



Stratford's water is well below acceptable limits for lead and is tested monthly to insure delivery of minimally corrosive water to you. However, tap water may contain higher levels of lead leached from pipes in your home. Some home water treatment devices make water more corrosive and thus can increase the amount of lead leached from your pipes.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short term exposure, is young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest: If your home or water system has lead pipes or if your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and if the home is less than five years old, or if you have soft or acidic water, or if water sits in the pipes for several hours.



by Jim Allison: Sherman County Extension Agent **Use Pesticides Safely** "That's why it's so

For most of us, pesticides are commonplace in the home or apartment. At the first sign of insects or other types of critters, we reach for whatever is handy to get rid of the pests.

"This kind of familiarity with pesticides can lead to carelessness and potential problems," said Dr. Phil Hamman, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"There are so many different products on the market today, all aimed at taking care of specific problems, such as home pests, lawn and garden pests, and plant diseases. Use of pesticides has become quite complicated over the years, and that's where the danger lies," Hamman said.

"With specific products for specific pest problems, safety with pesticides is all the more important today." said the entomologist. "There are hosts of potential risks associated with the use

of all of these products as well as specific risks with certain ones.

product, read the label again to make sure you are applying the pesticide properly and using the necessary precautions."

A label on a pesticide contained is a legal document, so make sure it's in place at all times, Hamman said. That means storing the pesticide in an area protected from the weather so that neither the product







stopped over in Raton, N.M.




