Burk Schools To Open — DRIVE CAREFULLY

Hundreds of children are headed back to school full of nervous excitement — but with little thought for safety. And so again, joining Burk law enforcement officials, the Burk News urges extra care during the first few weeks of school. Colorful announcements with the slogan "School's Open — Drive Carefully" are posted throughout Texas communities to remind parents and motorists of their responsibilities as school begins. Traffic accidents kill more children between one and fourteen years of age than any other cause. Because kindergarten and first grade youngsters, many on their own in traffic for the first time, suffer most of the school route injuries, the Burk Police Dept. suggests that parents walk with their children on the opening day of school, making sure that their children are familiar with traffic aids and regulations and use guarded crosswalks whenever possible.

Driving children to school only adds to the confusion around school areas, creating more hazardous conditions. Even though children should learn traffic rules, the major traffic responsibility consistently falls on the driver. The Burkburnett Police Dept. pleads with all drivers to help protect the lives of school children this year by driving with particular care everywhere children might be playing or crossing — and especially near school areas.

Legal Notice

ORDINANCE NO. 301
 AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE USE OF THE CITY'S DUMP GROUNDS; PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT:

SECTION 1: Any person using the City of Burkburnett dump ground, which may be maintained for refuse, shall place their trees, hedges, bushes, vines, refuse, or garbage in areas in said dump ground in accordance with signs maintained by the City of Burkburnett, or its employees and agents directing the use of such grounds and in accordance with instructions of any attendant designated by the City of Burkburnett or its City Manager to be an attendant at said grounds.

SECTION 2: Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not more than \$200.00.

SECTION 3: The fact that there is presently no adequate provisions to regulate the use of the City's dump grounds, creates an urgency and an emergency in the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety, comfort, and general welfare, and requires that this ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage and publication.

SSgt. Martel, 35, Dies At Lackland Air Force Base

SSgt. Gerald J. Martel, 35, died Thursday, August 21, at Lackland AFB after a brief illness.

Born in Cornwall, Ontario, Canada, February 24, 1934 he was a member of the United States Air Force for 15 years. He was married to Bethel A. Sharpsten on July 25, 1953 in Massena, N.Y.

Sgt. Martel was a resident of Burkburnett for five years and was an active member of St. Jude Catholic Church, where he was Alter Boy Instructor, also assistant Scoutmaster for Boy Scout Troop 154.
