## THE CASE OF THE JOYLESS JOGGER

She said she was a jogger. It was hard to believe. I had
come to know her well. The problems with food buying... high calorie snacks...lack of exercise. But I agreed to meet her this one last time
for a jog around the track anyway.

## It was a beautiful day. Blue sky, green trees and ail that. As a private nutritionist, had been called out on many fitness cases before, but somehow my confidernce

 faded the minute got a look at her. She was walting a decked out in a hot pink sweatsuit, matching head band and brand new runningshoes. She didn't look shoes. She didn't look
happy. I asked her what was wrong. it's a mystery to me why I con jog and still not lose any
weight and I want to know weight and I want to know she took off running. I lid a
couple of stretching exercises and jogged after her at an easy pace. I caught up
with the lady at the quarter mile mark. She was now moving in slow motion and breathing hard.
"Are we getting close to
the finish line?" I told her we had about
three-fourths of a mile left. "I don't know how much longer I can breanhe and run at the same time. casually asked her how
often she went jogging. "Oh, about once a month, when the weather's good and I can find time to get over to the track. Ow, my
foot." came to a dead stop and flopped down on the grass by the track. I asked her if she
wanted to do some exercise to cool. She looked at me like 1 was crazy.
"Are you crazy? I just running and you want me to do some exercises? I'll be so stay in bed all morning anyway." The clues were all there. The lady wasn't exercising
right. And without doing it the right way she'd never get
any beneficial effects. She any beneficial effects. She
had to know the truth about joyless jogging. But would
she believe it?
I told her about the
research that shows it's important to warm up before beginning vigorous exercise.
warm up exercises prepare the body for more intense activity and decrease the liklihood of straining muscles. Cooling down exercise
helps the heart return to a normal rate and keeps you from getting dizzy. Since she ran and got sore, it's no wonder she didn't exercise very often. The lady was still
panting: only running once a month? It's still exercise.
She was right She was right. It's still
exercise, but not enough exercise, but not enough
exercise to do any good. I told her about other research showing that you don't get
much effect from exercise unless it's done at least three stunned.
the track three days out to
So t'll So l'll never get enough
exercise to maintain my weight."

She was stuck on the horns a private nutritionist, I knew there were plenty of other ways to get regular exercise that and require a track suit. I told her how she could develop her own personal exercise program. For example, she could waik three
to four times a week in her to four times a week in her include warm up and cool down time in the total exercise period.
The lady was estatic. A
reasonable exercise program reasonable exercise program
meant she might be able to burn enough calories to maintain her weight or even lose a few pounds-if she ate
right too right too.

field, she turned and said to me: "Maxi, how can I ever thank you enough. Now I know how to shop for
nutritious, lower calorie foods, slow down my eating and fit exercise into my life. I won't have to be a desperate dieter any more. And you
never even charged me a fee for all this good information. How can I pav vou?'"
I smiled modestly. Should tell her? Why not. Maybe she would want to spread the
word to othe desperate dieters. I told her I may be a private nutritionist, but I'm also a public servant-a county Extension home
