"A CITIZEN" KINDLY CORRECTED

In an effort to awaken and stimulate local pride and interest in the public library "A Citizen," in his article in the Free Press last week, allowed his zeal to carry him into a very erroneous position in which he greatly underrated the enterprises of the town. We do not think that the minimizing of the things we have and the efforts which have been put forth to get them is necessary or the best way to secure others or to foster such as we already have.

We are cognizant of the very laudable work of the ladies of the Magazine Club in providing the community with a public library, which they have established and maintained by their self-sacrificing and unremunerated labors, and we concur with "A Citizen" in saying that it deserves a far greater recognition, support and encouragement than it has heretofore received from the public. The motive prompting the Magazine Club was one of patriotism found in a desire to stimulate and encourage a love for knowledge and good literature among our people by supplying the best at a minimum of cost to those who misuse it, and we are quite sure that our citizens desire no person other than that which should use the opportunity afforded before them for any and intellectual and literary culture.

But to return to "A Citizen": He truly says that the reputation of his town is dear to any logical citizen and then asks, "what is the reputation of our town—of Haskell?" and entreats to be known for progress then proceeds to shatter the pretension which he holds dear by proceeding to catalogue the town's enterprises, overlooking, however, about nine-tenths of them. Hear him: "When we look around for some evidence of public enterprise and endeavor very few things are to be found. We have our railroad which came with little investment; a mineral well given by nature and wholly unadvertised; a play-ground well equipped but unused, that has been provided by a Woman's Club, and a public library which has been established and maintained by another club of women. No citizen can read this meager list of our assets and not have his eyes opened to some astonishing truths." Truly, there are some astonishing things in the world and that list of Haskell's enterprises and the endeavors of its citizens is one of them! We have one railroad that ran over us willy nilly, a mineral well given by nature—no man dug it and shouted to the world about it, a play-ground that nobody plays in, a public library whose volumes are unread.

"A Citizen" has forgotten, or, is he so recent to know, that a committee of citizens labored long and intelligently to secure a railroad, that finally they prevented the one that we now have from getting a few miles east of us and building a town that probably would have erased Haskell from the map, giving a bonus of \$35,000, right

PROSPECTS FOR OIL AND GAS GOOD

capital of \$100,000, which also operates about miles of toll lines and exchanges in sixteen towns. We have one of the most substantially built and best equipped cotton oil mills

of forty tons capacity to be found in Texas. Our broom factory furnishes a home market for another product of our fertile soil and is turning out about a thousand brooms a day, which are being sold from El Paso to Houston, incidentally advertising Haskell and bringing many a "foreign" dollar into our midst. Then there is the creamery, equipped with the latest machinery and apparatus, which enables surrounding farmers to utilize a product as they formerly could not, aids diversification and incidentally puts a little cash into local trade all through the year. The grain elevator with threshing attachment prepares and handles some of the important products of the country for the outside market. The ice cream factory and bottling works furnish us with refreshments when the days are long and warm.

We might mention the large ginning plants, the three banks, the progressive newspaper and that we have three large and well equipped school buildings and some other things but we think we have said enough to show that "A Citizen" had not fully awakened when he "took his pen in hand."

It may be said that a number of the things we have mentioned are private and not public enterprises. Most of them are at least of a quasi public nature, and anyway they serve to show that the people of Haskell may be justly credited with a fair degree of pluck, endeavor and enterprise because their money and pluck built them. Of course it wasn't necessary that we should write this for home consumption; we simply didn't want to see Haskell's reputation abroad built upon "A Citizen's" picture of it, because the reputation of any town is dear to me.

New York, Nov. 25. —Andrew Carnegie, 76 years old today, was feeling mighty fine with the sun shining and the cablegrams and telegrams of congratulations pouring in on him at his home, 1093 Fifth Avenue. He had a lot of things he wanted to say and he walked right up and said 'em for publication, too.

He had kind words for Theodore Roosevelt, although, Mr. Carnegie admitted, Theodore every now and then was flighty, and in his recent editorial on the Sherman law took a whole lot of pages to tell what he might have said in one sentence. Mr. Carnegie agrees heartily with Mr. Roosevelt's proposal for a commission to regulate trusts as the Interstate Commerce Commission regulates railroads.

Mr. Carnegie also talked about greatness and wealth, and how to get both. He gave a list of twenty great men who, he said, had made the world what it was. Seven of these twenty were Scotchmen, Mr. Carnegie proudly pointed out, and Shakespeare, who heads his list, he said, "As the old Scot said, 'Had brains enough to have been one.'" These are the twenty: Shakespeare, Morton, Jenner, Neilson, Lincoln, Burns, Gutenberg, Edison, Siemens, Bessemer, Mushet, Columbus, Watt, Bell, Arkwright, Franklin, Murdock, Hargreaves, Stephenson and Symington.

"But not one of these men," a reporter interposed, "made much money."

"Money," he exclaimed, "anybody can make money. These men have done something for the world. Do you suppose they care whether or not they were paid for it?"

"Money is a bother. The great trouble about this world, I find, is not how to get money but how to get rid of it wisely."

A reporter casually inquired as to his method of getting money in this easy fashion and Mr. Carnegie dictated these rules:

"Don't drink or even enter a drinking saloon."

"Don't smoke. It's foolish, and no employer wants foolish men working for him."

"Live within your income. 'Don't be content with doing only your duty. Do more than your duty. It's the person who finishes a neck ahead who wins the race."

"Use your head. Don't follow the rule: 'Obey orders if you break your employer.' Tell your employer that you know more about your department of his business than he possibly could know. He may not like it then, but he will remember and you will some day be rewarded."

We clip the above because it contains a sentiment concerning money getting that ought to dominate more men and women than it does. If a humble editor had uttered such sentiment, people would have commended him with pity, but coming from a master of millions, it should have weight. This sentiment of the Celt race as well as the Anglo-Saxon has capacitated the races to dominate the world and build empires. It is a proper estimate of mere money getting. We have become accustomed to associate wealth and brains but Mr. Carnegie esteems brains and service to humanity above mere money getting. He possesses a character quite different from the average capitalist. We have enjoyed many of his writings and sayings. If he is rich he is still a human man. He does not value men in dollars and cents.

The Value of Sympathetic Understanding Between Parent and Child.

Every child should be governed, as far as possible, from within. The infant must often be controlled by external methods, but such methods should not be employed longer than are necessary. Just as soon as the child can understand right from wrong there should be persistent efforts to impress the laws of right and wrong upon their mind and heart. Conduct should not spring from fear nor the authority of another, but from noble impulses and a knowledge of what is right and wrong. No amount of external control can produce a strong, noble character. The inner life must be built up. As the mind develops, the seat of government should be transferred from the parent to the child, otherwise the child goes into the world a prey to its own appetites and an easy subject to the will of others.

Many parents make the fatal mistake of governing children too much. By the continual exercise of authority over them they prevent the development of individuality and the sense of freedom and personal responsibility, all of which are essential to their welfare. They assume

that when the child has been taught to obey them perfectly, they have made a success of family government. Not so. If obedience is the result of an undeveloped individuality, a crushed will, or a suppressed conscience, their assumed success is a tremendous failure. "Come let us live with our children." This little word "with," derived from two Anglo-Saxon words meaning to be and to join, furnishes one of the best illustrations of nice distinctions of meaning which make the English language so rich in expression. No other word could express that perfect unity which should exist between the parent and the child, the mature and the child mind as this one does. "For" is sometimes used in the place of "with" but it makes quite another thing of this motto so dear to the hearts of Froebel's followers. We do, indeed, often try to live for our children, to bear their sorrows and hardships, out of our deepest love, and we do for them many things which they ought to do for themselves, because this is easier for us than to teach them and wait for them to learn. But this is the opposite of living with them. Individuality of sorrow, of loss, and of disappointment, as well as of need, is one of the most precious

as well as mysterious qualities of life and suggests the infinity of resources from which to draw our supply of help, of comfort and uplifting. When we live with our children, we honor this individuality and walk hand in hand with them, to their own and our supply. The sooner we find the common ground for all with its separate outlook for each, the more certain and complete will be the unity of life, the lack of which clouds many a home, and leave many a young life adrift, without chart or compass, to find or miss the desired heaven. How prophetic sounds the reason Froebel gives for living with our children—that the new generation may be fitted for answering the questions which lie in wait for it—questions which the passing generation can never solve. For these questions lying at our door for solution are greater than any that ever confronted society before. The history of evolution has passed the age of Trojan valor and of Spartan courage, which made the human being of value only to serve the state, Dogma no longer holds men subsequent to fate, either of gods or chance, but through the various ebbs and flows of human activity runs the clear and certain tone of individual uplifting. The quality of men is the test of civilization and their integrity the full promise of all that is needed for answering these questions concerning social regeneration.

I earnestly hope our hearts may be reached while we consider the small beginnings that secure this personal integrity, the highest development of men and women. We parents have no right to dally with thoughts unworthy our high calling nor to let worthy ones dwell lightly on the surface of our minds; but we must press them back to their deepest meaning and forward to their wisest possible application; only this method is worthy of any one who deals with children. Indeed, for sweet childhood's sake. We need to be born again into the realms of truth and holiness, and these in the realms of truth and holiness, live with our children. Mrs. C. D. Long.

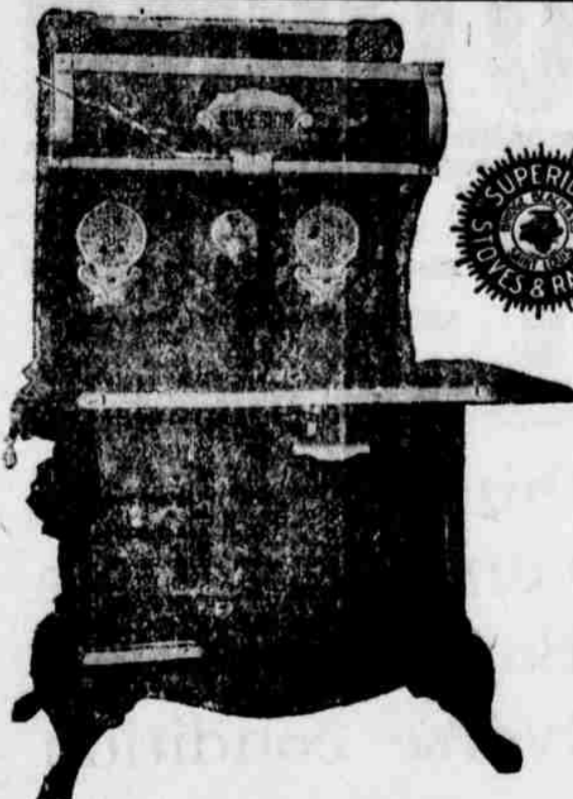
