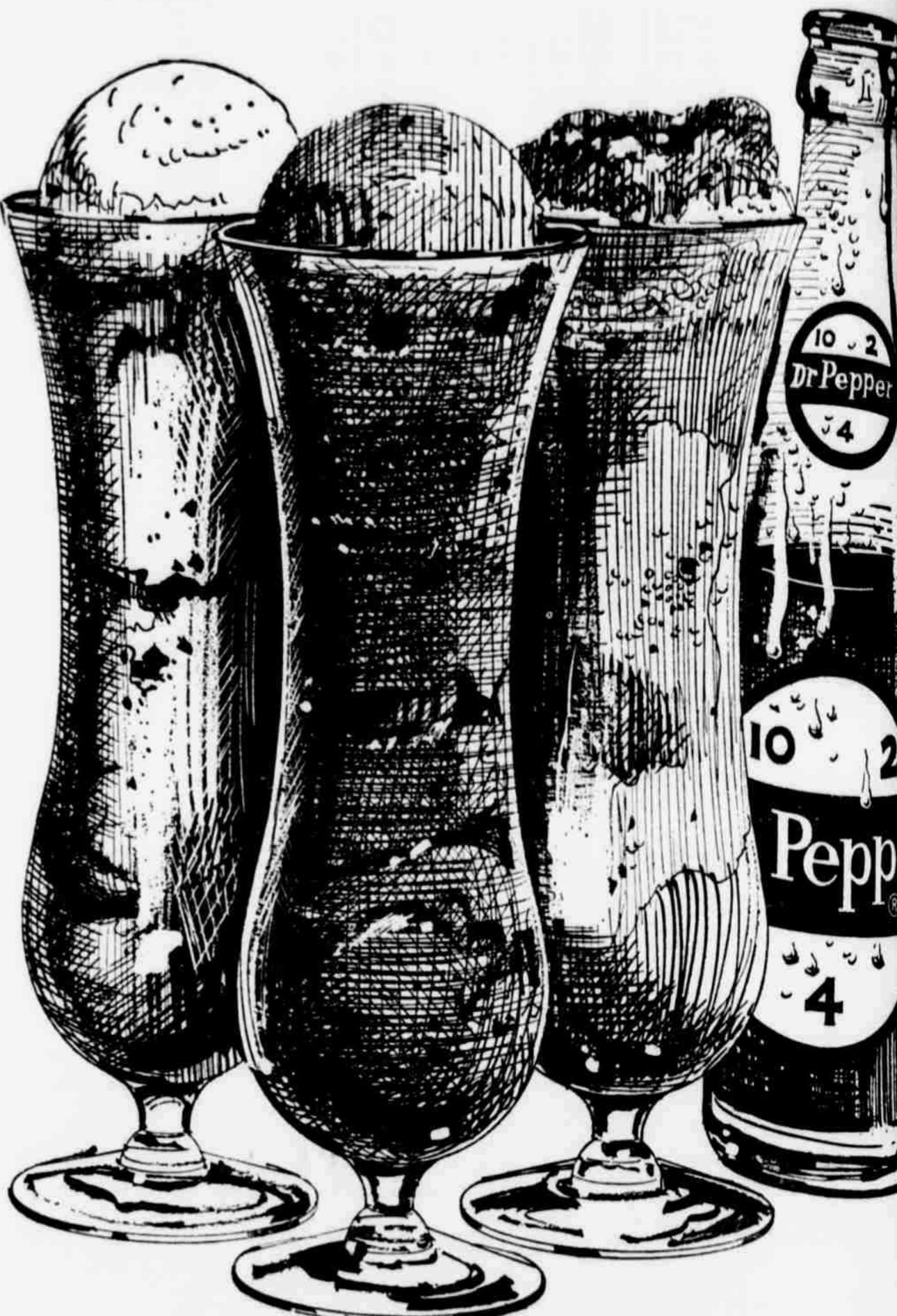

### OIL NOTES

A Strawn Sand discovery has been completed 16 miles south-east of Haskell in Haskell County Regular Field.

The County has gained site for a new test well.

The discovery is Bartle & Bartle of Houston (formerly Robert G. Anderson of Abilene) No. 1 R. H. Cobb.

Location is 2,362 feet from the south and 350 feet from the west lines of Section 2, ETRR (G. V. Cobb) Survey.

Daily potential was 26.58 barrels of 40.3 gravity oil, plus 10 per cent water.

It is pumping from 24 perforations at 4,443-50 and at 4,518-28 feet, treated with 500 gallons of acid. The 4 1/2 inch casing is set at 4,547 feet and the hole bottomed at 4,450 feet.

Thomas D. Humphrey Oil Properties Ltd., of Dallas, No. 3 N. L. Everett is a planned 3,000-foot rotary wildcat for the area five miles north of Stamford.

Drill site is 1,850 feet from the north and 1,150 feet from the west lines of J. G. Smith Survey 61.

Location is 1,550 feet south-east of their No. 1 Everett, a producer from 4,551-59 feet opposite the Strawn Sand.

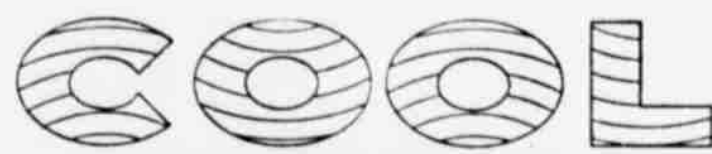

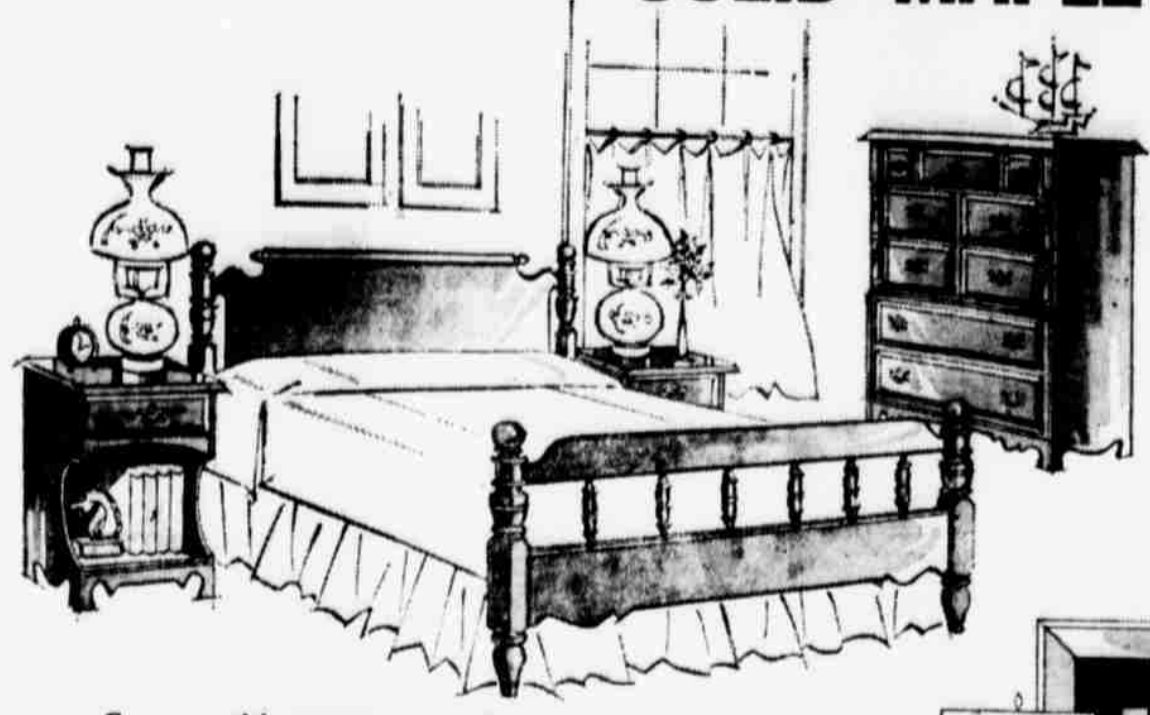

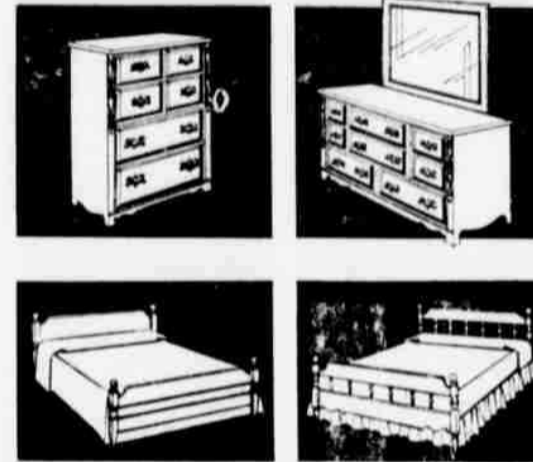

Today's Indians Extend Hand Of Friendship To Summer Vacationists

Nobody speaks with a forked tongue about today's Indians. At least not if they're talking about the progress many tribes are making in attracting tourists to their reservations during the summer. The Bureau of Indian Affairs has even launched a program with the theme: "See America first with the first Americans," the idea being to get you to stop by at a reservation on your way to or from your vacation jaunt.

They — the Indians, that is — have even got Dan "Boss Cartwright" Blocker of the NBC-TV Bonanza show to do a mess of spots for them on radio and TV. "Many reservations are areas of unspoiled, scenic beauty" says Dan, "and they offer some of the finest recreation spots in the country. Fishing, especially, is outstanding. Take the State of Minnesota, for example: one of the areas that Blocker mentions in his radio spots. On the Greater Leech Lake Reservation, in North Central Minnesota, there are almost 25 thousand acres belonging to the Chippewa Indians. It's one of the finest recreational areas in the State with many tourist camps and resorts and plenty of fishing area."

At White Earth Reservation, the Chippewa have an additional 56 thousand acres in the western part of the State, featuring an annual Indian Pow Wow in June, and boating, hunting, fishing and swimming all summer long.

In northern Minnesota, along the lower Red Lake and about 30 miles north of the town of Bemidji, there's the beautiful Red Lake Reservation of over 564 thousand acres, populated by 2,900 Chippewa Indians. You'll see Indian owned fishing and logging industry here, interesting examples of Indian art, and there's plenty of fishing in the many lakes and streams all around the area for trout and the famous northern pike.

The Bureau of Indian Affairs says that facilities on Indian res-

ervations can range from some very fancy ones, complete with lodging, swimming pools and hot baths, to simple trails through wooded forests. If you like to rough it, there are still places where you can blaze a trail. If you like comforts with your out-of-doors enjoyment, you're not limited in your choice, either. If you tarry, you can expect to drop a little wampum for hand-crafts, a fishing license or a guide. A letter to the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Washington, D. C. will get you a list of the 25 States with federally administered reservations and a free map of those areas.

As, Dan Blocker says: "When you take a vacation in Indian territory today, you're going to see some beautiful scenery, get in some good fishing, relive historical moments, and at the same time you're helping these Americans help themselves, economically."

## The Good Earth

by MRS. B. F. COBB

Mrs. J. H. Strain is trying her luck with organic gardening this year. A four-inch layer of cotton burs was spread over the growing area of their yard.

There are absolutely no weeds where the burs completely cover the top of the soil. Mrs. Strain dug the burs away from her plants until they got a good start toward growing. Many plants that re-seed themselves year after year, were lost in the process, but the saving on moisture, the future fertility of the soil and the care-free weedless gardening will all pay off. The plants that are growing this organic way are dark green and healthy. Tomato vines are loaded with green fruit, petunias are covered with blossoms.

If we have anything like normal rainfall, the burs should be broken down into rich soil by next spring and Mrs. Strain can resume her normal way of gardening. The soil should be dark and porous.

Pink and orange cannas in this organic garden have dark green foliage and large clusters of brilliant blossoms.

The Strains take great pride in their huge pecan trees. There are three varieties surrounding their place... Mississippi Giant, Eastern Sly and Stewert. In spite of the hail this spring, the trees have large clusters of nuts on them.

The Strains house is landscaped with beautiful shrubbery from Florida, some whose names I am not familiar with. But those I do know are photinia, wegelia, Florida Holly and Blue Spruce.

Watermelon red crepe myrtle with huge spikes of blossoms, compliment the house on the south side. Shrubs march down the west side of the house. The lawn is a dark green carpet.

Mrs. Strain planted a hedge running north and south to give privacy to their back yard. The large pecan trees make it a shady retreat.

Mrs. Strain says she has used very little wear since the application of the burs. Truly she is mulching her garden in a big way.

I've found out how to get most of your roses to live; plant them in a space much too small, thinking "Oh, well, they won't live anyway"; and then regret not preparing a larger bed when all but one plant lives. We have had eight blossoms from our bare root plants we planted along the first of June. We set out 12 bushes where only eight should have been set; thinking only three or

four would live and every plant but one has put out and three have already bloomed.

Haskell Garden Club members do not forget to plant annuals for the fall show.
