The total income figure is meaningless in determining how all these different groups of individuals fared. Much of the rise in Dallas this week on business, total personal income is accounted for by the fact that more people are at work than ever before.

Statistics notwithstanding, there is but one way to keep ahead of inflation and that is for government to live within the taxpaying ability of the people. As deficits mount, the value of the dollar declines. As of January, 1967, it was worth about 87 cents of the 1957-59 dollar. This means, in spite of unpressive statistics of total personal income, that millions of individuals are worse off now than they were a few years ago. This is the price of inflation.




