Would you like to make nice looking clothes for yourself and your children and spend little or no money? Homemakers living in the Burk area will have the opportunity to do this very thing at the Burk Community Service Center.

Thelma Wirges, Wichita County Home Demonstration Agent, will teach the group in a workshop to plan and construct "makeovers." Clothing is available

at the center, so with very few supplies, and little equipment, each participant can leave with a new garment.

Women's dresses and skirts, men's shirts and slacks can be made into clothes for girls and boys. With a little imagination they can be made into something new for an adult. Often times a few simple alterations are all they need.

Miss Wirges will also stress the forgotten art of mending. No longer is a patch over the worn spot the only answer. There is such a thing as preventative mending and then there is imaginative mending.

The increasing interest in home sewing has created a need for simple, time-saving, yet satisfactory methods of making and remaking clothing. Specific methods will be taught, as each participant works on one or more arguments.

## Texas Electric To Sponsor Local Student At Event

Bill Vincent, manager of Texas Electric Service Company, announced today that an outstanding high school student from Burkburnett high school will be sponsored by the company to attend the ninth annual Texas Nuclear Science Symposium for High Schools to be held in Austin June 3-6.

A teacher will accompany the student, also under the sponsorship of the electric company.

The four-day symposium is held on the campus of the University of Texas and is co-sponsored by the university and the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation. Texas Electric Service Company and nine other investor-owned electric utility companies in Texas compose the foundation, which is supporting the research at the university in controlling nuclear fusion reaction as a future source of energy supply for generation of electric power.

Some 500 students and teachers from throughout Texas will attend the symposium. The program will include a number of outstanding speakers from science, industry and education, and the delegates will spend two afternoons touring the science laboratories at the university.

"We believe that those students selected to attend by their schools will find participation in the symposium a most educational, interesting and eventual experience, and we are pleased to be able to offer them this opportunity," Vincent said.

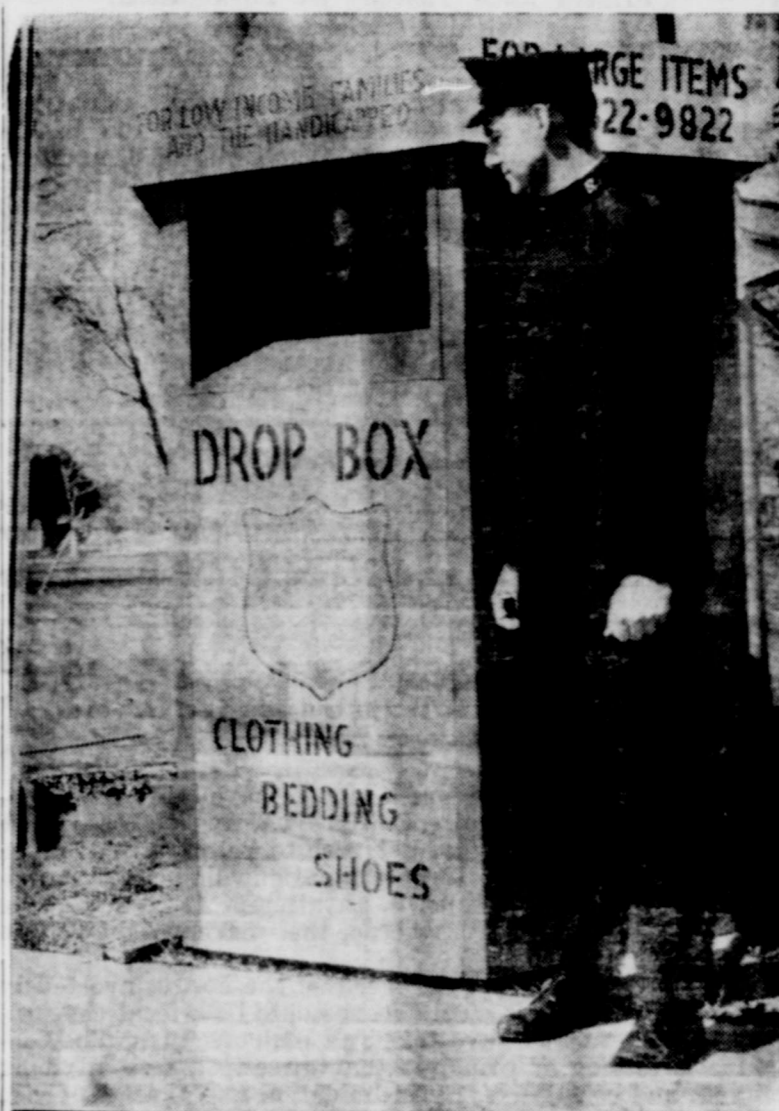

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## Will Coercion Be Legalized?

From time to time, press reports have told of the continuing effort to organize California grape pickers. Since the pickers apparently do not wish to be organized, union pressure has taken the form of a nationwide boycott against California table grapes in an attempt to coerce grape owners to sign contracts whether the workers want to join a union or not.

Wholly aside from the merit of the issues involved in the dispute, which it would seem would be a local concern, the boycott tactics have taken an ominous turn. They involve questions of principle that directly affect all merchants and consumers. By intimidation and threats of violence, the boycotters are endeavoring to force merchants to remove grapes from the marketplace. A retailer, hundreds of miles from California grape fields, may find his place of business under attack and his customers driven away if he refuses to accede to the wishes of the boycotters. He is forced to take sides, irrespective of his convictions and his right to carry on his business as he thinks best.

By forcing removal of an item from store shelves, boycotters are also depriving consumers of freedom of choice and the right to judge for themselves by their patronage the wisdom of a merchant's merchandising policies. If nationwide coercion of consumers and merchants works in the case of attempts to organize grape pickers, there is little question but that the same kind of coercion will be applied elsewhere. It is an intolerable prospect.

## FACT AND OPINION

A booklet of facts and figures of the electric utility industry, just released by the Edison Electric Institute, shows that the United States, with only six per cent of the world's population, continues to lead all other countries in the production of electricity. In 1967, U.S. production exceeded 1.3 trillion kilowatt-hours. In comparison with second ranking Russia, U.S. production was almost two and one-half times the Soviet total.

Economist George Hagedorn noted that, "The 10 per cent surcharge on corporate and individual income taxes, imposed on us by a law passed last June, is scheduled to terminate June 30, 1969. The next Congress will, of course, be free to pass additional legislation extending its life beyond that point. More and more, the assumption is becoming prevalent that Congress will probably do so . . . we all know what can happen when we fall into the habit of renewing, year after year, what had started out as a 'temporary' tax increase. The Korean War increase in the corporate tax rate was still in effect a decade after that war ended."

## ELECTION ORDER

WHEREAS on the 13th day of February, 1969, petitions were filed with me by more than twenty qualified voters of the Burkburnett Independent School District and more than twenty qualified voters of the Friberg Common School District, Number 20, praying for the consolidation of such districts for school purposes, and said districts constituting as a whole one continuous territory.

NOW, THEREFORE, in compliance with Article 2696 of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, I, Calvin Ashley, County Judge of Wichita County, Texas, do hereby order that on the 22nd day of March, 1969, elections be held in the Burkburnett Independent School District and in the Friberg Common School District, Number 20, to determine whether or not the said school districts shall be consolidated for school purposes.

It is further ordered by the Court that:

1. The election shall be held at the following voting places:
  - a. Burkburnett Independent School District election shall be held at the Burkburnett Junior High School, F. T. Felty, Presiding Judge and Mrs. C. M. Archer, as Alternate Presiding Judge.
  - b. Friberg Common School District Number 20 election shall be held at the Friberg School with W. T. Jenne as Presiding Judge and Loma Volmer as Alternate Presiding Judge. The officer in charge of the election is hereby authorized to appoint such election clerks as are necessary to conduct such election.
2. Voting hours shall be between the hours of 7:30 A.M. and 7:00 P.M.
3. That the official ballot shall have printed thereon the following:
  - ( ) For Consolidation
  - ( ) Against Consolidation
 Those who are in favor of the consolidation of the School districts will place an X in the box before the words "For Consolidation" and those who are opposed to the consolidation will place an X in the box before the words "Against Consolidation."
4. That a substantial copy of this order shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice of said election shall be given by posting a copy of this order at the City Hall in Burkburnett, Texas, and a copy at the Friberg School in Wichita County, Texas, at least 20 days prior to March 22, 1969, and further by causing a copy of said order to be published in a newspaper of general circulation published in Wichita County for at least 20 days prior to March 22, 1969.

## Doctor in the Kitchen®

### THE B VITAMINS

To discuss the B vitamins we will need to talk about eleven substances in the so-called vitamin B complex. Seven of these vitamins are essential in your diet. You need them daily. The other four are not necessarily essential in your diet. Two of these the body can form from other compounds. Research has not yet demonstrated that the last two are essential for humans. All are water-soluble, as is vitamin C.

**Romantic History**  
 The discovery of the B vitamins is quite romantic. A Dutch surgeon, in Java, observed that chickens died when they ate polished rice scraped from a military hospital commissary. They recovered from paralysis when he fed them natural rice, complete with the outer layers of hull removed when polished rice was milled. The disease suffered by the chickens, ducks and pigeons fed the polished rice seemed similar to a common and serious disease in man, called beriberi.

This was enough to eventually set other scientists to work until in 1926 the anti-beriberi vitamin was isolated and thus in the 1930's synthesized. This vitamin — vitamin B — was first thought to be a single substance. Later, research revealed how elaborate the B vitamin complex is.

**Seven Are Essential**  
 Of the eleven substances in the complex, the seven essential B vitamins are thiamin, riboflavin, niacin, pyridoxine, pantothenic acid, folic acid, and vitamin B12. The other four are choline, biotin, inositol and p-aminobenzoic acid. Thiamin or vitamin B1 as it is sometimes known, is the anti-beriberi vitamin. As we said earlier, the B vitamins and vitamin C are water soluble. For this reason, care must be exercised in cooking or you'll throw away

these vitamins when discarding the water in which they were cooked. Or if you overcook, you'll destroy these vitamins because they are readily broken down by heat in neutral or alkaline solutions.

Thiamin helps promote normal appetite and digestion. It helps keep the nervous system healthy and helps to prevent irritability. It also helps the body release energy from food. A very important vitamin, to say the least.

It is present in many foods but primarily so in only a few. Lean pork is one of the best foods for obtaining thiamin. Other meats, fish and poultry, eggs, enriched or whole grain breads and cereals, dried beans and peas, and finally, potatoes, broccoli, and collards are good sources.

### Riboflavin

Riboflavin or vitamin B2 is a water-soluble yellow pigment, importantly available in milk, all kinds of cheese, ice cream, meat (especially liver), fish, poultry, and eggs. Stable to heat, riboflavin content is not particularly reduced, for example, in milk by drying or pasteurizing but exposure to sunlight will destroy large portions of this vitamin. This is one reason nutritionists recommend you keep milk out of the sunlight.

What does riboflavin do for you? It helps the cells use oxygen. It helps keep your skin, tongue, and lips normal. It helps prevent scaly, greasy skin from forming around your mouth and nose. In animals, nutritionists say too little riboflavin during pregnancy may result in abnormalities or loss of the fetus. We don't know whether congenital defects in humans are due to inadequate riboflavin in the diet of the mother.

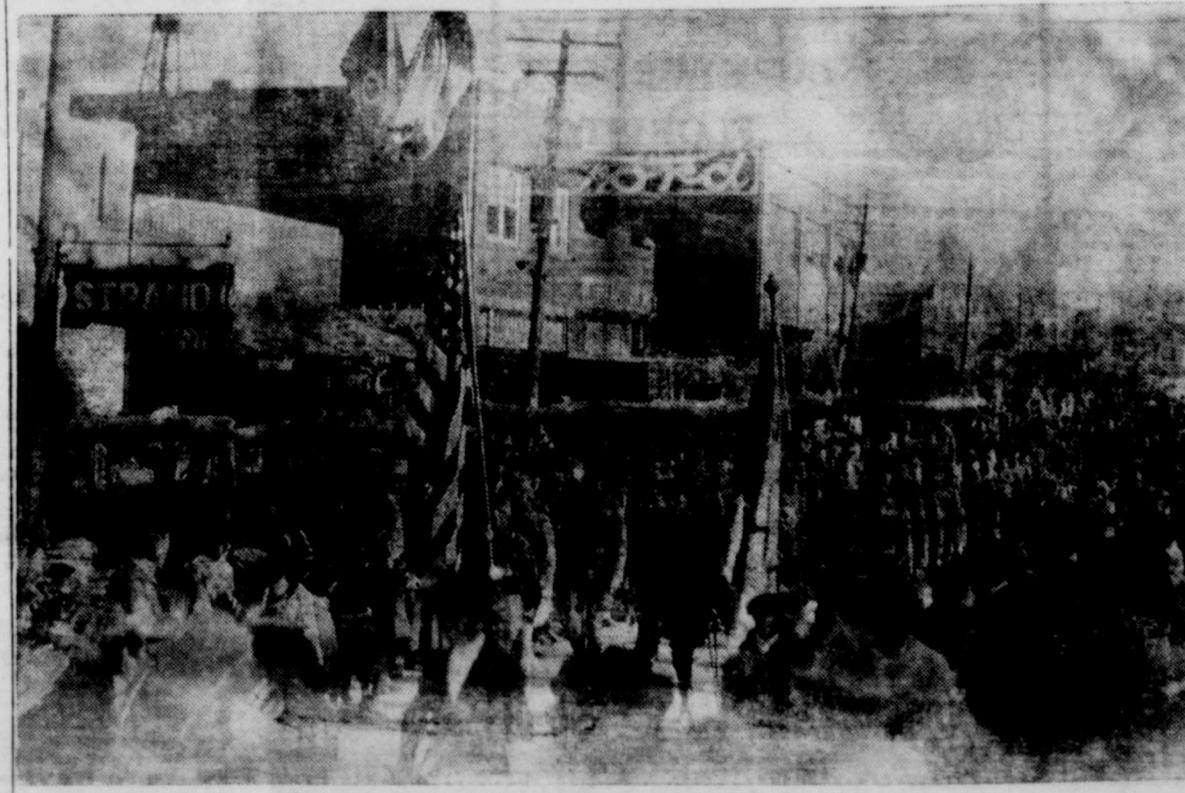

**New Slant in Offshore Drilling**



As many as 60 wells will be drilled from this single platform to be built in the Santa Barbara channel, Calif., by Sun Oil Co. — DX Division. The offshore platform features a tilted rig (see arrow) for drilling directional wells to shallow oil zones. Deep producing zones will be tapped by conventional drilling from the same offshore platform.

TULSA, OKLA. — The most modern methods of preventing water pollution while producing oil are being designed into the offshore platform which the DX Division of Sun Oil Co. will erect off the coast of Santa Barbara, Calif., this spring.

Instead of a forest of derricks, each with a potential for spilling oil, numerous wells will be drilled from a single platform to be built in 190-feet of water.

The structure, officially designated Platform Hillhouse, will be located on a tract leased from the Federal government last year for a bonus of more than \$38,000,000 by a four-company combine composed of Sunray DX, Superior, Marathon and Sun Oil companies. Since the original leasing, Sun and Sunray have merged, and the project is being operated by Sun's DX Division with offices in Tulsa, and Ventura, Calif.

As many as 48 deep holes and 22 shallow wells can be drilled and produced from the platform which will have a helicopter landing pad and emergency living accommodations for 14 men.
