The budget for 1966 - 67, as presented by Evans, calls for estimated expenditures of \$1,-432,823. This amount includes \$59,989 for administration. \$998,343 for instruction, \$30,-415 for transportation, \$106,-080 for operation, \$79,810 for maintenance of plant, \$12,260 pay the \$50 immediately, the for fixed charges, \$10,465 for airmen paid an initial \$10 and are completing their donation student body activities, \$35,-917 for capital outlay and \$60,-721 for debt service.

The budget anticipates totai revenues of \$1,511,830, of which \$195,005 would be from local taxes, \$816,824 from state appointment, \$449,913 from federal sources and \$88 from county sources.

Revenue from federal sources includes \$298,583 for maintenance and operation, \$62,370 head-start projects and for \$138,960 for National Youth Corps program.

The tax rate will remain at \$1.50. The Burkburnett Independent School District has an assessed valuation of \$12,834,-100.

An estimated athletic budget of \$18,000, also was approved, the largest anticipated expenditure being \$7,000 for new equipment.







"Quick enactment" of federal gun-control laws has again been urged by President Johnson in the immediate aftermath of a shooting in his home state. The object, so he said, is to "help prevent the wrong persons from obtaining firearms." There's no denying that the wild spree of an apparently demented gunman at Texas University was grim and sorrowful event. But by what stretch of whose imagination can it therefore be concluded that a federal laws covering the sale of rifles, shotguns and handguns would have prevented it, or that passage of such a law now will really prevent similar tragedies in the future?

The primarily emotional character of this new surge "anti-gun" activity - in other places besides the White House — is demonstrated by both the similarities to and differences from that which followed the assassination of President Kennedy in Mr. Johnson's home state three years ago. The chief target, or focal point of the anti-gun crusaders then was "mail-order guns. (Remember all those pictures and cartoons?) This time the picture is of several weapons and the comments generally stress the fact that the sniper had veritable arsenal with him; without nearly so much emphasis on how he obtained the weapons. Which really proves, when logic prevails over emotion, that how or from whom a gun is obtained has nothing at all to do with how or to what purpose it will be used.

Policyholder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance 277 Park Ave., N.Y., N.Y., 10017

Q. What kind of life insurance program would you recommend for my son, who is a young man of average means, just graduating from high school and planning to go on to college? I'd like to get him started on a program he could add to later on

A. Your letter indicates that your son does not have any particular financial responsibilities right now. But life insurance bought at this stage of life will give him the advantage of the low premium rates available at younger ages.

As a general rule, the best allaround policy for a young man In your son's situation would be a straight life plan, providing lifelong coverage at no increase in premiums as he gets older. It probably should include a "guaranteed insurability "provision, under which he could buy additional insurance later on at standard premium rates based on his age then, regardless of whether he was still insurable.

While your son's insurance needs may not be unusual or



complex, there are certainly some individual factors to consider.

For example, you will likely have to meet heavy additional expenses during his college years. If his education depends on the continuation of your income, then perhaps your own insurance should be reexamined. It might even be wise to forego insuring your son right now in order to increase your own coverage.

A life insurance agent can give you more specific advice right now, as well as later on when insurance needs increase.

Q. I am 35 years old, married, with two young children, I earn \$10,000 a year, have \$20,000 group and \$30,000 individual life insurance. Is that enough?

A. Experts in financial planning say that, as a general rule of thumb, families usually should have enough life insurance to cover at least four-to-five times their annual income. But this would not be nearly enough for some families. Other families might need less protection.

To erect an attractive and serviceable fence, build a framework of 2 by 4 or 4 by 4 lumber that has been treated with wood preservative for protection against termites and moisture. Sink posts into concrete at eight-foot intervals and frame with treated 2 by 2 or 2 by 4 lumber.

Nail strips of tempered hardboard or 4-by-8foot panels of hardboard exterior siding to the frame using rust-proof nails. The hardboard, which is engineered and tempered for strength, resists scuffing, cracks and dents. It also is moisture resistant to withstand the abuse of all weather conditions. 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



One of the first and most famous uses was for masts and decks of the early fleet of fighting frigates.

The species successively served in the War of the American Revolution, the War of 1812, the War Between the States, the Spanish - American War, World Wars I and II, Korea and now Viet Nam.

During World War II, an amazing 20 billion board feet of Southern Pine lumber moved to the armed forces. Timbers, heavy planking and decking went into the construction of ships, barges and PT boats. Dunnage requirements were enormous as was the demand for boxing and crating. Lumber built the landing craft and port facilities for invasion points and helped restore devastated areas. It was also used for munition plants, barracks, ship repair, field hospitals and scores of other war necessities.

The Southern Pine Association coordinated the flow and received the top award of American Trade Association Executives for outstanding achievement by industry during the war years, 1943-44
