I felt she would make a good showing, but I along with many others, didn't realize that she would poll enough votes for the number two spot.



peratures are generally smaller than those sired by boars that are kept cool.

amount and quality of sperm produced by boars for at least a couple of weeks. Therefore, producers should keep boars cool for two to three weeks before breeding as well as throughout the breeding period. The use of temperature controlled buildings for boars will pay dividends.

Livestock men can estimate or know the exact feeding value of the hays they use. They can rely on time-honored hay judging techniques to estimate hay quality. Or they can know their hay's real worth by having it tested chemically.

A major factor affecting hay quality is the stage of maturity when the plants were cut. No mature seed should be present. Coastal Bermudagrass should be no more than 14 to 16 inches tall. Since plant leaves have the highest nutrient quality, high quality hay should contain a high proportion of leaves to stem. A bright green color indicates a
