Salute and remember our veterans

Unless we have a loved one serving, most of us don't dwell on the dangers that face our servicemen and women as they work to protect our freedom. But, it is still there. On this ninety-seventh year since President Wilson proclaimed November 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day, we will once again pause to honor and thank our veterans, both past and present.

Major hostilities of WWI were formally ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918 with the German signing of the Armistice. It was generally regarded as the end of "the war to end all wars."

Unfortunately that hope has not proven true. American service men and women have been, and continue to be involved in combat in many areas around the world. Today's military is made up mainly of career soldiers, with more than 1.3 million active duty personnel, as well as over 800,000 reserve forces. Texas

has 173,118 active duty soldiers.

For most Americans, there is a great sense of pride and respect for our military personnel and the sacrifice they make for the greater good of our country. It is critical that we teach each new generation the important function and mission of our armed forces, as well as the significance and impact their service has made for our country.

The Veterans' Day National Ceremony is held each year on November 11 at Arlington National Cemetery. The ceremony begins precisely at 11 a.m. with a wreath laying at the Tomb of the Unknowns and continues inside the Memorial Amphitheater with a parade of colors by veterans' organizations and remarks by dignitaries.

At the local level, there will be several observances honoring Haskell County veterans on Friday, November 11. Haskell Elementary will continue their annual Veterans' Day

Breakfast. The flag raising ceremony will begin at 8:30 a.m. on the front lawn at the elementary school. This will be followed with a breakfast served by students, and a patriotic musical program.

Beginning at 10:30 a.m. at Slim Sorrells Park in Rule, another ceremony will be held. Included on the program will be guest speaker Lt. Col. W.L. Wolf (Ret.), Patriotic songs by Rule Elementary students and a recognition of all veterans.

The Haskell Church of Christ will serve lunch on Friday from 12 noon to 1 p.m. to all veterans of the community and their spouse or guest.

Paint Creek ISD will also host a Veterans' Day program and brunch on Friday, beginning at 10 a.m. in the school gymnasium.

All veterans of Haskell County are invited and encouraged to participate in any and all of these special events.

who serve our country are willing to pay that price for our freedom and for peace. Today, we thank you, salute you, and honor you Veterans.

Sharon Sue Reid Mullino

Funeral services for Sharon Sue Reid Mullino, 82, of Rochester were held Thurs., Nov. 3 at Rochester First Baptist Church. Burial was in Rochester Cemetery under the direction of Smith Family Funeral Homes.

Mrs. Mullino passed away Mon., Oct. 31.

Born at her home in the Foster Community southeast of Rochester Sept. 8, 1934, the oldest child of William Manford and Claudia Faye Hewitt Reid. She was a member of Rochester First Baptist Church.

Sharon attended school at Rochester, graduating in 1952. As a student Sharon participated in One Act Plays, the Steer Band, and was a majorette. The RHS Class of 1952 stayed very close in all the years following high school. Sharon helped organize many of their reunions.

Sharon enrolled in Hardin Simmons College in the spring of 1953, rooming with Rochester classmate Carolyn Smith Baugh. While at Hardin Simmons she performed in a college play and was a member of the Cowgirl Band. When the tornado hit Rochester in March 1953, they had no communication from Rochester for some time and feared that their hometown had been destroyed. When the cotton crop failed due to the drought in the 1950s, Sharon returned to Rochester to work in Smith Drug Store.

Sharon married George Alvis Mullino Aug. 9, 1953 at Rochester. They made their living ranching and farming, operated the Rochester Cotton Warehouse for forty years and were involved in other ventures, as well. Sharon and George were partners in every sense of the word, she being his right hand in every

work and civic endeavor—and there were many. They raised four children and were faithful supporters of Rochester schools and community. Sharon took on leadership roles in Haskell County, including 33 years as Haskell County Democratic Chairman. She was elected to this role at a time when women were very much in the minority. In this endeavor she was very much involved with county and state-wide politics during the 1980s, 1990s and into the new millennium. She travelled extensively to conventions and meetings, being a delegate to the Democratic National Convention in 1988. In recent years, Texas may have turned "red," but to this day you can spot Sharon's pickup by its "Texas Democrat" bumper sticker.

Beloved by many and respected by all who knew her for her work ethic, her community spirit, creativity and compassionate nature, she was the image of community leadership. Whatever was going on in Rochester for most of her adult life, she was in the center of it. One of her favorite things was the Rochester Homecoming Celebrations. In September, she was honored by the Homecoming Association for her years of dedication. Sharon was a member of the Rochester Woman's Club, Rochester Booster Club member, Rochester and Haskell County 4-H leader. Her family received the Texas Land Heritage Award in 2007 for land farmed by the same family for 100 years. She was a member of the Texas Hereford Association, Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association and was a past Texas Junior Hereford

Association sponsor. She was designated a Yellow Rose of Texas by Governor Rick Perry. Her years of service to Rochester First Baptist Church spanned several decades, teaching children's Sunday School, Bible School and supporting many church activities. She loved supporting the Rochester One-Act Play casts, donating time, props and direction, and she loved watching her children and grandchildren show their livestock projects.

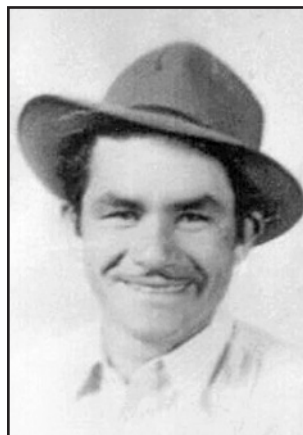

the Gospel Music Hall of Fame with the legendary group in 1998.

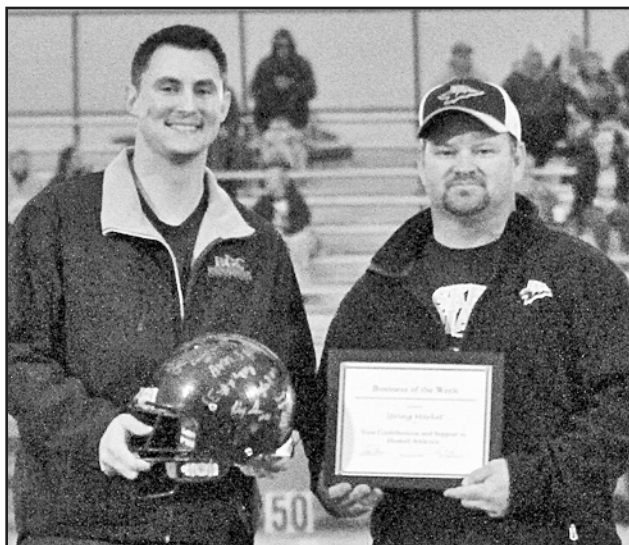

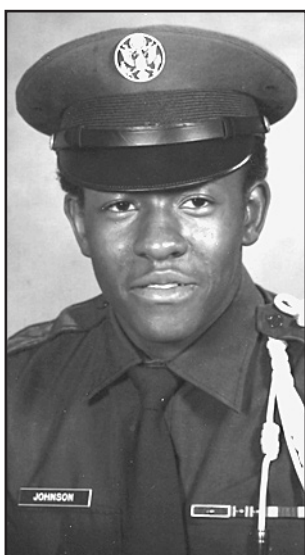

FSA County Committee elections underway

Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Val Dolcini announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) began mailing ballots to eligible farmers and ranchers across

the country for the 2016 FSA County Committee elections Mon., Nov. 7. Producers must return ballots to their local FSA offices by Dec. 5, 2016, to ensure that their vote is counted.

office. One-third of county committee seats are up for election each year. County committee members apply their knowledge and judgment to help FSA make important decisions on its commodity support programs, conservation programs, indemnity and disaster programs, and emergency programs and eligibility.

"Producers elected to FSA county committees play a vital role in local agricultural decisions," said Dolcini. "Their contributions are essential to the daily operation of nearly 2,200 offices across the country. It is a valued partnership that helps us better understand the needs of the farmers and ranchers we serve."

Nearly 7,700 FSA County Committee members serve FSA offices nationwide. Each committee has three to 11 elected members who serve three-year terms of

Producers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program to be eligible to vote in the county committee election. Approximately 1.5 million producers are currently eligible to vote. Farmers and ranchers who supervise and conduct the farming operations of an entire farm, but are not of legal voting age, also may be eligible to vote.

Farmers and ranchers will begin receiving their ballots the week of Nov. 7. Ballots include the names of candidates running for the local committee election. FSA has modified the ballot, making it easily identifiable and less likely to be overlooked. Voters who do not receive ballots in the coming week can pick one up at their local FSA office. Ballots returned by mail must be postmarked no later than Dec. 5, 2016. Newly elected committee members will take office Jan. 1, 2017.

Sloan is 4-H Livestock Ambassador

Haskell High School junior Riley Sloan, son of Lance and Amy Sloan, has been chosen to serve as a Livestock Ambassador, announced Haskell County Extension Agent-Ag. Jason Westbrook.

The Texas 4-H Livestock Ambassador program provides high school aged 4-H members an opportunity to develop and practice advanced leadership skills related to mentoring other youth, and to become advocates for animal agriculture.

According to their website, the program's objectives are to prepare youth to serve in leadership capacities in junior livestock programs; prepare youth for the experience of the university setting, through intensive science based instruction and experiences; prepare and provide opportunities for youth to serve in advocacy roles for animal agriculture, 4-H and junior livestock programs; and develop a heightened awareness of career opportunities in animal agriculture and advocacy.

Sloan says, "Growing up working around a cow/calf operation run by my granddad, Dickie Sloan, and my dad, I became interested in the livestock industry and everything that is a part of it. I was contacted by my local county extension agent, Westbrook, who felt the Ambassador program would fit me well. He encouraged me to apply and I was selected."

In 2007, the Texas 4-H and Youth Development Program took the initiative to begin developing the

next generation of advocates for agriculture, and more specifically, the livestock industry. Through this program a new generation of knowledgeable, educated and well-spoken youth have emerged in Texas to teach other youth and adults the skills of being good stewards, producers and exhibitors of beef cattle, sheep, goats and swine.

Sloan, who will serve through the end of his senior year, attended a week long camp at Texas Tech University. The training included ways ambassadors can make a difference in their hometowns. They

also went through rigorous college level animal science demonstrations, as well as being informed of opportunities to serve in advocacy roles for animal agriculture.

Students completing the requirements become accountable to their County Extension Agent, their community and the program. They are required to contribute forty hours of service in presenting topics in agriculture advocacy. Sloan plans to help with livestock evaluation and speak at multiple events about the importance of agriculture. In addition he has volunteered at the West Texas Fair & Rodeo and will help lead a 4-H camp next summer.

Sloan has been in 4-H for nine years. Among his accomplishments, he has shown swine at the livestock shows, been on the livestock judging team and on the shooting sports team. He has held every 4-H office at the county level, including two years as the president of the Haskell County Senior 4-H Club. He now serves as the reporter.

The benefits of the program to both Sloan and the agriculture industry are many. 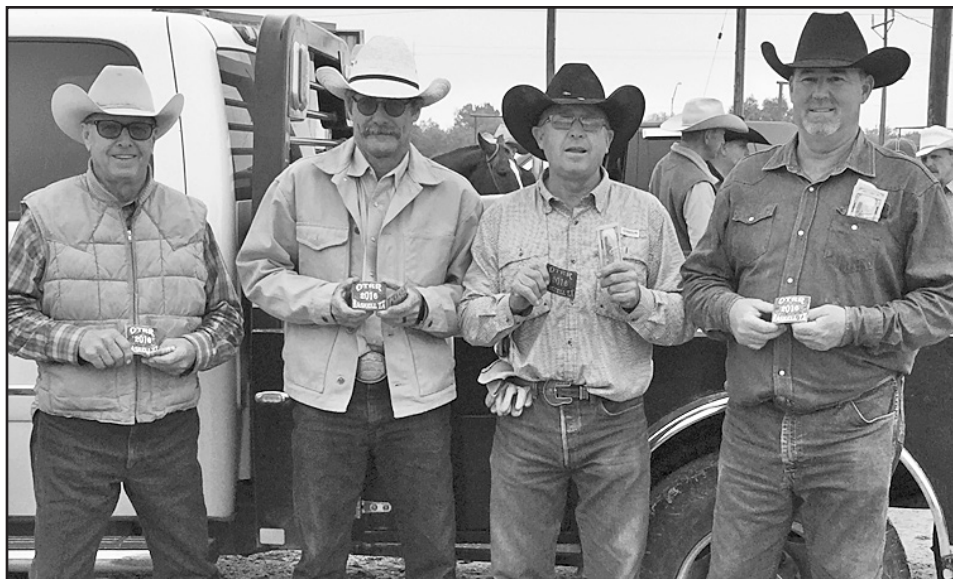

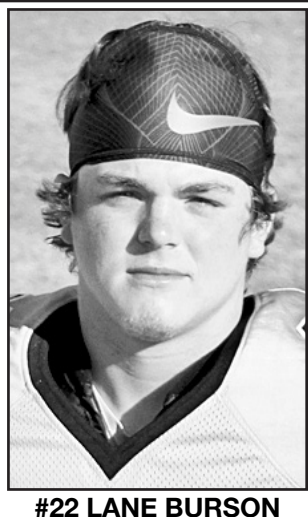
