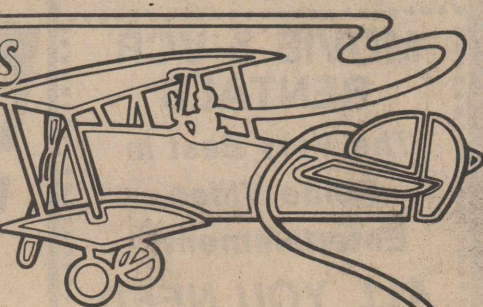

Farmers To Share Irrigation Insights

Amarillo-When producers from across the Panhandle, High and Rolling Plains gather here January 8 for the annual High Plains Irrigation Conference, they'll share their own successes and snags in crop irrigation, as well as those of scientists and Extension specialists.

One of the popular features of the annual meeting, conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, is a panel of growers telling how they have fared using various irrigation practices and equipment.

"We have another outstanding panel this year," said Leon New, Extension irrigation specialist and conference coordinator. "You can be sure they'll tell it the way it is."

Panelists this year will be Jay Spearman of Pampa, George Sides of Dimmit, Wayne Lidster of Dalhart and Joe Helms of Quitaque.

The conference will be at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Boulevard, West. Registration will begin at 8:30 A.M. District Extension Director Paul Gross will open the program at 9:25 A.M.

"Irrigation Strategies for 1987" is the conference theme. New said the

program will focus upon ways to achieve the optimum return for irrigation.

Speakers will include Dr. Michael Hickey, Extension soil chemist, Lubbock, on the proper match of soil fertility and irrigation water; and Dr. Stephen Amosson, Extension agricultural economist, Amarillo, with irrigation management guides for major crops of the area.

Dr. William Lyle, research agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Lubbock-Halfway, will report latest data on chemigation and research with the low energy precision application (LEPA) systems. Lyle recently was named "Man of the Year" by The Irrigation Association, an international organization which promotes good irrigation practices and procedures.

Application of new chemigation practices and equipment in the field will be reported by private consultants Olan Moore of Dimmit and Dave Meeks of Farwell.

Exhibitors will display the latest irrigation equipment and supplies.

Additional information about the conference is available at county Extension offices throughout the area. Extension is an arm of the Texas A&M University System.

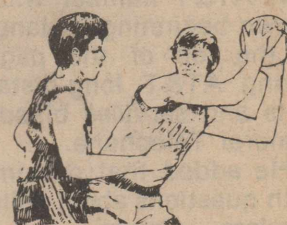

New Toll-Free Number for AT&T

General Telephone customers with questions about charges shown on the AT&T-Communications portion of their General Telephone monthly statements will call a new toll-free number effective with their January bills.

Robert J. Meyers, Perryton operations manager for General Telephone, said the new AT&T number will be shown beginning in January at the top of the page(s) listing AT&T long-distance calls and services billed by General Telephone.

He added that customers with questions about calls or services shown on the General Telephone portion of their bills will continue to call the General Telephone number shown on the statement.

"The only change for customers will be that they call the AT&T number when they have questions concerning AT&T services," Meyers said.

GTE personnel will be available to answer customer questions about non-AT&T long-distance charges appearing on the GTE bill.

General Telephone will continue to provide customer billing and collection services for AT&T's customers under a recently announced five-year agreement between GTE telephone operating companies and AT&T. The only change will be that AT&T will answer customer questions about AT&T long-distance calls or services.

Ethel Hamptons weekend guests were daughter Marg-gee, Dennis and Michael Huff of Amarillo.

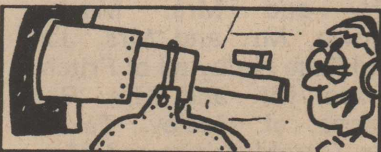
Dovie Fedric entered High Plains Hospital Sunday for tests etc.

Principle #1. The First Mile Luke 13:23-24
In most of our churches we hear a lot about second mile Christianity; that is to do more, give more and be more than is expected of us. That is a great theological message of truth, yet we need to recognize that a Christian can't go the second mile until they have learned to go the first.
The text deals with salvation from the power and penalty of sin and refers to the gate into that salvation experiences as being narrow. To enter that gate is a lifelong journey toward heaven where ultimate salvation from even the presence of sin is experienced. As we embark upon that new journey we must face the first mile before we go on to the more mature "second mile Christianity". The narrowness of the gate shuts out those who refuse to come by the way of the cross. Once we have entered that gate on our new journey, we are brought face to face with the harsh reality that even the first mile is not easy.
First we encounter certain difficulties; three in particular. First comes the battle of forsaking the old life. It isn't easy to change a lifetime of habits. In fact in some cases it is impossible except for the new power of the Holy Spirit within us. Second is the battle of accepting the customs of the new life. Third is learning to ignore the influence and counsel of old, non-Christian friends. These problems have defeated many in effectively living for Christ.
To make it past the first mile we must recognize that we are a new creation in Christ and that old things are passed away and all things are become new. [2 Cor. 5:17]. We must have a great determination to become what God wants. We must be willing to bear the reproach of Christ and the cross [Heb. 13:13]. We must be willing to bear the persecution of a non-believing society. We must be willing to be clean in life and to forsake former unclean things [1 John 1:9]. We must keep unloading [Heb. 12:1] by unloading the weights that burden us down, at the cross of Christ.
Only when we can effectively go the first mile of the journey, are we conditioned to embark upon second mile Christianity.

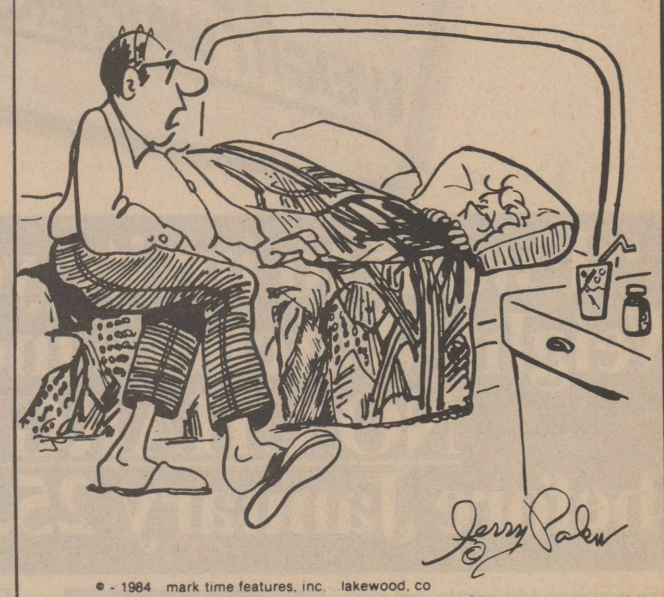

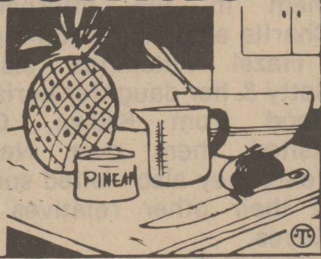

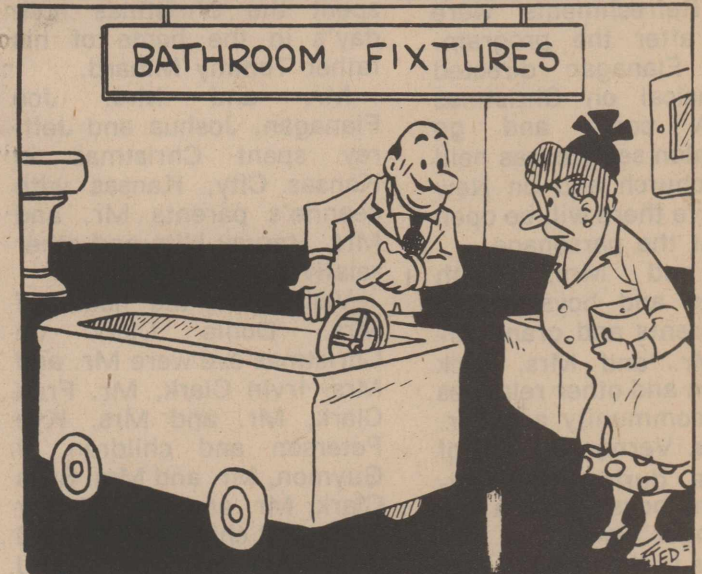

"Buyer's Remorse" A Common Ailment

As the bills for holiday expenses come rolling in this month, many consumers will be feeling a good case of "buyer's remorse."

That's simply a fancy term for the depression that follows overspending. For some of us, overspending may be an occasional problem, but for others it can become compulsive.

Compulsive spenders usually have the sense of being out of control and often hide their purchases out of embarrassment. A poor self-image is worsened by more buying because the underlying need for approval or excitement often is not met.

Impulse buying, or buying that is not a part of an overall plan, affects virtually everyone at one time or another. For example, have you ever gone to the grocery store to pick up a gallon of milk and walked out with two bags of groceries, personal care items, magazines or other merchandise?

Impulse buying is not automatically "bad". But it does add up, and can mean that important items cannot be purchased because the money has already been spent in other ways.

The marketplace contributes to both compulsive and impulsive buying. For some people the attraction is the pleasant activity of shopping and buying. Other "can't pass up a good bargain."

If your New Year's resolutions involve improving your family financial management, examining spending habits can be a good place to start.

"Buyer's remorse," or the

feelings of depression that can follow overspending, may be relieved with some thought and action.

Know when you have shopped enough. Since shopping takes time, effort, energy and money, it makes sense that you should spend the most time shopping for the most expensive items.

Avoid shopping for items you know are too expensive for you to afford. Also consider the total cost for shopping, including the gasoline, food, parking and the product or service.

Make a spending plan. If you can't afford to buy everything you need or want at one time, a plan for buying one thing at a time over a certain period may help.

If you are angry and go shopping, leave your credit cards at home. Try window shopping to calm down and think through the buying decision before you make a purchase.

You may want to look one day and buy another. A cooling-off period helps put things in perspective.

Work on developing wants other than "more things." Seek adventure and diversions that do not cost money.

Keep in mind that "defensive spending" or the "I can spend as much as you can" syndrome can quickly wreck your bank account and probably will not make you feel any better.

Controlling spending is a good first step toward better financial management. It can also help you conquer feelings of "buyer's remorse" and substitute the greater satisfaction of achieving your financial goals.

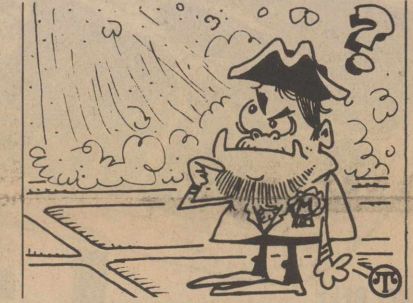

THE MILDEW MENACE

A good way to ward off mildew growth is to open the bathroom window. Mildew flourishes where conditions are warm and damp. Fresh, moving air and regular cleaning of all bathroom surfaces help keep it under control. If mildew has invaded your home, you can fight back. For tile, shower stalls and under shower doors, or grout around sinks or tubs, use an instant mildew stain remover, such as Tilex. Spray it on and mildew stains should begin to disappear on contact. Wait until stains disappear (about 4 minutes), and rinse thoroughly.

If your bathroom is windowless be sure your exhaust fan really does push air up and out. During very hot weather, consider using a fan to blow steam air out of the bathroom when it's unoccupied.

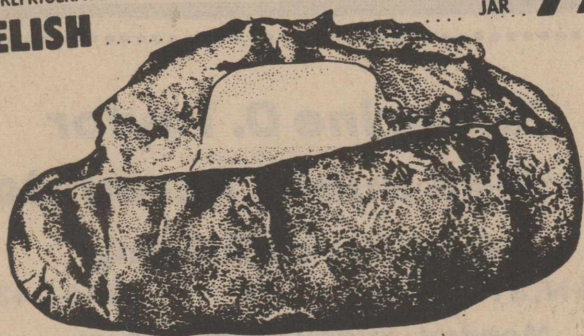

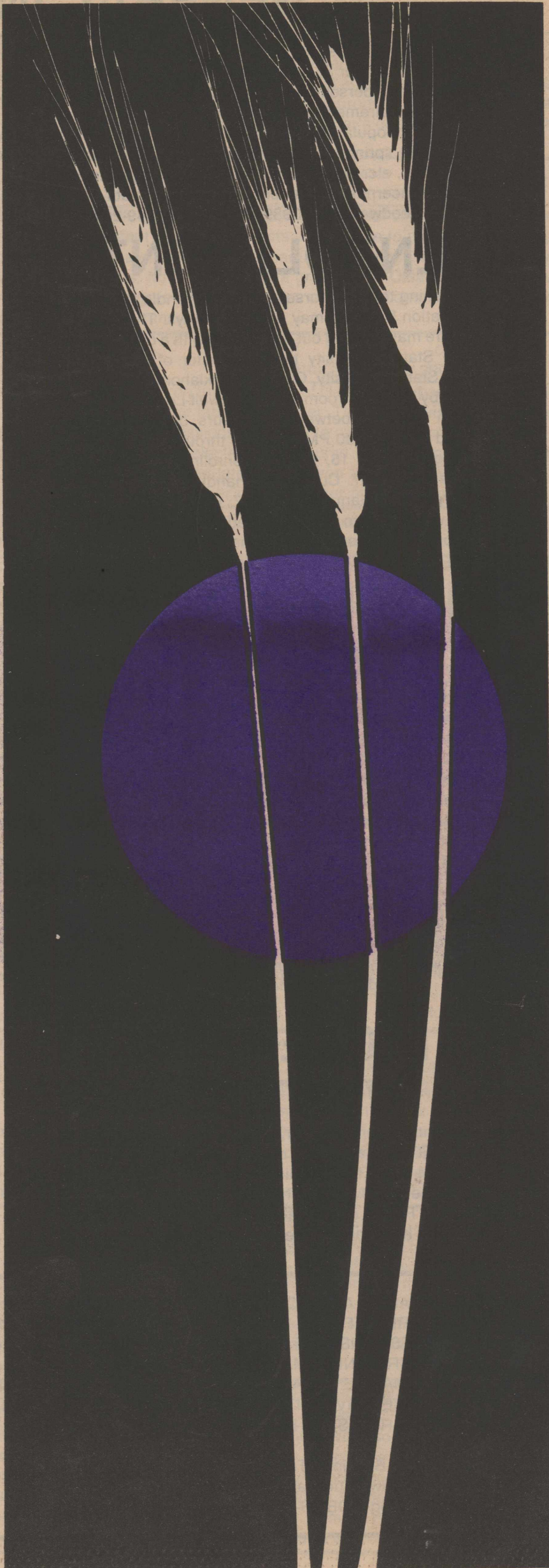

GENERAL INFORMATION

Panhandle State University began offering college level courses designed for non-traditional students in the spring semester of 1979. At that time only six subjects were offered. The Adult Education Program has steadily grown and we are able to offer 36 courses this spring. Some of the courses offered this semester will meet requirements for a degree. Surveys of persons who have taken courses in the past have indicated that there is an interest in courses which meet these requirements. While the majority of respondents have indicated the area of business and computer science would be most popular, this semester there are also three courses which may be applied toward a degree in education. In addition, the spring schedule includes many courses which allow participants to pursue interests in art, recreation, history, cooking, etc. purely for the pleasure of acquiring knowledge, learning new things and meeting new people. ENROLLMENT

Persons wishing to take courses in the Panhandle State University Adult Education Program may enroll two ways. The back cover of this brochure may be filled out and mailed with a check made out to Panhandle State University to the Director of Adult Education, Panhandle State University, Goodwell, Oklahoma 73939. You may also enroll by going to room 101 of Sewell-Loofbourrow, (the administration building) between the hours of 9:00 AM to 12:00 NOON, and 1:00 to 4:00 PM, Monday through Friday, January 8, 1987 through January 16, 1987. No enrollments will be accepted after January 16, 1987. Current Panhandle State students will be allowed to enroll on January 16, 1987, in any class not closed by limit. They will adhere to all policy listed for adult education classes including book purchase, refunds, and tuition and fee costs. They may enroll in room 101 Sewell-Loofbourrow on January, 16 only.

TUITION, FEES AND COSTS

Tuition and fees for courses in the Adult Education Program are due at the time of enrollment. Tuition charges are \$19.85 per credit hour in courses numbered 1000 or 2000 and \$21.30 per credit hour in courses numbered 3000 or 4000. Participants are also assessed a \$3.00 general fee for each course in which they enroll and a \$1.00 student union fee for each credit hour taken. Tuition and fees are established by the state legislature. Some courses require an additional charge for material or supplies used in the course. These charges will be mentioned in the individual course descriptions on pages 4, 5, 6, and 7 of this brochure. Other classes may require a textbook, workbook or both. This information will also be listed in the descriptions. Textbooks may be purchased at the university bookstore during regular hours or at the beginning of the first class session. However, they are not part of the book rental plan available to the traditional student attending regular university classes.

INCLEMENT WEATHER

In the case of inclement weather, cancellation of class notices will be aired by KGYN Radio, 1210 on the AM dial and KKBS Radio, 92.7 on the FM dial. They will air the announcements as soon as they receive them and will air them on the 5:00 PM central time local newscast. Please do not call the radio station, call PSU if you think you might have missed the announcement.

CLASS LIMIT

Prompt enrollment is advised in the courses offered through the Adult Education Program at PSU due to enrollment limits in the classes. These limits are necessary due to lab facilities, classroom size or instructor ability to provide individual attention. Information on limits may be found in the schedule on page 3 of this brochure or in the descriptive information for the individual class. In addition, the university has instituted a minimum enrollment of 10 participants per class. This minimum allows the university to adequately fund the instruction of the course. Should minimum enrollment not be met for a course, all those who are enrolled in the class will be contacted by telephone on Friday, January 16 and given the opportunity to enroll in another course that has not yet reached the maximum limit. Those who do not wish to enroll in another course will be given a full refund.

REFUNDS

Refunds are not given to persons enrolled in the Adult Education Program at Panhandle State University except in the event the class is cancelled because minimum enrollment standards are not met. If and when that occurs, a full refund will be made.

GRADES AND CREDIT

Grades for 33 of the 36 courses offered through the Adult Education program will be awarded on a "P" and "W" basis. Persons who satisfactorily complete the course will receive a "P" or "Passing." Those who do not complete the course work or who have unsatisfactory attendance will be "Withdrawn" from the course and will receive a "W." The education courses, Human Growth and Development, Observation and Participation and School in American Society may only be taken for a letter grade. Seven other courses may be challenged for a letter grade by those enrolled, if they so desire. The courses that may be challenged are: Meat Science Technology, Advance Real Estate, Advanced File Processing with Basic, Introduction to Computer Information Systems, Practical Applications for Micro Computers, Fundamentals of Photography II and Business Correspondence. Any person enrolled in any of these courses may submit, in writing, a request to the instructor expressing a desire to take the course for the traditional "A," "B," "C," "D," or "F" grades. Those who do not request traditional grades will receive the normal adult education grades of "P" or "W." All courses are offered for either one, two or three hours of university undergraduate credit. All credit will be recorded on a Panhandle State University transcript.
