

## TIME TO TAKE STOCK

When a nation is up to its ears in debt, and taking some onethird of the income of its people for taxes, and running deficits, you would think its managers (the elected public officials) would welcome and encourage taxpaying private industry that provides revenue for federal, state and local governments. But, many political proposals today restrict the operation of the taxpaying private enterprise system ... the foundation of a free society.

The impression given is that political management can in some manner serve the people better than can private management. The proponents of tax-exempt government competition with citizens never point out that such policies kill taxpaying industries that provide jobs and support government. They never show that under such policies, government puts some of its best customers (taxpaying enterprise) out of business. It is as senseless for government to harass and discourage business by such practices as it would be for managers of industry to promote policies to put their customers out of business. We have spent billions of tax dollars and thousands of lives opposing the spread of totalitarian government philosophy in two world wars and other conflicts. But our politicians go merrily on promoting its inroads in our own land. Is it not reasonable to ask ... where are we headed?

Freedom dies without resistance to political forces working to restrict free enterprise.



BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI. Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section to read as follows:

"Section 30c. (a) The terms of office of persons serving on the governing body of a po-litical subdivision of the State created to further the pur-poses of Section 52, Article III, or Section 59, Article XVI, of this Constitution, shall never exceed six years.

# COTTON INSECTS

#### Emory P. Boring, Area Entomologist, Texas Agricultural **Extension Service**

During the past week rain was reported in a large part of the Rolling Plains Area. In fields where boll weevils and bollworms have not been controlled. populations should continue to increase due to the increased moisture. Populations of boll weevils and bollworms increased in some areas and decreased in others. This is probably due to the use of control measures inals, or 5% of small squares

and the decreased emergence of boll weevils from squares. ...Bollworm activity has increased in several counties while decreasing in others. Bollworm damage to green squares and bolls was heavy (4% to over 6%) in one or more fields in

Wilbarger, Hardeman, Cottle, King, Jones, Fisher, Scurry, Mitchell, Runnels, Tom Green and Knox counties, Damage of 2% to 4% was ob-

served in one or more fields in Foard, Shackelford, Callahan, Haskell, Taylor, Coleman, Concho and Baylor counties. Control measures for

worms should begin when bollworm eggs and 4 to 5 young worms are found per 100 term-

and bolls have been injured by small bollworms. Control measures should be applied at 5 day intervals, or less. Fields should be checked closely 2 to 3 days following each application to insure effective control.

Populations of boll weevils ranging from 1,000 to 7,200 per acre were observed in Wilbarger, Wichita, Jones, Shackelford, Haskell, Stonewall, Fisher, Nolan and Knox counties. Populations ranging from 100 to 981 per acre were observed in Collingsworth, Hardeman, Foard, Clay, Cottle, King, Mitchell and
