That's why the road to hell is always paved with good inten-tonio and other places. They tions. One of the most dangerous things is to accept high ideals, lofty aims, fine purposes, grand resolutions ... and neglect the day-by-day kind of living that lead to them.

Look to the road you are walking on! Ho who picks up one end of a stick, picks up the other ... so let us remember when we choose the beginning of a road, we choose the place it leads to. It is the means that determine the end.

Bread And Butter Economics

There has been increasing criticism of our educational system for failure to teach in the high schools and colleges down-to-earth eonomics ... the everyday facts of business and government, which keep the wheels going around.

If young people had the opportunity to read the week-by-week comment of such writers as Henry Hazlitt in magazines such as Newsweek, they would begin to get some ideas on the bread-andbutter side of life, jobs, taxes, investments and profits, etc.

In a recent Newsweek article, Mr. Hazlitt discussed the perils of government ownership of business. His examples cited from daily life are understandable ... not abstract theories leaving conclusions to the imagination. They exist in business and government. He says: "When governments own the power and light companies, power and light are subsidized. When governments own the airlines, the airlines are subsidized. Governments run the mail service, and the mail is carried at a loss ... A subsidy on bread would be more defensible than any of these, but the government doesn't yet own and run the bakeries.

Hunt Bonanza Readied For Texas Sports

life harvest plans in Texas his-tory have been mapped almost in their entirety by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission. From now on its strictly up to the weather to maintain the number of birds and animals calculated as available for the fall hunts .

The 1966 big game season has expanded opportunities for the sportsmen, and scatter gunners may look ahead to normally generous or expanded quail and dove hunting.

Waterfowl enthusiasts will have a second straight warmup through an experimental late September teal hunt. Final decision on the duck and goose season cannot be made until late August to climax conferences on the regional and na-

The "luxury bracket" seasons white-winged doves in the Rio Grande Valley and antelope in the Trans - Pecos, Panhandle, Permian Basin and limited other areas-are set, with extra trimmings for the whitewings.

Even the trophy hunting elite will have their day through the special conducted harvest of surplus Aoudad sheep in the Palo Duro Canyon country.

The usual provisions are made for the patient nimrod who likes his wild meat in small quanti-ties. That would be the squirrel hunter, particularly in areas of East Texas where the hunting pressure on the bushy tails requires harvest regulations. Some areas, minus hordes of the sophisticated small game hunter, still have an open season on squirrels the year around.

The fall seasons have been itemized on the basis of field studies and counsel with landowners and sportsmen, in the 184 counties over which the Commission has regulatory responsibility. The other counties function under Legislative determination of seasons, bag limits and other provisions.







INDUSTRIAL FOUNDATIONS . . to finance industrial growt

Competition between states and cities to improve their comp

tive abilities to attract new payrolls has increased the forming Industrial Foundations in Texas. Many industries want and someone else to own the land, brick and mortar, keeping money available for plant operations. Industrial Foundations dicate the interest and desire of a community for new industrial Local citizens who participate usually figure that they get a reon their money in a Foundation by having an additional power circulating in their community. - PURPOSE - is to give a community a corporate entity

- to assist industry to create jobs within the community - can be an existing industry as well as a new one Foundations usually assist industry that cannot or will not use normal commercial financial institutions.
- EXTENT OF ACTIVITIES usually are to acquire and develop industrial property . . . construct buildings for lease . . . provide funds for training workers . . . pur chase machinery and equipment . . . prepare promotional material and prospecting expenses and any other function that would give the community a competitive advantage for a new payroll.
- ORGANIZATION is usually by a group of business men who are interested in the economic growth and development of their community. A local attorney should prepare the application for the charter and by laws in order to conform to state laws and internal revenue service regulations. The local bankers' support is very helpful in forming an Industrial Foundation.
- TYPE of Industrial Foundations vary profit or non-profit - stock or contributions - the type a tom needs depends upon the attitude and characteristics the local people and its competitive position with other towns to attract new manufacturing payrolls. In most cases, Industrial Foundations are only used to assist industries where labor cost is a big factor in the open tion, as the payroll provided is the important thing to the economy of the community.
