### MU Receives Grant To Help In Retarded Study

WICHITA FALLS — Midwestern University's Department of Education has received a \$19,000 federal grant to prepare teachers to work with mentally retarded children.

The grant was awarded through the bureau of Education for the Handicapped of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW), Dr. Thomas B. Hill, chairman of the Department of Education, said.

It is the largest federal grant the Department of Education has received, he said.

"The new certification program being developed at Midwestern will serve undergraduate students in elementary education who have an interest in preparing to work with the mentally retarded," Dr. Hill continued.

Public school teachers who need additional college work to qualify for certification in special education will also be eligible to participate.

The new program will begin as soon as additional special education personnel can be added to the staff, perhaps during the 1969 summer term, Dr. Hill said.

Courses probably will be offered at night during the fall and spring, he said.

## WATCH YOUR ARITHMETIC

In this age of computers, many people are wondering whether their tax returns will be checked. The answer is 100 per cent affirmative. The former Commissioner of Internal Revenue says that every one of the 75 million separate returns will be subjected to computer surveillance. In addition, about 3 million returns will be selected for detailed audit. And, of course, the more money you make, the better your chance of receiving a visit from an Internal Revenue Service examiner. The former Commissioner stresses that the 65,000 employees of the Internal Revenue Service endeavor to be fair. Apparently, they are mindful that in the final analysis the majority of U.S. taxpayers recognize and willingly accept the obligation of citizens to pay taxes. Survival of the tax system and orderly government rests upon citizen cooperation. The penalties are reserved for a minority of violators.

Computerization may make tax collecting more efficient. But, it is unlikely that it will change to an important degree the need for citizen cooperation to make the tax system work. That is why taxes must be kept within the ability of people to pay and why officials have expressed fear of a taxpayer revolt in recent months. Taxes of all kinds are becoming excessive as the cost of government rises faster than productivity. Human brains, not electronic brains, are needed to solve the problem.

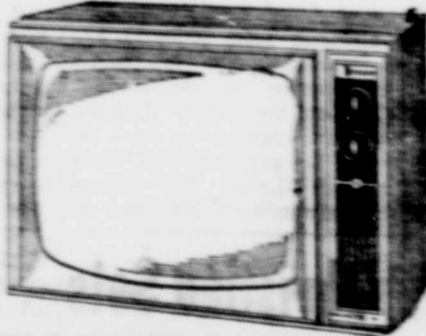

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## SENSING THE NEWS

The trouble at America's colleges and universities far from lessening, has worsened markedly in the last few months. Virtual guerrilla warfare is in progress at San Francisco State University, where teachers have been assaulted and bombs have been planted. At the Berkeley campus of the University of California, it has been necessary to keep a large contingent of riot police at the ready for a lengthy period.

But the highly publicized difficulties at these institutions is only a small part of the story. Trouble is taking place or brewing at a wide range of institutions' capital. Black separatist colleges to famous old universities.

One of the most fantastic developments is taking place at Federal City College in the nation's capital. Black separatists are in a majority on the faculty, and normal academic life has been twisted into weird patterns. The college has more than 30,000 books in its library, book circulation is running at only about \$0 a week, indicating that little studying is taking place. Professors who want to teach are looking for other jobs. New professors are being recruited, not on the basis of academic credentials but on their records of involvement with black power groups.

The nation's institutions of higher education are paying the price for years of permissiveness. Instead of cracking down on campus lawbreakers, college and university authorities have talked about establishing a "dialogue" with militant students. Naive administrators don't seem to realize that it is impossible to reason with anarchists and hoodlums. The word "hoodlum" is used advisedly, for some of the militants are raising student activities fee accounts in order to finance their revolutionary action on campus. Investigation is underway at San Francisco State University that may lead to prosecutions for grand larceny.

In a few places, college authorities are beginning to take the stern attitude that is needed. The president of Notre Dame University has warned that law-breaking student demonstrators will be given 15 minutes to "meditate" and change their ways. Otherwise they will be expelled. If colleges had expelled riotous students, instead of suspending them for a short time, the situation would not be out of hand. No college or university should be a privileged

sanctuary for anarchists and practitioners of civil disobedience.

In the case of the new Notre Dame policy, President Nixon hailed this policy as right and proper. Unfortunately, some college presidents and liberal commentators immediately criticized the President and Notre Dame. The Nixon Administration also has reported — and it is a highly encouraging development — that the Justice Department soon will take action against militant student agitators who cross state lines to foment riots. A sweeping investigation of campus militants is in order and overdue.

More than law is needed, however. What's essential is a reassertion of the rights and privileges of university authorities and a rebuke to self-important student radicals who presume to tell trustees and administrators what they should do. This kind of presumption was evident last month at the University of Virginia where something called the "Student Coalition" and a "human relations" chapter sought to dictate to the Board of Visitors a U. Va.

The leftist Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), in cooperation with the radical Southern Students Organizing Committee (SSOC), held a demonstration on the grounds of the university. Demonstrators presented a series of demands for removal of a member of the Board of Visitors, appointment of black faculty and administrators, and change in the university's pay scale for employees.

In short, the demonstrators made demands covering matters in which they have no competence or authority. The demonstration was followed up by emotional tirades in which it was said the "University of Virginia must prove itself to the black community." A member of the university board was termed "a piggish symbol of racism." The idea of a minority of radical dictating to the great university founded by Thomas Jefferson no doubt disgusts thinking people far beyond the borders of the Old Dominion. Such action is not confined to the University of Virginia; it is taking place nationwide.

A university is supposed to be a place of learning, where national and state traditions are respected and where civilized discussion is the rule. There is no place in a true university for those who shout or write abuse and who attempt to usurp lawful authority of trustees and

administrators. Students who can't behave like gentlemen should be denied the privilege of continued university attendance.

We are very proud of our coaching staff and the leadership that it is providing our young boys and girls in Junior and Senior High School.

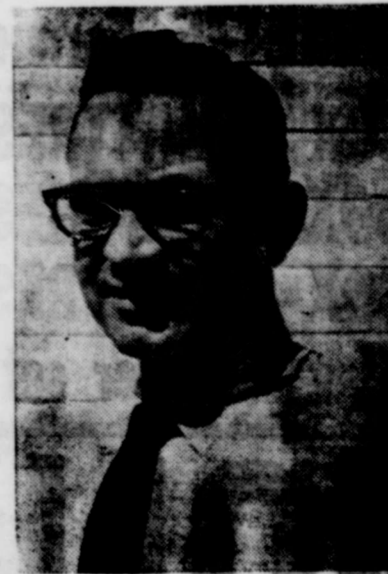

Policyholder Questions Answered by The Institute of Life Insurance, 277 Park Ave., N. Y., N. Y., 10017

**Q. I am the father of two teenage boys, ages 16 and 18. The oldest will be going to college in the fall and right now I'm a little worried about how I'm going to pay for it without some financial assistance. When I took out a \$25,000 straight life insurance policy several years ago, I recall something about being able to borrow against it for emergencies such as this. How does this work?**



**A. In many situations where family finances are tight, a life insurance policy comes to the rescue. It is possible, of course, to cash in your life insurance policy to help provide for your son's college education. In many cases, however, a loan of part or all of the cash value will serve the purpose as well or better. As long as you continue to pay the premiums and the interest on the loan, the policy will continue to be in effect. The loan may be repaid at any time—in one lump sum or in installments. This should be done as soon as convenient, since any loan or outstanding interest would be deducted from the proceeds if you should die.**

**Q. I am planning to take a year's leave of absence from my job while I study for a master's degree. Will my group life insurance cover me even though I'm not working?**

**A. Yes, you'll continue to be covered as long as your employer pays the premiums for you. Usually he is allowed to do this for employees who take a temporary break in service, including layoffs, sickness or a leave of absence. As long as your new position does not involve additional risk your employer should be able to continue your group insurance under his current plan.**

Runners-up for the "LaPetite" crown were Leslie Smiley and Melissa Adams.

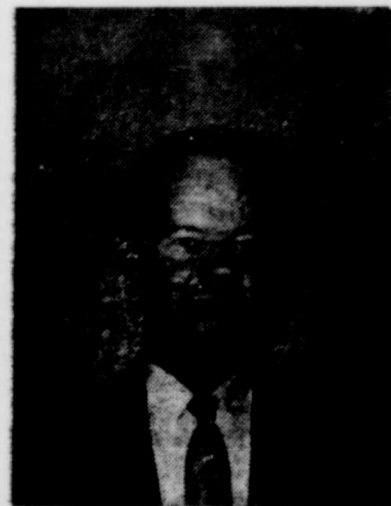

Many towns have helped increase the safety of bike riders by setting aside special bikeways along lightly-trafficked roads. There are some 6,300 miles of these in 32 states, leading the nation's 60 million cyclists to points of scenic, historic or recreational interest.

Cycling is one of America's most popular family pastimes, with adults and kids alike taking to their two-wheelers for fun, fitness and recreation. Bike riding has become America's #1 outdoor participation sport.

While bike sales soar — 6 million sold last year — accident fatalities dropped 7% in 1967 thanks partly to the safety of bikes and an annual safety cycling campaign by the Bicycle Institute of America.

Motorists see you better at night if you wear a pale shade of clothing that reflects light. The front light should be visible from 500 feet, the reflector from 300 feet.

For safe cycling, watch out for cars, not only in all four directions, but also keep your eyes peeled for cars pulling into traffic, and be careful of doors opening on parked cars.
