JUDGE JOE IRBY

For County Judge.

We are authorized to announce Judge Joe Irby as a candidate for re-election to the office of County Judge, subject to action of the democratic party.

Judge Irby has made a good record during his first term as a judge. He has dispatched the business of his court and rendered judgements that stick. There have been very few appeals from his court, being himself well trained in the law he has been able to avoid those pitfalls set by shrewd lawyers for trial judges. Without a man of his training the local option laws could never have been enforced. The railroad companies would never be made to settle a damage case. In this connection we want to say to the people that an ignorant, incompetent judge who can't try one case in a thousand cost the people more money to run a court and does more injury to litigants than any other officer we have.

There are incompetent men in every county who aspire to be on the bench, and when such a fellow does get on the bench he becomes the servile tool of some criminal lawyers or shyster who has exposed his ignorance and all such lawyer has to do is to pull a string and the dummy judge will jump like a toy monkey on a stick. Such men can't write a valid order on any thing, thousands of dollars have been lost to counties in West Texas contesting void orders of incompetent judges. Then too the county judge presides over the administration of estates, they approve executors and administrators bonds. The time has come when we need men on the bench who are competent. Judge Irby has shown his competency and before you vote against him, be sure you are voting for a competent man and one of known integrity. Don't guess at matters of such importance. We have seen cases tried by incompetent judges in such a way that it was subject to reversal either way the case was decided. No man knows his weakness so much as the incompetent judge, and this miserable man generally calls as his adviser some lawyer who runs things with a high hand. In railroad cases are engaged the shrewdest lawyers. With a fellow on the bench who never wrote a charge, who is incompetent to write a charge telling the law of the case to the jury, with busts all through the charge a railroad will have a picnic with setting aside verdicts and judgments of such a court. We believe the laws are better enforced in Haskell county than ever before. We have served as county attorney before all kinds of Judges and Justices of the peace. We feel a deep interest in the courts. Unless you elect competent men to the bench, the criminal laws are violated and property and personal rights go unprotected.

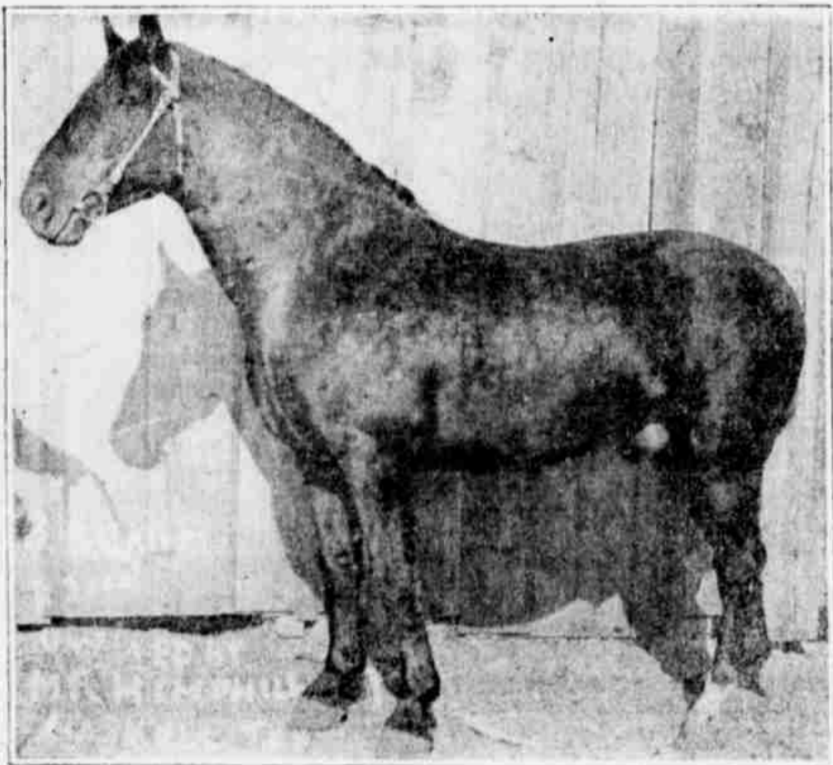

LECTURE

Mr. Geo. S. Workman, a well known creamery expert, visited Haskell and spoke to the farmers in the court house last Saturday on Dairy Farming, its benefits and possibilities, and the relation of the creamery to the farmers. After being introduced by Judge J. E. Poole, Sec. of Board of Trade, Mr. Workman said in part:

Advantages to the Farmer.

It is a great advantage to the farmer as it stimulates and facilitates the circulation of money, it brings money into the home that never came there before, it enables him to save that which is being wasted daily in the way of that precious butter fat worth 29c a pound, being fed at this time to the hogs and being allowed to be suckled from the cows udders by the calves. Where by means of a cream separator the calf could be raised just as well and better on skim milk with a little solids mixed than on the straight milk and would eliminate all danger of causing the calf to fever and scour and possibly die by the means of too much butter fat.

Mr. Workman showed tests taken at the Oregon Agricultural College and A. & M. College of Texas, comparing the cost of feeding the calves on skim milk and whole milk showing a difference of \$2.26 per hundred pounds on skim milk and \$10.92 on whole milk to put the flesh on calves, or, in other words, \$30.00 to \$40 per head to raise the calves.

Mr. Workman went on to show if a sufficient number of cows were maintained in Texas to produce the butter and dairy products imported from other states, these cows would consume a large proportion of the cottonseed which is now exported and the value of this material as a fertilizer if properly cared for and utilized would return to future years many fold.

The circulation of money and increased revenue from the dairy products would inspire the farmer to the raising of more and better cows and hogs, and more than that would increase the value of the cows he now owns.

Advantage to Community and State.

Mr. Workman in a clear way showed, through helping the farmer, how it would help the community, in putting this money in circulation and be the means of putting business on a cash basis, or at least would be the means of helping to put business on a cash basis more than any other industry.

In the event we help our community we are helping ourselves and our state. Mr. Workman showed what a great drain it was to the commercial resources of this state to import feed and dairy products that it does now showing the importation of feed stuff and dairy products amounted to nearly \$5,000,000, and butter alone amounted to \$2,000,000, sent into Kansas and Iowa while the farmers of Texas are asleep on their rights.

Possibilities of Dairy Farming in Texas.

Texas offers great opportunities for the development of the dairy industry, and, especially, Texas over every other state offers great possibilities in winter dairying. When other states are locked in snow and ice the Texas cow revels in a luxuriant pasture of green wheat and oats, followed by spring pastures producing the very finest quality of butter when prices are the highest.

Diversification

Mr. Workman said at times throughout the state people had accused him of trying to diversify the state and replied by saying that it was not his intention to discourage the raising of cotton and corn, fruit and truck, but on the other hand a small dairy goes hand and hand with the farm, but one thing I do discourage is the continuation of

this horrible wasting of the by-products of the farm, and that their very living and life should come from these products.

Mr. Workman touched on what a great influence stock and pure bred animals had on the intellectual life of the family. He said, quite apart from the enhanced market value, stock has another value which is not always estimated at its true worth the value of influence upon the intellectual life of the family. One only needs to go into the home where cattle, horses, sheep or swine are reared to be convinced of the reality and the beneficence of this influence. If other proofs are needed it may be had comparing or contrasting the home on such a farm with one devoted to grain or cotton raising only. It has often been said without stock on the farm it debauches the mentality of the farmer. There are hundreds of reasons where stock will widen the mental horizon, will itself strengthen the understanding and broaden the general intelligence. Then, too, the study of nature's method, the mysteries of heredity, the influence of environments, bringing one into intimate sympathetic touch with the great forces or laws that reward our intelligence, or per chance punish our ignorance. It teaches the highest lesson concerning our obligations to others, these lessons and dozens of others are so easily transferred to other plans of life where they influence conduct and destiny.

Relation of Creamery to Farmer.

The speaker explained the relation of the creamery to the farmer, that it was a mutual proposition, that the creamery depends on the farmer for cream and the farmer depended on the creamery for a market, and how it would create a national market for their products where now they have to depend on the local market of Haskell to handle the dairy products and accept just what the local conditions would allow, even if it were only 10c per pound, where on the other hand creamery butter had an established market and is bringing 35c at this time.

There is absolutely not an industry of any description for the little invested would do as much for the country as a creamery and he hoped the farmers and business men of this town would take hold and make this creamery a great success and advised its speedy installment so they might be able to take advantage of the summer months.

The enthusiasm aroused at this meeting was such that the creamery is now considered a sure thing.
