A New Concept Looms

A "ho hum" and a yawn is how some may react to the fact that new goals for Texas public school education have been suggested. Things like this have no apparent dramatic thunder.

But the new goals could very likely have substantial effect on the lives and fortunes of many future Texas citizens and of children in the lower grades of Texas public schools today.

The suggested new goals come from a committee many Texans are not aware is in existence. It is the Governor's Committee on Public School Education, a group of 15 citizens charged with the task of conducting an inquiry into every facet of the schools and the educational programs offered by our state-wide system of free public education.

In two years the committee will have completed its work and will make suggestions for improvements in the schools to the governor and the Legislature. There is reason enough already to forecast that the changes the committee suggests will be broad...so broad, in fact, as to truly spark sweeping changes in both the schools and the methods of school support, taxes especially.

The goals suggested so far are still subject to modification or addition before they are put into final form and submitted to the Legislature for adoption. But what has been suggested thus far seems to indicate that the committee is on the track toward perhaps revolutionary concepts.

Around these goals new programs will be developed and programs re-evaluated, changed or dropped from the curriculum. One change the committee apparently is considering is the role of our high schools now fulfill.

One of the goals states: "The public schools should provide every student with usable vocation skills which will equip him to find employment in the event he finds it impracticable to continue his education."

In other words, the committee seems to be saying, there should be a line drawn between a high school program that offers only preparation for future education beyond the high school and a program that offers heavy emphasis on vocational training with the more or less tacit understanding that students in vocational high schools are not going to college.

The goals suggest that there should be a marriage of the two programs in all high schools so that if the student doesn't go on to college he can go on the labor market with a usable skill.

A program in the high schools that would at once prepare any student for college entrance or entrance immediately upon graduation into the job market would mean a major departure from our present system of high school education.

With possibilities such as this being forecast the new goals that seem to be in the future for Texas schools do indeed take on dramatic context.

For, all sorts of things are suggested by these goals. For one, it is logical to expect the state and the local community, in addition, probably, the federal government will be asked to take a greater role in financial support of the schools in order to make new changes possible.

Secondly, traditional concepts may have to be scrapped as our thinking about the role of public education begins to more accurately reflect the changing nature of our lives and society.

The Governor's Committee on Public School Education, especially on the sub-committee on goals, has shown an apparent willingness to wade bravely in the deep waters of change.

If the committee's final suggestions are cut from the same fabric the question then will be whether the public is willing to submit itself to a true revolution in public school education.

Barnett Tells Of His Flight To Viet Nam

The following letter was received this past week from Don E. Barnett in Vietnam by his mother, Mrs. Allie Ford, and sister, Maydell Featherston of Haskell.

"I sure was glad to get your letter. You mailed it on the 3rd and I received it on the 13th. That's pretty good. Although it comes air mail, it has to change planes three times before it gets here.

"We had a marvelous trip over. I was lucky and get a Commercial Flight. It was a United Airlines 4-jet DC-8. It took us 18 hours. We departed Travis Air Force Base at San Francisco, landed at Honolulu and stayed there for an hour; then landed at Clark AFB in the Philippines for two hours and came on over to Viet Nam and landed at Ben Hoa and processed into the country at a place called Long Bink, about

15 miles out of Saigon. Then we took that 15-mile ride by jeep into the Air Base at Saigon. We went right through the middle of town during the noon hour. Just imagine a city about the size of Wichita Falls, with a population of over a million, sitting on the bank of a river about the size of Mississippi... and that's Saigon.

"When you drive you compete with people (who think nothing of walking in the street) bicycles, motor bikes, motorcycles, horse drawn carts, cars and big military trucks, plus narrow streets. Would you believe, it's very interesting and highly educational!"

TAKES PART IN ROAD OPENING IN VIETNAM

Army Staff Sergeant Charles Bohannon, whose mother, Mrs. Bernice L. Martin and wife, Mattie, live at 908 S. Ferguson St., Stamford, last month took part in the opening of an 80-mile stretch of Vietnam Highway QL-1 that had been closed for 10 years because of Viet Cong terrorist activities.

Sgt. Bohannon, a platoon sergeant in Company A, of the 18th Engineer Brigade's 19th Battalion located in Qui Nhon, and his unit concentrated on building and repairing bridges, filling ruts in the road and sweeping for mines.

and many flower seed can be started in flats now, so that there will be plenty of plants in case of hail. Nurseries have bedding plants for those who prefer to buy instead of planting seed.

Remember that we have only a few more weeks to transplant trees and shrubs. Trees and shrubs can be bought so cheap at the nurseries now that it is a good time to get the favorite you have wanted so long, but hesitated because of the cost.

Rose bushes should be pruned within the next two weeks. I prefer to prune my bushes 18 inches from the ground, rather than to prune them too severely. Do not forget to paint scars with tree paint to keep out borers.

As the days become warmer we will all be busy cleaning up the winter trash brought in with blustery winds. This is a good time to help a neighbor clean up a vacant lot. If every one would keep their vacant lots as clean as does Mrs. Dennis Ratliff, Haskell would be a much prettier place in which to live. Mrs. Ratliff not only has planted pretty trees and shrubs on their vacant lot, she has, just the past year, established a bermuda grass lawn. Mrs. Ratliff used to have the lot plowed two or three times a year. With the establishing of a lawn, the lot will really be a showplace of Haskell.

Mrs. C. B. Rhea, a member of the Haskell Garden Club, has been working in her flower beds for two or three weeks. She makes piles of rich black compost that she applies to her garden each spring. The flowers Mrs. Rhea raises are living proof of the good that compost can do for a yard.

A vegetable garden will help put fresh products on the table, as well as to help keep soaring food prices down.

We are still using peas, tomatoes and beans that we froze two years ago. I washed the tomatoes and put them in plastic sacks. When they are needed for eating, all one does is turn hot water on them for a minute, peel and use as fresh.

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
