#### The Good Earth

by MRS. B. F. COBB

Mrs. J. H. Strain is trying her luck with organic garden-ing this year. A four-inch layer cotton burs was spread over the growing area of their yard,

There are absolutely no weeds where the burs completely cov-er the top of the soil. Mrs. Strain dug the burs away from her plants until they got a good start toward growing. Many plants that re-seed themselves year after year, were lost in the process, but the saving on moisture, the future fertility of the soil and the care-free weedless gardening will all pay off. The plants that are growing this organic way are dark green and healthy. Tomato vines are loaded with green fruit, petunias are covered with

If we have anything like nor-mal rainfall, the burs should be broken down into rich soil by next spring and Mrs. Strain can resume her normal way of gar-dening. The soil should be dark and porous.

Pink and orange cannas in this organic garden have dark green foliage and large clusters of brilliant blossoms.

The Strains take great pride in their huge pecan trees. There are three varieties surrounding their place...Mississippi Giant, Eastern Sly and Stewert. In spite of the hail this spring, the trees have large clusters of nuts

The Strains house is landscaped with beautiful shrubbery from Florida, some whose names I am not familiar with. But those I do know are photenia, wegelia, Florida Holly and Blue Spruce.

Watermelon red crepe myrtle with huge spikes of blossoms. compliment the house on the south side. Shrubs march down the west side of the house. The lawn is a dark green carpet. Mrs. Strain planted a hedge

running north and south to give privacy to their back yard. The large pecan trees make it a shady retreat. Mrs. Strain says she has used

very little wear since the application of the burs. Truly she is mulching her garden in a big way. I've found out how to get most of your roses to live: plant them in a space much too

small, thinking "Oh, well, they won't live anyway"; and then regret not preparing a larger bed when all but one plant lives. We have had eight blossoms from our bare root plants we planted along the first of June. We set out 12 bushes where only eight should have been set; thinking only three or

four would live and every plant but one has put out and three have already bloomed. Haskell Garden Club mem-bers do not forget to plant an-nuals for the fall show.

## Serious Consideration Should Be Given To Secure New Source Water

Hon. Douglas B. Finch, Mayor City of Haskell 307 North 1st Haskell, Texas 79521 Subject: Public Water Supply Haskell, Texas

Dear Mayor Finch:

On June 23, 1966, our representative, Millard Bruce, R. S., conducted a sanitary survey of the water facilities serving Haskell, Texas, for the purpose of locating possible sources of pollution, to evaluate the operating practices being followed, to appraise the chemical bacteriological quality of the water being supplied.

Mr. Bruce's report to this Department showed that 17 shallow wells are now used to supply water for municipal purposes and that a bond issue had been passed for water improvements.

In reviewing the chemical analysis of the water submitted JWW/emf from the various wells, we note that the nitrate concentration in the wells has increased during recent years and is now above the recommended limits for drinking water. Also, the total solids are approximately twice the recommended limit

In October, 1959, this Department recommended that 'either Mrs. J. M. Woodson wish to excondition number 1 or conditions 2 and 3" listed below

should be favorably considered.

1. Development of the proposed source of water supply the North Central Texas Water Authority and abandonment of existing shallow wells presently used as a water supply source of the City of Haskell.

2. Abandonment of all existsystem where it is impractical to discharge water from them to

surface storage reservoirs. disinfection of all raw water ahead of or into surface storage reservoirs with capacity of at least 42,000 gallons. In the event that pollution of the shallow water formations as indicated by the bacteriological record established over the past two years could be proved to be of surface origin additional treatment of the raw well wa-ter would be indicated.

As we have mentioned, the nitrate content of the water furnished has increased in recent years, consequently, we are of the opinion that serious consideration should be given to a new source of supply.

If we may be of assistance to you in these matters, please let us know.


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
