

It has the responsibility of screening applicants, recommending loans and the counseling and training of applicants and those who receive loans. While the SBA office, Lubbock, makes the final decision on loans, its decision is largely based on the recommendation and justification sub-mitted by the S.B.D.C. In the past year the Aspermont office has sought to carry out these responsibilities by making known the program to the peo-ple it is intended to help in the communities.

> "Seward," which lasted nearly the entire month of October was an operation with a dual mission: to insure the Vietnamese protection as they reaped their crops, and to deny the rice to the Viet Cong.

Over 12,000 "sorties" were flown by the battalion's pilots as they pushed the VC further away from the farmers who harvested 25,000 tons of rice, which they will keep this year.

Pvt. Hatfield, a member of the battalion's 394th Transportation Detachment, entered the Army in January 1966 and arrived overseas in July. He completed basic training at Fort Polk, La.

The 1962 Rochester High School graduate was a horse trainer with the 6666 Ranch in Guthrie before entering Army.



### Wars And Rumors of Wars

Let's see-there is war in Viet Nam, a War on Poverty at home, war between the sexes, war on ignorance and war on half a dozen other calamaties you could name. Then there is the war on a germ so tiny that 18,000 of its kind wouldn't be crowded on a pinhead-the tuberculosis bacillus. Indeed, on most given Tuesdays and Thursdays of the year, the Staffroom at McKnight State TB Hospital resembles a Command Post easily, where strategy is planned and evaluated by the doctors for battles fought in people's lungs.

Since the early 1950s the nature of TB treatment has changed because of the effective use of three principal drugs: Streptomycin, Para-aminosalicylic acid (PAS) and Isoniazid (INH). Streptomycin was discovered in 1944, PAS in 1948, INH in 1952, Only in combinations with each other are these anti-tuberculosis drugs making a radical change in the course of the illness. No longer must we think in terms of bed-ridden years for the healing process, but rather months with controlled activity, are more the order of the usual. However, for the bread-winner of the family or the mother who must leave husband and children for several months, the diagnosis of TB still spells disaster. Much help becomes an immediate need. In the case of a father-how will the living be earned; in the case of a mother-how will the children be cared for. The local TB Association concerns itself with these needs. The local TB Association also supports the research and development of drugs with which to fight the hideous little germ.

Perhaps most important of all, the Tuberculosis Association provides the funds for public X-Rays and skin tests for the seeking out and bringing to light this common enemy. Early detection of the disease makes for shorter periods of illness and recovery as well as reduces the spread of the germ to others. Hopefully soon, research will find the way by which we may be innoculated against TB as we now are against Smallpox or Diptheria. Meantime, the war is declared on the Tuberculosis germ. To use President Johnson's quote in Viet Nam: "The war is not over, but the tide has turned in our favor !" So, join the battle by supporting this year's Christmas Seal campaign sponsored by our local TB Association.

Officials of USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service said the referendum will be conducted by mail ballot through county ASCS offices in conjunction with the upland cotton marketing quota referendum, but in a eparate ballot.

Approval by two-thirds of the producers voting, or by a majority of producers voting if that majority accounts for twothirds of the cotton represented in the referendum, is necessary for the order to become effective.

Today's announcement followed USDA's final decisions of the provisions to be included in the proposed order and on the regulations to be used for the referendum.

The proposed cotton research and promotion program would be administered by a Cotton Board composed of members nominated by cotton producing organizations and selected by the Secretary of Agriculture. The program would be fin-

anced through assessments of \$1.00 per bale from upland cotton producers, to be collected by cotton handlers designated the Cotton Board. Collections from any producer who did not wish to contribute did. would be refunded upon written application. Assessment would start at the beginning of the ginning season for the 1967



Dr. David Norton, junior college examiner of the Coordinating Board of the Texas College and University system, told the group that the requirements for setting up a junior college in an area are \$12.5 million in valuation and 7,000 scholastic units.

"In West Texas, you have enough money," he said, "but not enough children." He said each county could qualify in scholastic units. Therefore, it would take all five counties for the necessary requirements in this area.

Norton said the first step would be to appoint a steering committee and from that group present a survey of the area, telling of the needs for a junior college. The next step would be to present a petition to the State Coordinating Board signed by 10 per cent of the qualified taxpayers who are registered voters.

Following the petition, the co-ordinating board would study the request and then hold public meetings, he said.

If the junior college committee of the board saw a need for a junior college, it would recommend that one be established. Then an election would be called in the counties involved to set up a junior college district.

Norton noted that a junior college district is worthless un-less the voters decide on a tax to support it.

The junior college would be controlled by the district boards elected by the voters of the districts.
