Starter Gun Poised: Boomtown Relays

Track Teams from 28 high schools are slated to compete here Friday and Saturday at Burkburnett new all-weather Bulldog Track. These teams will be competing for championship gold in three divisions at the First Annual Boomtown Relays, sponsored by the Burkburnett Chamber of Commerce.

According to Burkburnett Track Coach Pat Smiley, Districts one, two, and three promise to field many outstanding high school athletes for this meet. District one will probably feature Seymour, Hamlin, and Marietta, Oklahoma as the strongest contenders. Marietta's Thinclads will be new to area track competition.

District two could well see Vernon on top. Vernon is always real strong in track. Last week Vernon placed second in a home track meet, just a few points behind the meet winner.

Altus, Midwest City, and Wichita Falls High are favored in District three. These 4 schools will field really tough relay teams and the races should produce some top-notch times.

The First Annual Boomtown Relays is sponsored by the Burkburnett Chamber of Commerce with hopes of continuing this meet year after year. Terry Patterson of Brotherton and White Sporting Goods, Wichita Falls, will be the Meet Starter, and Bill Darland is

slated to be the PA announcer. Luis Boydston will be the meet referee.

The meet gets underway at 1:30 p.m. Friday with Division One events. All of these events will continue until completed. These events include the Pole Vault, High Jump, Broad Jump, Discus, 440 Yard Relay, 120 High Hurdles, 100 Yard Dash, 440 Yard Dash, 330 Yard Intermediate Hurdles, 220 Yard Dash, and Shot Put.

An estimated 500 boys are entered in this year's meet. This group, plus the horde of coaches, fans, and managers should make for a colorful event. Everyone is urged to attend the meet and watch these boys in action.

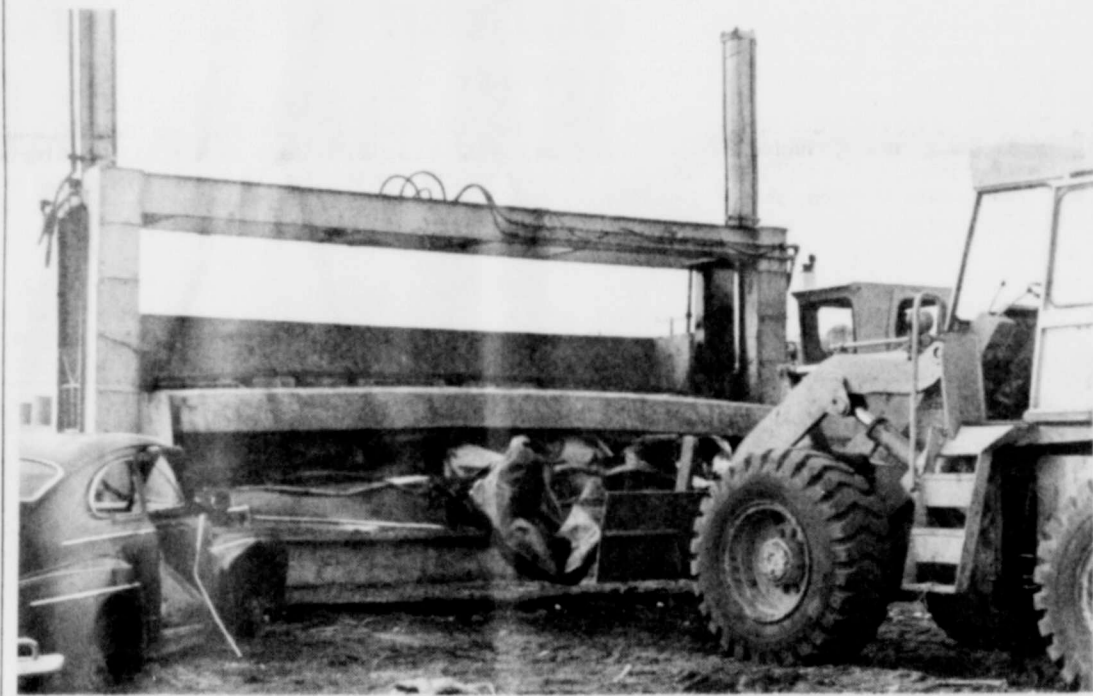

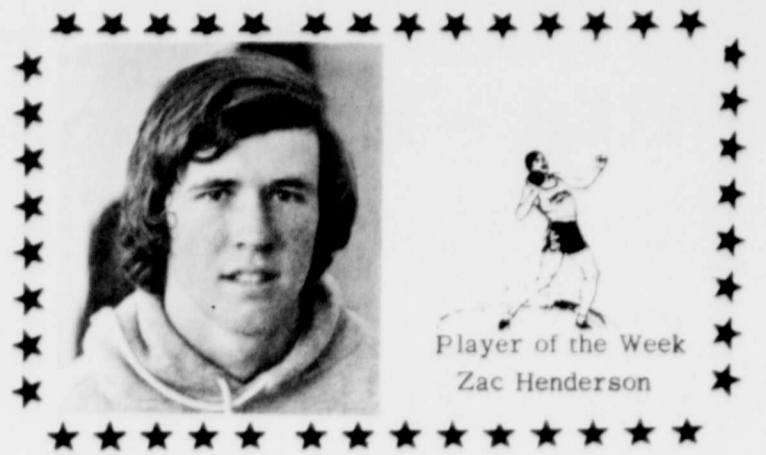


Burkburnett Track Team Placed In Fourteen Events At Graham

The Burk Burnett Boys Track team continued to worry area competitors as they placed in fourteen events recently at the Graham Track Meet. Coach Pat Smiley commented that the team is progressing with each meet and that he feels the BHS team can compete and contend for valuable points in district competition. Zac Henderson triumphed in the 100-yard dash for the Burk Burnett team as he placed first. Zac ran the 100-yard dash in 10.5. Tommy Rushing took fourth place honors in the 105 with 11 seconds flat, and Zac displayed his durability as he gained the third place spot in the 220-yard dash. Both Vernon Smith and Jay Lippard obtained high ratings in the 440-dash as Vernon placed fourth and Jay took sixth. Vernon ran the 440 in 55.8 while Jay followed close behind with 56 flat. Larry Martin surpassed competitors to accomplish fourth place honors as he finished the 880-yard dash with 2:09 times. The mile race offers a grueling challenge, but Lyle Larson succeeded with a sixth place and a 5:01 time, to conclude the individual track events. The relays offered the Burk Burnett team opportunities also as Zac Henderson, Vernon Smith, Chris Strayhorn, and Tommy Rushing achieved third place honors in the 440 Relay competition with 45.7. Larry

Martin, Robert Fore, Vernon Smith, and Jay Lippard put together a strong combination as they reached fourth place in the mile relay. Bill Deville represented Burk Burnett in the hurdle competition with two sixth places in the High Hurdles and the Intermediate hurdles. The difference between the high hurdles and the intermediates is a three inch increase of height. The field events also held favor for the Burk Burnett team as Jay Lippard placed third in the pole vault division. Jay vaulted 11 feet to accomplish the third place victory. Tim Kormos competed in the broad jump and took third place honors with 16 feet and 8 inches. John Panter and Rusty Barrett aligned their skills and demonstrated versatility in the Discus and Shot Put events. John ranked second in shot put with 47 feet and 8 inches while Rusty followed closely with 47 feet

and 3 inches for third place. However, Rusty edged John as he hurled the discus 128 feet for fourth place and John rocketed the discus 121 feet for sixth place. These were the fourteen events in which Burk Burnett competitors placed while at the Graham meet. Coach Smiley commented on the overall accomplishments of the team by saying that even though we are improving and he has high hopes for a good district position the team can still improve in speed and depth. He did stress that each meet these faults less and the boys gain more insight into the events and the art of competition. The next opportunity the boys will have to demonstrate their skills will be on their home track at the Boomtown Invitational Friday and Saturday. Area residents are invited to attend the meet near Bulldog Stadium starting at 1:00.

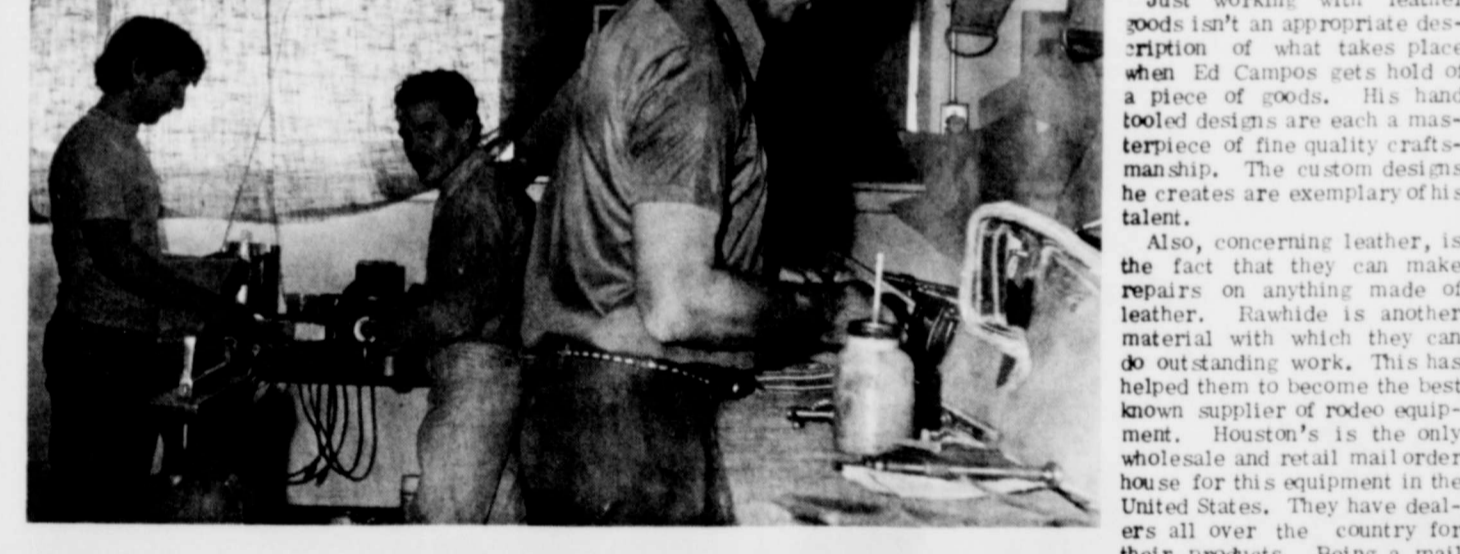

Multiphasic Screening Unit To Be In Cotton County

The free Chronic Disease Multiphasic Screening Unit will be in Cotton County April 17 through May 11. The unit will be stationed in two communities in the county during the four weeks stay.

Persons will be screened for obesity, anemia, and hypertension, glaucoma, pulmonary functions, diabetes, and electrocardiograms will be available for those eligible. Pap smears will be offered to the women. Blacks to age 40 will be screened for sickle cell. Persons will NOT be screened for a known disease.

Miss Janice Dunca, Extension Home Economist in Cotton County said today that the Extension Homemakers' Council along with the Cotton County physicians will sponsor the screening. Employees of the State Health Department will be conducting the screening. She also noted that this is the 2nd time Multiphasic Screening has been offered to Cotton County. Screenings must be at least 18 years of age, except married women of a younger age are eligible.

It is pointed out that the testing is not a diagnosis. Screenings will be made and if anything abnormal is detected, the screening is then notified to see his family physician.

If there is an abnormal finding, the screening will receive a letter within 3 to 5 weeks. If the finding is normal there will be no notification.

Miss Duncan stated the unit will be located in Walters from April 17 through April 27 and in Temple from April 30 through May 11. The unit will be located on the parking area north of Cotton Electric Cooperative on Broadway while in Walters. In Temple it will be located by the City Hall.

Appointments are scheduled 5 minutes apart and it takes approximately 30 minutes to go through the unit.

Extension Homemakers throughout the county are scheduling appointments.

Beware Easter Chicks And Ducklings Carry Salmonella Bacteria

With Easter just around the corner, many parents are thinking of buying baby chicks or ducklings as pets for their children.

These pets can bring much joy into the home at Easter time because of the delight they give small children. However, I would like to offer a few words of caution about these pets and salmonella.

Salmonella infection comes from the family of bacteria that causes food poisoning and gastrointestinal upset in animals and man.

There are over 1,200 types of salmonella bacteria, one of which causes typhoid fever. Public health authorities have indicated that baby chicks, ducklings and turtles are notorious carriers of salmonella as well as vehicles of infections.

According to these officials, ducks and chicks "are recognized as one of the largest reservoirs of salmonella" and can predict with certainty, a marked increase of salmonella infections in children in the weeks following Easter.

In young birds, signs of salmonella include drowsiness, weakness and diarrhea. Ducklings become dehydrated, begin trembling and rasp for air.

Symptoms of the salmonella infection in man include fever, stomach cramps, vomiting and bloody diarrhea. Often this infection can result in extended hospitalization.

Generally, salmonella is not a fatal disease for humans. However, the infection can be quite dangerous for infants and elderly adults.

Children, who often spend more time playing with baby chicks and ducklings, are more susceptible to the disease.

Salmonella is a communicable type disease that can be spread to other members of the family and friends. Children ranging in age from three months to six years usually have personal hygiene habits that contribute to the spread of contamination and infections.

Kissing a pet, a popular habit of children, should never be allowed.

Both children and adults who are chronic fingernail biters, have become seriously ill with the salmonella infection after handling or close association with ducklings and baby chicks.

Parents and teachers should always insist that children who handle these pets wash their hands after each contact.

Also, any person responsible for the care of the pet should learn how to properly wash and sanitize their hands, clean the pet's food bowl and other equipment, to avoid contaminating the household environment.

There is no easy test for salmonella and pet stores that sell baby chicks and ducklings during the Easter season are required to guarantee the pets are free from the disease. However, if the baby chick or duckling you have purchased begins to show any of the signs of salmonella, check with your

family veterinarian immediately to guard against the spread of this disease in your household.

NOTE: Dr. Minor regrets that he is unable to personally answer letters from pet owners. He recommends that readers consult their own veterinarians when their pets have problems.

Each finalist will receive \$50 and an expense-paid trip to Austin for the Cook-Off May 19. The Agriculture Department will publish a booklet of the 24 winning recipes, Commissioner White stated.

The three categories of the contest are tender cuts, such as steak; less tender cuts, such as stew meat; and variety cuts, such as liver and kidney.

Deadline for submitting recipes is April 30. Entrants may send in as many recipes as they want, but each must be on a separate entry blank. Contest rules appear on the entry blank. Contest rules appear

In the final Cook-Off each recipe must be prepared by the original entrant, exactly as submitted. Judges will include food editors for major Texas newspapers: Julie Belon of the DALLAS MORNING NEWS, Ann Worley of the FORT WORTH STAR-TELEGRAM, Mary Cook of the TEXAS STAR, and Ann Criswell of the HOUSTON CHRONICLE.

Other judges will be Elizabeth Smith, the State Home Economics Director, and Sheila Gulliger of the City of Austin Electric Company.

The Grain-fed Beef Cook-Off is sponsored annually by the Department of Agriculture, Texas and Southwest Cattle Raisers Association, the Texas Cattle Feeders Association, the Texas Meat Packers Association, and the Texas Cow Belles.

Now Is The Time To Plant Grassed Waterways

"Grassed waterways, a safe way to carry excess water from fields should be built and planted to grass now through May," states Bill Lewis, Soil Conservation Service, Iowa Park.

Excess water (water above the amount the soil can readily absorb) accumulates on your field during heavy rains and may flow onto it from surrounding fields.

Uncontrolled, this "Excess" cuts off loose and carries it from the field. The results: gullies, loss of soil and soil nutrients, and physical damage to crops. Too, sediment is added to streams and lakes lowering water quality for man's use and hurting fish.

Grassed Waterways may be located to receive the water coming off the neighbors farm and carry it to a safe outlet on your farm. Too, grassed waterways serve as a terrace outlet.

"A Grassed Waterway is a channel shaped and established to grass. Most fields in this area need one or more," Lewis said.

It's just good "horse sense" to vaccinate all horses, mules, donkeys, and other equine animals against Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE) as soon as possible.

Mosquitoes, which carry this deadly horse sleeping sickness

will soon be merging as spring weather arrives. Although no cases of VEE were confirmed in Texas or other states during 1972, the potential danger of the disease still threatens all horses and other equine because VEE did strike in northern Mexico during the past year.

Although most horses were vaccinated for the disease in 1971 when it first hit the United States, few animals have been vaccinated since that time. Thus it's extremely important to vaccinate these animals again as immunity from the previous vaccination has diminished.

Vaccination for horses that will be subjected to interstate travel to shows, races and similar events, is recommended. Foals that were vaccinated before six months of age should be revaccinated to assure a longer immunity.

Pregnant mares may also be vaccinated. Experience to date has indicated no hazards follow the vaccination of such animals.

One needs only to look back in 1971 to see how fast this deadly disease can strike. A horse owner just can't afford to play a guessing game with VEE - hoping that 1973 will be the same as last year. It's just too great a risk when you consider that a vaccine is available to protect your animals.

So contact your local veterinarian today and give your horses the protection they need against VEE.

This 8-page leaflet was published recently by the Texas Forest Service, a part of the Texas A&M University System at College Station.

Instructions for handling, storing and planting bare-rooted, balled, and container-grown tree seedlings are presented in brief, easily understood language. Drawings are also used to assist the reader in following the written instructions.

Tree planters who want to hold their bare-rooted nursery-grown seedlings one more year for added growth, will find detailed instructions and drawings on how to construct a garden-plot nursery. Seedlings can also be held for another year by planting in individual containers and Circular 211 contains instructions for making suitable low-cost containers out of felt roofing paper.

Copies of Circular 211, tree seedling applications, and specific information about windbreak species selection, design and management, are available from Robert Fevin, Silviculturist, Texas Forest Service, Agronomy Department, Texas Tech University, Lubbock, 79408, or from the Texas Forest Service, College Station, 77843.

A sick child requires special care and entertainment. Like an adult, a child may be concerned about himself and his illness. Therefore, let him ask questions. Answer his inquiries and provide reassurance.

Give the child something to do; activity benefits eating and sleeping habits during the illness and reduces tenseness and restlessness. However, don't overdo suggestions. Despite his normal energy, a sick child tires more easily and his attention span may be shorter than normal. In addition, he may revert to more simple play than usual. If so, let him as this is not unusual for sick children.

When choosing toys and play equipment for a bed-ridden child, avoid extremely messy materials. Anything requiring extensive clean-up may be shunned due to its necessary, but tiring clean-up efforts. For example, furnish felt tip pens instead of water paints. The pens' inks should be water soluble in case they touch bed coverings or sleepwear.

A child's illness may be the ideal time for adding a new object to his room. For example, encourage him to make a mobile to hang over his bed or from a window.

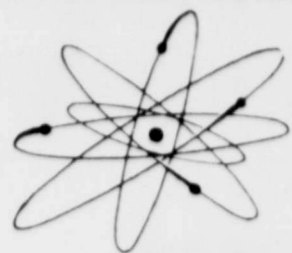

Squadron Adoption Originator Honored At Sheppard Air Force Base Recently

SHEPPARD AFB, TEXAS--Tribute for a job well done was paid Floyd Taylor, originator and coordinator of the Squadron Adoption Program, as Sheppard Air Force Base officials and representatives of the squadron sponsors said good bye to him during the annual recognition dinner held recently at the Officers Club. Speaker for this, the 14th such event, was Lieutenant General

William V. McBride, commander of the Air Training Command. He praised the accomplishments of this community relations program and told of the recognition nation-wide which it has achieved through the years.

A retired Air Force Colonel, Floyd Taylor is moving to San Antonio in the near future where he and his wife, Annette, will live at the Air Force Village.

Carefully selected pallbearers were urged to tenderly bear her remains away, but failed to appear. There were no flowers. Her favorite hymns, "Amazing Grace" and "Rock of Ages," were not sung. Miss Imma Modern rendered "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere," but none had any idea where this fancied isle might be. The body rests in the beautiful cemetery of By Gone Glories, awaiting the summons from above.

"In honor of her going the church doors will be closed on Wednesday nights, save on the third Wednesday night of each month, when the Ladies Pink Lemonade Society serves refreshments to the members of the men's handball team."

Farmcast

A Weekly Report Of Agri-Business News
Compiled From Sources Of The Texas Department of Agriculture

Only Six . . . Egg Production Declines . . . Livestock Slaughter Increases . . . Sheep on Feed Down Again.

Of the more than 200 different commodities produced in Texas, only six are above effective parity, according to records of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

"This is something we need to keep in mind when we hear all those glowing stories about increasing farm prices," Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White notes. "It's good that farm prices are increasing, but let's keep them in their proper perspective. The fact remains that farm parity is still lagging about 20 per cent behind the rest of the economy," he said.

The six commodities above effective parity—or equality of income with the rest of the economy—are oats, hogs, beef cattle, calves, sheep and lambs.

Hog prices at an average of \$34.40 per 100 pounds in Texas are \$1 per 100 pounds above parity. Beef cattle at \$42.50 are \$2.20 per 100 pounds above parity. Calves at \$56 per 100 pounds are \$7.20 above parity. Sheep at \$16 are \$4.70 above parity, and lambs at \$36.30 are \$5 above parity.

For crops, only oats are above parity. Oat prices averaged \$1.08 with parity at \$1.05 per bushel.

During the past month, most grain prices showed declines. Wheat averaged \$1.99 per bushel, down 41 cents from a month ago; corn averaged \$1.70 per bushel, down eight cents; barley was down four cents per bushel; grain sorghum was up four cents.

WEATHER conditions over much of Texas continue to slow field activity in many areas. Cotton planting continues behind schedule in the Rio Grande Valley. Corn and grain sorghum planting time is at hand in south and south central Texas.

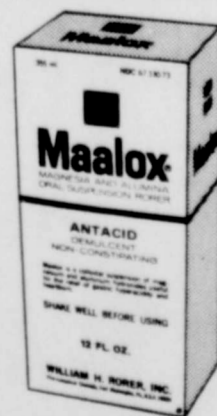

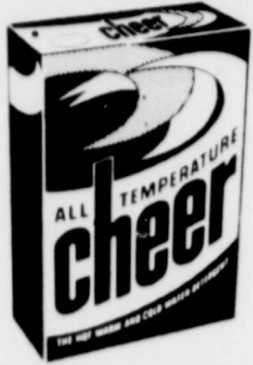
