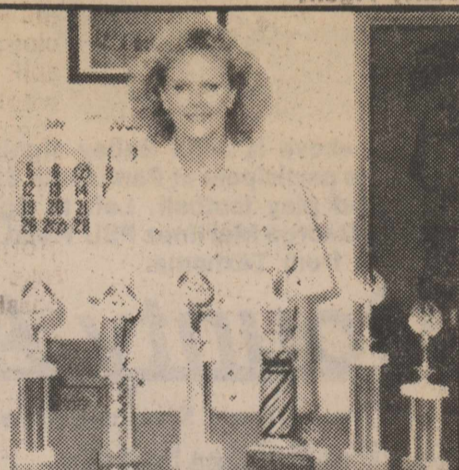

nor the label will deteriorate. Never store leftover pesticides in an unmarked container. Of course, always store such products in a locked area.

Two major problems in using pesticides are breathing fumes and absorption through unprotected skin, said Hamman. Exposure to pesticides in these two ways can cause definite problems.

Always mix pesticides in an open area where there is plenty of fresh air. Wear

gloves and other protective clothing. If you accidentally spill pesticide on your skin, wash immediately. If chemicals get into your eyes, flush them with water for 15 minutes and get medical attention immediately. If clothes get contaminated, take them off as soon as possible and wash your skin with soap and water. Wash contaminated clothing twice, separately, in a strong detergent.

When spraying or dusting large areas, wear safety
