



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

PASSED AND APPROVED

Some interesting facts regarding the public interest in national labor law reform came to light when Local 1264, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, recently went on strike at WALA-TV, Mobile, Alabama.

The union leaders urged the station's advertisers, both local and national, to withdraw their advertising. H. Ray McGuire, manager of the station, estimates that between \$150,000 and \$250,000 worth of advertising was lost by this pressure during the strike which lasted more than a year

Local retailers, who handled some of the products for which national advertising went off the air, continued to advertise throughout the strike, and apparently benefited. Even locol institutions particularly sensitive to local public opinion, such as banks, and savings and loan assocations, continued their advertising over the station.

These local industries and institutions defied the boycott, and even the smallest and most vulnerable local businesses survived its terrors. This outpouring of public support may be another indication that the public is ready for national labor law reform. A recent public opinion survey by Opinion Research Corporation showed that the public has never shown a greater interest and concern across the board for labor matters than it does today. The time for labor law reform is now!

**Close Up Public Records?** 

When the United States became the "Land of the Free" so many years ago, the Founding Fathers decided on a pretty good method of keeping it that way. They insured that all public records would be open to the public -period. No extra special breed of person hal any kind of fancy rights that any of the rest of didn't have. Information on births, deaths, land rights, marriages-whatever was needed to insure public order was right there where every citizen could look it over. No secrets.

But now the bureaucrats seem to think that too much information about ourselves may be bad for us. There's a big move on in a number of places to close up the public records letting only the privileged few have a peek at them when somebody with a title says it's all right.

The idea behind it seems to be that by hiding all information, the state can protect us from direct mail firms who provide information on new products, new services, new industrial techniques.

When someone starts "protecting" us by locking up the public records-for whatever purported reasonbeware! To give someone the right to say what part of the public record will be revealed and what will be hidden is giving away part of your American birthright.

When someone decides to shut up sources of public information-for our own good-we're in trouble. Watch put!

You may find that you have overlapping insurance in some areas of coverage and not enough in another. If this is the case, your insurance man will help you tailor your family policy to augment your group coverage. You probably will save some premium dollars here. You might want to consider putting the money toward a disability income policy which would pay you straight cash when you are disabled - money you can use o pay ordinary living expenses while your health expense programs pay the hospital-medical




