Bivins Receives Farm Bureau Endorsement



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Teel Bivens

State Senate candidate Teel Bivins, an Amarillo cattleman, has received a major endorsement from the Texas Farm Bureau. The endorsement marks the first time ever that the Farm Bureau has made a recommendation in the 31st Senatorial District, or anywhere in the state, through its "Friends of Agriculture

Fund.'' 'We believe Teel Bivins will best represent this district in Austin during these critical economic times," said Aubrey Rasor, a Gruver farmer who is the District One Director of the Texas Farm Bureau. "He is a conservative, he has an understanding of what it takes to earn a living from agriculture, he has a deep and abiding appreciation for the people and the land in this Panhandle region, and

he is young & aggressive." "He will be a sincere representative of the people, who will listen to our concerns, and will make decisions based upon the view of the people," Rasor said.

The decision to endorse Bivins came after Farm Bureau county meetings in each of the 22 counties that make up District One. There are at least 13,000 voting delegates in the district. Farm Bureau is the largest

farm association in Texas. Bivins said he was proud to receive the Farm Bureau endorsement. "When you consider the fact that some 35% of the agricultural revenues in the entire state come from North of Lubbock," Bivins said, "I believe it's important that we have a voice for agriculture in the Texas Senate.'

"I make the better part of my living from agriculture: I know what it is to have a wheat crop hailed out, I know what it is to face drought, and have markets go all over the place," Bivins said.

If elected, Bivins would be one of only two senators who makes his living from production agriculture.

FBI director William S. Sessions announced that 33 law enforcement officers were feloniously killed in the United States during the first six months of 1988. The preliminary Uniform Crime Reporting statistics showed a decrease from the first half

Geographically, 15 officers were slain in the Western States, 11 officers in the Southern States, 4 in the Midwestern States, and 3 in the Northeastern States.

Over A Million Voters Registered

Secretary of State Jack Rains declared victory Friday in his effort to register more than a million voters this year.

Rains said Voter '88, his non-partisan registration drive, worked to register 1.5 million Texans since the beginning of the year.

Even with more than 597,000 Texans purged from the rolls in August, there is a net gain of 900,000 voters on the rolls since January, he said.

"Never in the history of our state have this many Texans purged from the rolls in August, there is a net gain of 900,000 voters on the rolls since January, he said.

"Never in the history of our state have this many Texans been registered to vote," Rains said. "Don't listen to all the naysayers who tell you that voter interest is low this year. Texans have registered to vote in record numbers and are excited about the election.'

In January of this year, 7.34 million Texans were registered to vote. By the March 8 Super Tuesday primary, 7.87 million Texans registered. Near complete tallies show more than 8.24 million Texans are currently on the rolls and eligible to vote on November 8.

"I set a goal of registering a million new voters this year, and a lot of Capitol pundits wanted to laugh me out of town for setting such a lofty goal," Rains said. "But Texans are enthus-

iastic folks. They rolled up their sleeves, went to work and pulled off what very well may be the most successful voter registration drive in U.S. history.

Rains said the credit goes to the more than 3,300 businesses and organizations that participated in Voter '88. Retail outlets passed out voter registration cards, utility companies sent cards as bill stuffers, businesses signed up their employees and customers and many state agencies made cards available. Rains also praised county election officials, the political parties, the campaigns and various interest groups that ran voter registration drives.

In 1988, Rains' office distributed more than 17 million voter registration cards to Voter '88 participants, not including the millions of cards sent out by county officials.

"1988 is the year of voter registration," Rains said. "We set a goal, put our mind to it and wound up with a record number of Texans registered to vote."

Complete figures are not in for Bexar, Brazos, Cameron, Dallas, Ochiltree, Van Zandt, Waller and Zapata counties. The final figure will be slightly greater than 8,245,719.

whereby senior citizens call in on a daily basis to advise of their welfare.

Yes, he has his enemies, his share of malcontents. But to quote him, "When you're a cop and you do your job, you're going to have enemies." But he always reminds me of the "Good Guys." His definition of the "good guys" are the folks that support law enforcement: the young people, the senior citizens, the average person on the street--the very backbone of Stratford and Sherman County.

Last year, when Stratford was plagued with a rash of burglaries, he spent countless nights on top of the grain elevator and the high school, watching the town. He has made and always maintained the commitment to be a professional law enforcement officer.

But he is not for sale, which has caused him some problems, also. He has always done the job, but believes that a "break or two" for a person can often do more good than "throwing the book at them." I don't know how many young people he's helped by having that philosophy.

I can remember one 48-hour period that Dennis and his crew worked on an investigation without sleep, and when it was completed, he couldn't sleep because he felt so sorry for the suspect's family. In my opinion, he is firm, but also very compassionate. And when the police department solved the post office burglary, Dennis made dozens of telephone calls to different state and federal agencies in an effort to expedite the red tape to get replacement checks to the victims. My husband has proven his capabilities and expertise--sometimes with public support, sometimes without it; but always with a conviction that "someone has to do it."

I am not going to get into an argument over the republican garbage Mrs. Watson wrote in her letter. I am going to say to you and the readers of the Stratford


