## Editor's Viewpoint

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Possibly by now you have read the following story. We reprint it however, because we feel that the wonder of it is too great to neglect. Here is the story of "The Missing Day in Time" as printed in the *Borgher News Herald* on April 12, 1970.

This incident happened while our astronauts and space scientists at Green Belt, Maryland, were checking the position of the sun, moon, and the planets out in space where they would be 10 years and 1000 years from now. This is most important in order to keep the satellite from colliding with another object in one of its orbits.

The necessary information was fed into the computer and it ran the measurement back and forth over the centuries and it came to a halt. The red light came on and the computer stopped.

The information was re-checked and re-fed into the computer. The information was correct; something must have been wrong with the computer. The service man was called. The computer was checked. "It's perfect," he said. The head of operations asked, "What's wrong?" The reply was "WE HAVE FOUND THERE IS A DAY MISSING IN SPACE IN ELAPSED TIME". Our space program had bogged down. There was no answer!

One of the men on the team spoke up, "You know, one time I was in Sunday School and we talked about the sun standing still. He took his Bible and turned to the book of Joshua where the Lord said to Joshua, 'Fear them not. I have delivered them into thy hand; there shall not a man of them stand before thee'. Joshua and his men were surrounded by the enemy and if darkness fell they would be slaughtered. Joshua petitioned the Lord that the sun stand still. What was the result? 'The sun stood still and the moon stayed - and hastened to go down about a whole day!' The space men queried "That might be our missing day. Let's check the computer and see". They checked the sun's position in Joshua's day and found that it was close but not close enough. THE ELAPSED TIME IN JOSHUA'S DAY WAS 23 HOURS AND 20 MINUTES - not a whole day. They read the Bible and there it was - "about a day," that is, approximately.

These little words in the Bible were important words to our spacemen. But they were still in trouble, because if you cannot account for 40 minutes, you will still be in trouble 1000 years from now. "Somewhere in the Bible it speaks of the sun moving backwards," said the space scientist. They got out the Bible and read the words in II Kings 20:9-11: "Hezekiah, on his deathbed, was visited by the prophet Isaiah, who told him that he was not going to die. Hezekiah asked for a sign as proof. Isaiah asked, 'Do you want the sun to go ahead ten degrees?' Hezekiah said, 'It is nothing for the sun to go ahead ten degrees, but let the shadow return backward ten degrees.'" Isaiah spoke to the Lord and the Lord brought the shadow ten degrees BACKWARD! TEN DEGREES IS EXACTLY 40 MINUTES!

Twenty-three hours and 20 minutes in Joshua 10, plus 40 minutes in II Kings 20 making the missing 24 hours the space traveler had to log in the log-book as being the missing day in the universe!

## Revenue Sharing Funds To Bring New Jail Facilities

According to City Manager Gary Bean the Revenue Sharing Allocation received by the City of Burkburnett for the entitlement period beginning January 1, 1973 and ending June 30, 1973 will be applied to the construction of new jail facilities and to the purchase of new equipment as capital expenditures.

## Transfer Form Required Before June 1 In Burk

Any student attending Burkburnett Schools during the current school year who lives outside the boundaries of the school district and wishes to continue to attend Burkburnett Schools must complete a Transfer Form before June 1. This form may be completed at the Office of the Superintendent, 408 Glendale, Burkburnett.

## Enrollment Requirements Specified

Parents with children to be enrolled in Burkburnett Public School District for the fall term 1973-74 are advised by Superintendent James Pearson to secure and present at the time of enrollment the following:

1. Immunization Record from a licensed physician of
  - a. DPT-a series of 3, one of which has been since age 4.
  - b. Sabin Polio-a series of 3, one of which has been since age 4.
  - c. Rubella vaccine or the history of 7 day measles.
  - d. Rubella vaccine (3 day measles) is required regardless of disease.
2. An official Birth Certificate from the bureau of Vital Statistics of the state of birth must also be presented at the time of enrollment.

Kindergarten and 1st grade students will be enrolled at the Southside School May 15, at 1 p.m. Hardin Primary School will enroll May 16 at 1 p.m. and Sheppard-Burk in August, for next school year. The above certificates must be completed and presented in order for a student to enroll.

To be eligible for 1st grade a child must be 6 on or before September 1, 1973. Students to be eligible for Kindergarten must be 5 years and 7 months of age by Sept. 1, 1973. Public kindergarten is by choice and not compulsory this year. Students age 5 years by Sept. 1, 1973 who are eligible for kindergarten because of hearing or speech handicaps, language barriers, or whose family income would qualify may submit application to the assessor superintendent. These students should present an immunization record and official birth certificate to the school nurse's office prior to application.

## Educational TV Permit Granted To Wichita Falls

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has granted Wichita Falls Educational Translator, Inc., a permit to construct a non-commercial educational television station in Wichita Falls. Channel 24 on the UHF television band has been assigned to the non-profit corporation organized this past fall for the purpose of rebroadcasting Channel 13 of Dallas-Fort Worth.

In making the announcement, Ray Farabee, President of Wichita Falls Educational Translator stated that the organization has already ordered the RCA TTU-1 BLA transmitter to be used, and "we are hopeful that Channel 24 will be broadcasting Sesame Street, The Electric Company and public broadcast network programs by September of 1973."

"The actual timing for commencement of broadcasting is dependent upon public contributions being received in sufficient amounts to purchase the required equipment, and also upon the time which the FCC grants Andrews Tower Rental of Fort Worth a permit to furnish microwave service to the Wichita Falls station."

The Wichita Falls station will broadcast from approximately 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m., and will be available without charge to

all persons having a UHF band on their television set. All television sets manufactured since 1963 have a UHF band, as well as the VHF band, which broadcast Channel 3, 6 and 7 in this area. There will be no commercial advertising on the station. The FCC prohibits the sale of advertising on non-commercial television stations. Construction and maintenance of the station is dependent upon receiving contributions of money from the public. **Help Needed  
For CONCERN**

SHEPPARD AFB, TEXAS-- The phone rings and the person on duty answers, not knowing whether the caller will merely request information on drugs or cry for help from the crush of depression. The listener hears the person out, answers any questions, and, if the situation warrants, sends help. Similar calls come at anytime, day or night, seven days a week, on any topic.

Since 1969, Wichita Falls and Sheppard have had the outstanding service of a telephone crisis intervention center called Concern, ready to help people in the area with problems ranging from loneliness to immediate emergencies like drug overdose. The 85 people of Concern are willing to listen to a problem--any problem--and offer help when it is asked for.

Concern was established by a group at University Methodist Church in Wichita Falls which was bothered by the rising rates of divorce, alcoholism, depression and other problems in the community.

Deciding to do something, the group, with the help of other area churches, formed a telephone listening service. To make sure the listeners manning the phones were prepared, they invited authorities from the community to speak on a variety of subjects.

Since then, the listeners of Concern have handled calls

from approximately 10 per cent of the Wichita Falls population. The problems have ranged from abortion, alcoholics, legal matters, and suicide; calls have come from all age groups. Many of the calls have been referred to experts--if the caller requests it--and many problems have been solved on the spot simply because someone was available to listen.

Concern listeners are a special group. "Requirements for listeners are warmth, empathy, and genuineness," writes Mrs. David Wright, Concern president. "Just being a warm person who can listen with compassion and without judgement, and can keep a confidence."

"Concern listeners have also undergone a pretty stiff self-analysis concerning their true motives in becoming a listener," she adds.

The listeners must maintain anonymity from the callers; the service is strictly a telephone operation. If a caller requests counseling, a list of ministers is nearby, one of whom is on call on a 24-hour basis.

The listeners themselves are a mixed group from the town and the base, and like the callers, they range in age from university students to retired people. "Concern is a ministry to make people feel better," says Mrs. Wright.

Recognizing the value of Concern, Sheppard and its Social Actions Office have taken part in cooperating with the service. Colonel Silver Chism Sheppard Social Action Officer,

**"We'll Have To Rebuild, But We'll Compete" . . . Smiley**

By now it's a well known fact that the Bulldogs have a new leader in Coach Pat Smiley. Smiley was chosen by Burkburnett school officials as head coach and athletic director. He was the number one assistant until recently when Coach Bill Froman left for the top position at Corsicana.

Smiley commented to reporters that he felt the Bulldogs would have to rebuild next year in order to match the fine team exhibited this year but, "It's a tough act to follow and all that, but we'll compete. We got a good taste of winning last year and the past four or five and this serves as a

challenge to the kids coming up."

The other members of the coaching staff are not definite at this time although Smiley reported that one of the coaches will be following Bill Froman at Corsicana. "I'm just getting into this. It will be a few days before I know in what capacity I will have to hire assistants," he said.

Coach Smiley is a native of Madill, Oklahoma and has had coaching experience at Justin, Texas. For the last seven years he has been the Burkburnett defensive coach and currently teaches Drivers Education in addition to his coach-

ing duties.

Burkburnett School Superintendent James Pearson commented that officials reviewed the home coaches for the choice instead of considering outsiders right off the bat. "We had some calls but we told them that we were looking at our people. We felt he could do the job we wanted. We also felt he had the experience and the know-how."

Whatever the outcome may be in the coaching department at Burkburnett High School, there is a general sigh of relief to be expressed now that the Bulldogs once more have a head coach.

**Caution Urged In Using Pesticides**

Two years of research by the Texas Department of Agriculture shows that the farmer and the city dweller must continue efforts to use pesticides wisely, Commissioner John C. White has announced.

Cities make significant contributions to pesticide contamination in Texas streams and rivers, the study revealed.

"The city dweller adds his share of pesticide pollution by using too much of the chemical and by pouring the excess down drains. Just as does the farmer, the home owner also contributes to pesticide residue in waterways by the wash-off from rains and the natural leaching of chemicals in the soil," Commissioner White explained.

A report of the study, "An Evaluation of the Pesticide Residues on Silt and Sediment in Texas Waterways," has just been published and is available to the public.

Research was conducted by Brooke Tidwell III, formerly an aquatic biologist with the Texas Department of Agriculture, and W.E. McCasland, chief chemist of the Department's pesticide laboratory in Brenham.

A total of 433 samples were taken at intervals from eight major Texas rivers and three smaller streams from June 1971 to August 1972.

Over 50% of the samples contained one or more residues with the heaviest concentrations in the agricultural drainage basins. However, the study

revealed that large quantities of long-life pesticides have not been used extensively in the recent past.

"As of December 31, 1972, widespread DDT usage was halted in Texas. Farmers are observing the regulations established for controlled use of pesticides. In fact, the entire agricultural community is working to preserve the environment which holds its future," Commissioner White said.

Samples from five stations on the Trinity River at the Greater Ft. Worth-Dallas area showed the extent of city pesticide pollution.

The samples revealed that the metropolitan sites had a 37% concentration of DDT while no residue was found in any sample taken on the Trinity River at Boyd, about 50 miles north of Ft. Worth. The concentrations of the residues found in the Trinity for compounds other than DDT were considerably greater than any other residues throughout the state.

"We urge all users to be cautious. Material is available in the correct use of pesticides from the Department and on the product labels," Commissioner White stated. "Everyone must share the responsibility for clean waterways."

**That's A Lot  
Of Chicken**

By the end of the school year, Texas will have received more than 5.8 million pounds of chicken for schools in the National School Lunch Program.

This is Texas' share of frozen cut-up chicken bought by the U.S. Department of Agriculture to help schools meet protein requirements of lunches served under the program. This amounts to around 9.9 average servings for each Texas child who eats lunch at a participating school.

Deliveries of the chicken began on September 1 of last year and will continue through May.

The National School Lunch Program is administered in Texas by the Texas Education Agency in cooperation with USDA's Food and Nutrition Service. Chicken and other foods donated by the federal government are distributed to schools through the State Department of Public Welfare.

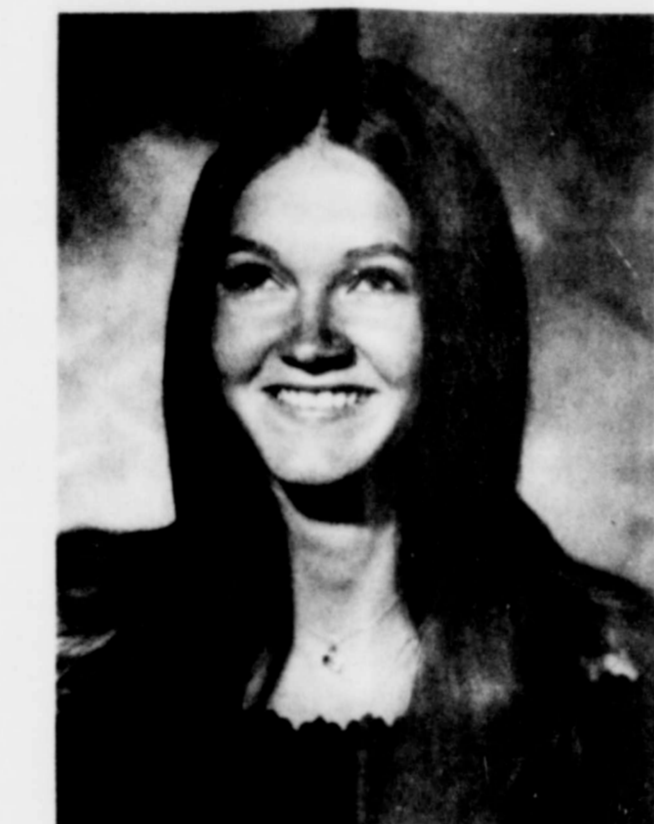

## MS Fund Offers Humanistic Goal

The 1973 campaign to raise funds for the National Multiple Sclerosis Society deserves the attention and support of all Americans, not only because of the humanistic aspects but because of the economic aspects.

Multiple sclerosis is a crippling, generally progressive disorder that most often strikes tragically at young adults between the ages of 20 and 40, their most productive years. To date, we do not know what causes it. We do not have a cure. We do not even have a truly effective treatment.

In an effort to wipe out MS in the same way that polio was virtually wiped out 15 years ago, President Nixon and Congress have created a National Advisory Commission on Multiple Sclerosis, aimed at concentrating our country's research efforts into the most productive channels.

Two out of three of all MS patients are lost to the country's labor force. When family members are considered, this means that more than 2 million persons in the United States must bear this intolerable economic and emotional burden. The cost to the nation, it has been estimated, is in excess of \$2 billion each year.

As former U.S. Attorney General Nicholas B. Katzenbach put it recently: "We can't afford multiple sclerosis, much less abide it."

The National Multiple Sclerosis Society is the only national voluntary agency supporting worldwide research on MS. Since its inception in 1946 it has allocated more than \$20 million to research and millions more to actual care and services for patients.

The forms request information on such events as hail occurrences, winds which cause damage, tornadoes, etc., if these events happen to occur near the respondent's home. Each time a severe event occurs, the information should be entered on the form. It is designed so that information from a number of storms can be recorded and should be returned when it is full or after May 31, whichever comes first.
