

Billy J. Smith Elected Mayor; Budget Adopted

The mayor is elected by the council members. Smith, who is now serving his second term on the council, was Burkburnett's mayor last

Elected as Mayor Pro-Tem was Irv Smith, who also served in that same capacity last

Earlier in the meeting, Billy Smith, Earl Brown, Jerry Don Pate and T.M. Cornelius were sworn in as council members by city attorney Joe Janeke, following the canvass of ballots from the city election.

In other action, the council passed the city budget which showed an anticipated total revenue of \$664,064, derived principally from water sales of \$210,000; taxes including sales tax of \$215,000; sewer and garbage revenue of \$161, 250; franchise tax of \$36,000 and miscellaneous income of \$41.814.

Capital improvements are \$51,700 set up in the budget include \$20,200 for the water well and distribution department, \$15,000 for the street department, \$7,000 for the police department, \$3,500 for parks and recreation, \$500 for water billing department, \$200 for city hall, \$300 for tax department, \$1,500 for fire department and \$3,500 for sewer disposal account.

THE **INFORMED** CONSUMER



By Crawford C. Martin Attorney General of Texas

Do you pay your bills on time? Have you always paid your debts in full? How much do you owe right now and to

You, of course, know the answers to these questions. But so do Consumer Reporting Agencies because they are in the business of collecting this type of information. Every time you apply for credit, employment or insurance, the potential creditor, employer, or insurer will probably purchase whatever information a Reporting Agency has on you.

Therefore, it is important that information these agencies circulate about individual consumers be as accurate and up-to date as possible. Until recently, it may have been difficult for you as an individual to determine the accuracy as well as the nature of the information these Consumer Reporting Agencies were including in reports made about

However, you now have legal protection to insure your basic rights in this area. This is

because of the new Federal Fair Credit Reporting Act, which is administered by the Federal Trade Commission. You, as a consumer, are entitled to protection against circulation of erraneous, incomplete or obsolete information on which an unsuspecting firm might rely in deciding whether or not to do business with you or to offer

you employment. Some of the most signif-

icant of your rights as a consumer are:

1. The right to know the nature and substance of all the information (except medical) in your file at the particular Consumer Reporting Agency.

2. The right to know the sources of information. 3. The right to know who

has received a Consumer Report on you within the last six months (or within the preceding two years if the report was furnished for employment purposes).

If you have been denied credit, insurance, or employment because of information in a Consumer Report, you have the right to be told the name and address of the Consumer Reporting Agency that furnished the report. You then have the right to request and receive all the informa-

tion mentioned above from the

Consumer Reporting Agency free of charge. If there is incorrect or incomplete information in your particular file, you have the right to challenge it. The Reporting Agency must, in most instances, re-investigate the challenged information within a reasonable period of time. If the information is found to be inaccurate or cannot be verified, it must be removed from

If the Reporting Agency conducts a re-investigation concerning you and you do not agree with the results of this re-investigation, you have the right to file a statement setting out your version of what you consider to be the true facts. Thereafter, if the Consumer Reporting Agency makes a report containing the information in dispute, it must also report your version.

Common broomweed in some years can become a serious problem in Texas rangelands. Broomweed germinates with winter rains, forms a small rosette of leaves, and grows very slowly for some time. Rapid growth begins around mid-May and the plants are 8-12 inches tall. Growth in height is fairly well complete by June 15. On the average, broomweed reaches a mature height of about 18 inches, but may double that in exceptionally good years.

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Results of research studies on the control of broomweed provide some very useful information. The application of one-half pound of 2, 4-D when broomweed was from 4-6 inches tall (around May 1) resulted in 95 - 100 percent control. Even one- fourth pound of 2, 4-D at this time reduced the stand of broomweed by 75 percent. Spraying with 2, 4, 5-T at one-half pound per acre produced 60 percent control when applied on May 1, and 90-95 percent control when applied on May 15. When spraying is delayed

Dicamba applied alone at one-half pound per acre resulted in 85-100 percent control of broomweed when applied between April 1 and June 1. One quarter pound 2, 4-5-T combined with an equal amount of dicamba produced similar results. The combined chemicals of 2, 4-D and 2,4, 5-T and dicamba is not approved by the Environmental Protection Agency.

Combinations of 2, 4-D or 2, 4, 5-T with equal amounts of picloram applied in totals of one-fourth, one-half and one pound per acre has resulted in virtually 100 percent control of common broom-

******** Economically speaking, 2,

4-D will control common broomweed for the lowest cost but application time is rather critical. For best results pastures should be sprayed with chemical when the broomweed is about four to six inches tall (a period of about 10 days). Where weed control is desired in conjunction with brush control, other combinations of chemicals should be used, especially in cases where broomweeds have reached mature height. Onehalf pound of 2, 4, 5-T or one-fourth pound of 2, 4, 5-T plus one-fourth pound of dicamba or one-fourth pound of 2,4, 5-T plus one-fourth pound picloram (Tordon 225) all result in satisfactory broomweed control. To date the most effective combination for both mesquite and weed control in the Rolling Plains has been the application of one-fourth pound of 2, 4, 5-T plus one-fourth pound of picloram.

COUNTY AGENT NEWS Weeds Desirable To Prevent Soil Erosion

Weeds may be a problem most of the time, but they are desirable in certain instances. The secret is to maintain a good balance to prevent the weeds from claiming good

While weeds can rob precious soil moisture, they also help prevent erosion and improve the appearance of land, says Dr. James Supak, area agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Lubbock. This is especially important around lakes and tailwater pits, where certain weeds can survive in the moist soil and must be controlled economically because the land does not produce any income.

He separates the weeds into four types. "Floating aquatic weeds are not attached but live on nutrients dissolved in the water. "Submerged" weeds are rooted in the lake bottom and grow under water; while "emerged" aquatic weeds are rooted below the water and stick above the surface. The last type is "Ditchbank" weeds. They grow in ditches which normally have high water requirements or tolerance. The main problem with this type is that they grow during dry periods and then clog the ditches later.

Supak cites tests by Dr. Dudley Smith of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Smith is a weed researcher at the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock, and has tested different control methods on West Texas
