Keeping the public informed of modern agricultural processes has become a major

Recently, Congressman Jamie L. Whitten in an Address before the National Agricultural Chemicals Association drew attention to the need of public understanding of pesticides and pesticide residues and the necessity of reaching an agreement between nations, particularly between the United States and countries of western Europe, upon pesticide tolerances. Testing methods of such sensitiveness have been developed as to permit identification of pesticide residues at a level of parts in a trillion - so infinitesimal as to be beyond human comprehension. Present testing methods make "no residue" requirements utterly unrealistic. Therefore, in the opinion of Congressman Whitten ,nations must agree upon what are safe tolerances and must reach an understanding in order that trade between nations shall not be needlessly incumbered and people threatened with critical shortages of wholesome foods.

Everything we eat has faint traces of innumerable chemicals - put there by nature. Man-made pesticides are just another chemical applied to help grow our food. A few years ago, the analysis techniques of the time could not detect these harmless traces. But now, the laboratory can isolate the minutest indication of any substance in our food. Thus, laws that say "no residue" are impossible to comply with and can simply result in the total prohibition of scientific pesticide application even though soaring food requirements make pesticide use mandatory. This truth must be brought home to peoples of all nations if mass starvation is to be avoided.

The Federal Power Commission recommended to Congress against federal recapture of Pacific Gas and Electric Company's 60,000 kilowat Bucks Creek project in California. The project's license expires at the end of this year. The commission found that available facts support the continued operation of the Bucks Creek project by a licensee obtaining its authority from this com-

Current estimates show that one-fourth of the new world oil and gas reserves will be found offshore. The staggering expense of offshore operations has brought a demand for improved technology. These observations were made at the 42nd Annual Fall Meeting of the Society of Petroleum Engineers.

Users of LSD may be risking birth defects in their children and grandchildren, warned Virginia Apgar, M. D., director of basic research for the National Foundation March of Dimes. They also may be exposing themselves to an increased risk of cancer and early aging.

The motorcycle, motorscooter, and motor bike fad is taking its full toll in accidental deaths. The Metropolitan Life Insurance Company reports that deaths from these vehicles rose by a third in the year 1965 (most recent figures available). Motorcycles accounted for the largest number of fatalities by far.

Oregon State University food marketing specialists' statisics show that consumers spent an average of 18 per cent of their take home pay for food in 1966, but in 1967 that figure will drop to 17.5 per cent, indicating that wage and salary increases are rising at a comparatively more rapid rate.

MODERN VINYL TREE HARKS BACK TO OLDEN DAYS



Contemporary man-made American Christmas trees are direct descendants of the very first evergreens from the forests of Germany, ever decorated for that joyous feast day. Begun in the middle ages, the custom of decorating Christmas trees took hold in Germany in the 16th century. Lighted tapers and fruits and cookies were placed on the early Christmas trees. Q. I'm in the process now of investigating all the ins and outs of buying or building a home for my family. Could you tell me about insurance for my mort-

A. The mortgage life insurance plan involving the least cost out-lay is the reducing term insurance policy. Many families however, prefer the straight life plan for its flexibility, as it (1) pays the mort-gage in full in case of death; (2)



can help prepay the mortgage earlier than scheduled; (3) builds up values which can be used to cover a mortgage payment in case of need; (4) is a policy which can be used to meet some other family goal when the mortgage is paid off.

Q. Are death payments under a life insurance policy subject to income tax?

A. All life insurance death proceeds paid in a lump sum are exempt from income tax unless the policy was sold or transferred for some valuable consideration. If the proceeds are left with the life insurance company at interest or paid as income, the interest portion is reportable as income—but not the principal sum of the policy.

### The Embarrassed Liberals

THE recent Israeli-Arab war has embarrassed our socalled liberals in America to a degree unparal-

A. Accredited camps, such as those belonging to the American Camping Association, are required to carry group health insurance for campers. In most instances, youngsters are insured while on the camp premises or elsewhere when in the care and



custody of the camp. They are also covered while traveling to and from summer camp. Accredited camps are also well equipped with an infirmary, and a physician or a registered nurse is readily available at all times. In choosing a camp for your children, be sure to look into its health set-up. Remember, too, that your own family health insurance undoubtedly covers your children anywhere they may be.

Q. After being self-employed for many years, I will soon be joining a firm which provides group insurance to its employees at no cost. Is this possible? at no cost. Is this possible

A. Not only possible, but very common. In a survey of new group health plans provided by insurance companies, the Health insurance Institute found that 46 per cent of the employees in this per cent of the employees in this survey had the cost of their coverage paid for entirely by the employer, while 54 per cent paid a part. A fraction of one per cent paid the full cost of their own protection.
