The Burkburnett School Board met Monday night at 7 p.m. to discuss bids for the proposed high school fieldhouse. Apparent low bidder had

been F&W Construction Co. of Wichita Falls with a base bid of \$87,157.

Building committee head Norman Roberts told the board

that his committee met earlier and considered different aspects of the matter. Their recommendation to the board would be to Reopen for bids on the

fieldhouse later. He said that the committee felt a not so close time limit might bring in lower bids. This would also give the board time to look in to the plumbing code laws and possibly save money there. Roberts also suggested that plans be redesigned and alternate specifications included in the new bid request.

After discussion by the board concerning several possible plan alterations, board member C.J. Lippard made the motion that the board comply with the building committee request to reject all bids and accept resubmission of bids with discussed alternates included.

Thurman Allison seconded the motion and all present approved.

The board voted to set April 25 at 7 p.m. as the date for opening new bids and extended the completion date to July 1, 1975 (with contractor setting own completion date).

C.J. Lippard, John Gill, and James Pearson were named to a plumbing code committee. Board members Chittum and Schroeder were not present.

## City Receives Sales Tax Revenues

The City of Burkburnett received city sales tax revenues for the last quarter of 1973 recently, totaling \$20,794.75.

The 1972 total of the final quarter was \$16,133. This shows an increase of \$4,661 over the 1972 final period total.

Sales tax checks sent to other cities in the area for the final quarter of 1973 were: Electra, \$13,838; Henrietta, \$8,639; Iowa Park, \$10,637; Jacksboro, \$17,917; Olney, \$12,664; Quanah, \$1,858; Vernon, \$58,882; Windthorst, \$1,552; and Wichita Falls, \$624,356.

AUSTIN, Tex. — It's show and tell time for political candidates, and many of them don't have as much to show as they would like to for their fund-raising efforts.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe ran second to Republican gubernatorial candidate Jim Granberry in campaign spending up to March 25, according to the first contribution-spending reports filed with the secretary of state.

Granberry reported contributions and loans of \$171,425 (including \$22,500 of his own money) and spending of \$171,425 since last summer when he began his race.

Briscoe's spending — including a \$120,000 loan of his own money — was pegged at \$153,754.

Frances "Sissy" Farenthold reported some \$40,865 in expenditures and debts.

The effort is far below that of 1972 when Briscoe spent nearly \$1.6 million in the primaries, and Mrs. Farenthold spent \$672,441.

Comptroller Candidate Bob Bullock has reported spending of about \$60,000 in his Democratic race, and Hugh Eduberg said he has outlays of about \$12,900.

Eduberg acknowledged he is using about \$7,000 of his own money. Bullock said he has used \$12,600 from his own resources, and has \$38,300 in loans from his business partner, Ken Wendler of Austin.

**PRISONER COLLEGE PLAN OFFERED** — Prison inmates at Ramsey Unit will be the first in the U.S. to be offered a chance at four-year college degrees through the University of Houston at Clear Lake City.

Junior college associate degrees have been available since 1965 through special programs. Thirty-to-60 students will begin classes at Ramsey Unit in June. Next fall, Stephen F. Austin University is due to extend courses to inmates at Coffield Unit near Palestine.

"The more education a man has, the less likely he is to return to prison," said State Prison System Director W. J. Estelle.

**Farmers' Response To Adversity Noted**

U.S. agriculture's ability to respond quickly to need was clearly demonstrated last spring, says the associate dean of Texas A&M's College of Agriculture.

L. S. Pope points out that planting of millions of acres of farm land was delayed by torrential rains, floods, and cold wet conditions.

By May 15, it looked as though a disaster was shaping up in Texas and elsewhere," he adds.

In less developed nations of the world, these same conditions would have meant disaster and famine.

"But the modern American farmer—equipped with technology, machinery, fertilizers, chemicals, and 'know-how' — almost completely overcame this disadvantage of nature," Pope notes.

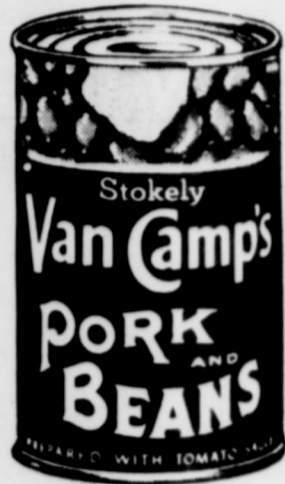

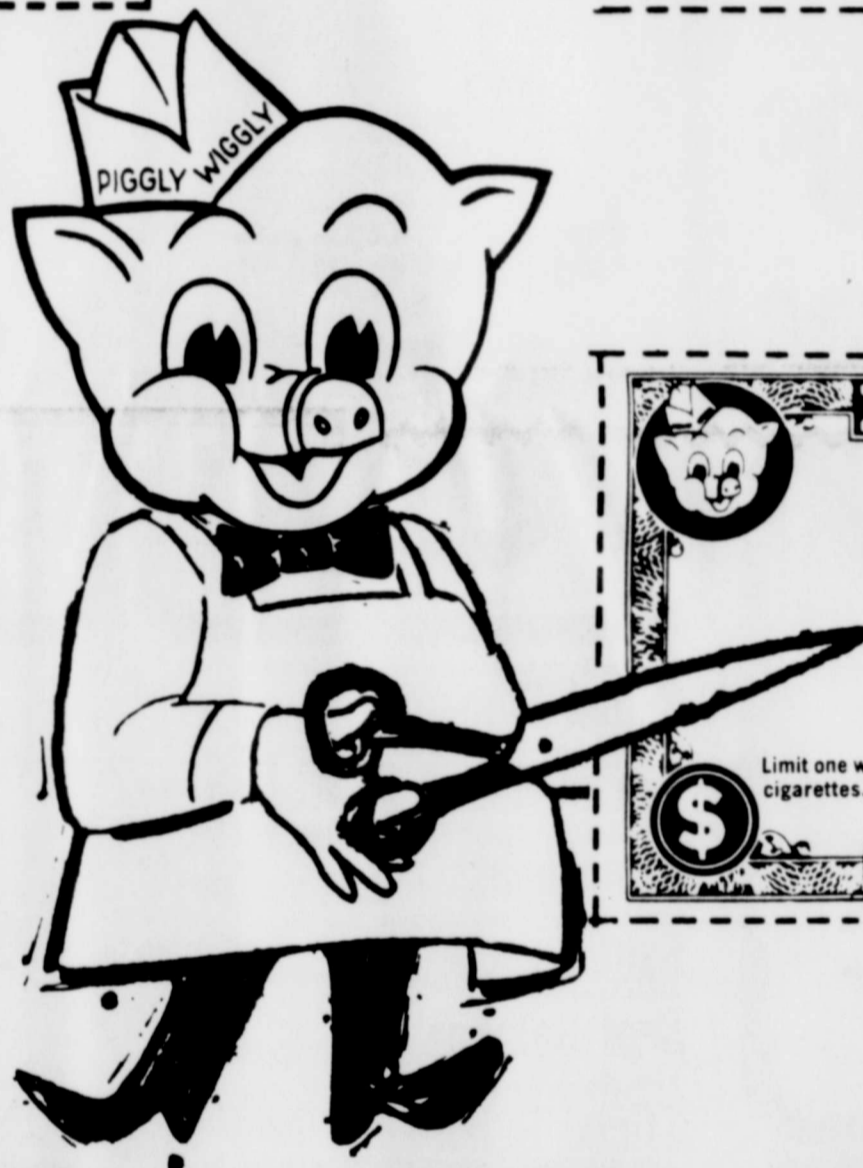

# Sheppard Notes

The little red and white single engine propeller driven airplane seen buzzing around the skies over Sheppard Air Force Base, is the newest addition to the Aero Club's impressive inventory of planes.

The new plane is a Beechcraft Sierra 200 and is the most sophisticated plane in the club's inventory to date.

According to Colonel Robert R. Reid, club president, "the new plane is ideal for those who are working toward their commercial pilot rating."

With the addition of the Beechcraft the club now has six planes for the use by members. Four are Cessna 150's and one Cessna 172. The club has eight people who are qualified instructors.

The club is self sustaining in that the members pay for the aircraft, classroom instruction, individual flight instruction, training supplies, initiation fees, club dues, and rental of the plane.

Thirty-five hours of flying time is the minimum amount required by the Federal Aviation Agency for a private pilot's license.

Membership in the club is open to all active duty and retired military people and their dependants, and with certain exceptions, all civilians working at Sheppard.

For further information as to eligibility for membership, persons are asked to call the Aero Club at 855-2311.

The first bid will be opened 9 a.m. April 30, 1974; the second bid will be opened 9 a.m. May 1, and the third bid will be opened 9 a.m. May 2.

Major General Howard M. Fish, director of budget, Office of the Comptroller of the Air Force, arrived at Sheppard Air Force Base Tuesday morning for a two-day visit.

Following his arrival, General Fish was briefed on the Sheppard Technical Training Center mission by Colonel T.B. Buechler, director of plans and programming; and met with Major General Robert L. Petit, center commander.

He also heard briefings and had tours of the School of Health Care Sciences conducted by Colonel D.B. Wagner, executive officer of the school; the 80th Flying Training Wing, conducted by Colonel Kirk A. Brown, wing commander; and the Department of Civil Engineering Training of the School of Applied Aerospace Sciences conducted by Colonel James H. Caldwell, department chief.

Wednesday's itinerary will consist of breakfast at Codner Hall, and briefings and tours of the Departments of Aircraft Maintenance Training and Comptroller Training of the School of Applied Aerospace Sciences.

Colonel Robert R. Reid Jr., chief of the Department of Aircraft Maintenance Training, conducted the tour in that department; and Colonel Marvin R. Boothe, chief of the Department of Comptroller Training, conducted the tour in that department. Colonel Boothe was also escort officer for General Fish's visit.

General Fish, who assumed his present duties in October 1973, was a private in the Army Air Corps in 1942 who rose to the star rank. During World War II, he was a navigator in the

European Theater of Operations on a B-17 aircraft crew with the 301st Bombardment Group in Italy.

A graduate of the Air Command and Staff College, the Armed Forces Staff College and the Air War College, he has a master's degree in business administration from the University of Chicago as well as a master's in international affairs from George Washington University.

General Fish first entered the comptroller career field in October 1957 when he was assigned first as a wing comptroller for the 60th Troop

Carrier Wing at Drew Air Base, France, then as comptroller for the 7310th Air Base Wing at Rhein-Main Air Base, Germany.

In March 1969, General Fish was named director of tactical analysis, 7th Air Force, Republic of Vietnam, then went to Headquarters United States Air Force as deputy director of plans for Force Development in July 1970. He was appointed Deputy Director of Budget at Headquarters United States Air Force in February 1971.

James P. Goode, Assistant Secretary of the Air Force for Manpower and Reserve Affairs, will be featured speaker at the fifteenth annual Wichita Falls-Sheppard Air Force Base Squadron Adoption Program dinner to be held April 23.

The dinner, to be hosted by Sheppard Air Force Base, will be held at the Sheppard Officers Club beginning at 6:30 p.m.

James T. Montgomery, director of the Squadron Adoption

Program will be introduced by Major General Robert L. Petit, commander of Sheppard Technical Training Center.

The dinner is held each year to climax the activities of the various squadron-sponsor teams. It will be attended by representatives of the 56 adopters in Wichita Falls, Burkburnett and Iowa Park and their adopted squadrons. The adopters are composed of business, civic and service organizations.

The program was originated by Colonel Floyd Taylor, who served as coordinator of the program until 1973 when he moved to San Antonio. Mr. Montgomery, who was serving as special liaison officer for the German Air Force students in the program at that time, became director when Colonel Taylor moved.

The purpose of the program, which has remained constant through the years, is to create an atmosphere between the two

groups of understanding and appreciation of one another.

It is through this relationship that the men and women in the local area become acquainted with airmen at Sheppard and that the Sheppard airmen learn about local residents.

Each squadron and sponsor team tailors its activities to meet the interests and capabilities of that group throughout the year. These vary greatly from squadron to squadron. Dann Barger of Brownwood is new superintendent of the Crockett State School. Kraege Polan Jr., former aide to Speaker Price Daniel Jr., has joined the staff of Rep. Carl Parker of Port Arthur in his campaign for speaker.

Rep. Dan Kubiak of Rockdale is a new member of the Education Commission of the States, a national organization of state leaders and educators.

**MIGRANT OFFICE CREATED** — A Migrant Affairs Office and Migrant Fuel Allocation Plan for Texas were set up by executive order of the governor last week.

The MAC will act as liaison with all agencies which serve migrant groups and try to identify present and future resources at federal, state and local levels to aid with problems.

The fuel program will permit migrants to obtain gasoline at 51 designated truck stops as they move north during agricultural seasons.

**"PRIVATE" SUPERPORT ENDORSED** — A Senate committee endorsed private ownership of a Texas superport, but two coastal area senators objected.

The Committee report said it is not "the responsibility of state government to underwrite this kind of risk when private enterprise is ready and willing to accept the challenge." Sens. D. Roy Harrington of Port Arthur and Bob Gammage of Houston said state ownership of the proposed offshore unloading terminal for oil tankers is in the best public interest.

Atty. Gen. John Hill has been asked for an opinion on whether free newspaper space devoted to signed columns by political candidates is covered by law requiring reports of campaign contributions.

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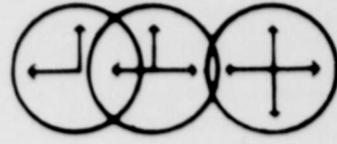

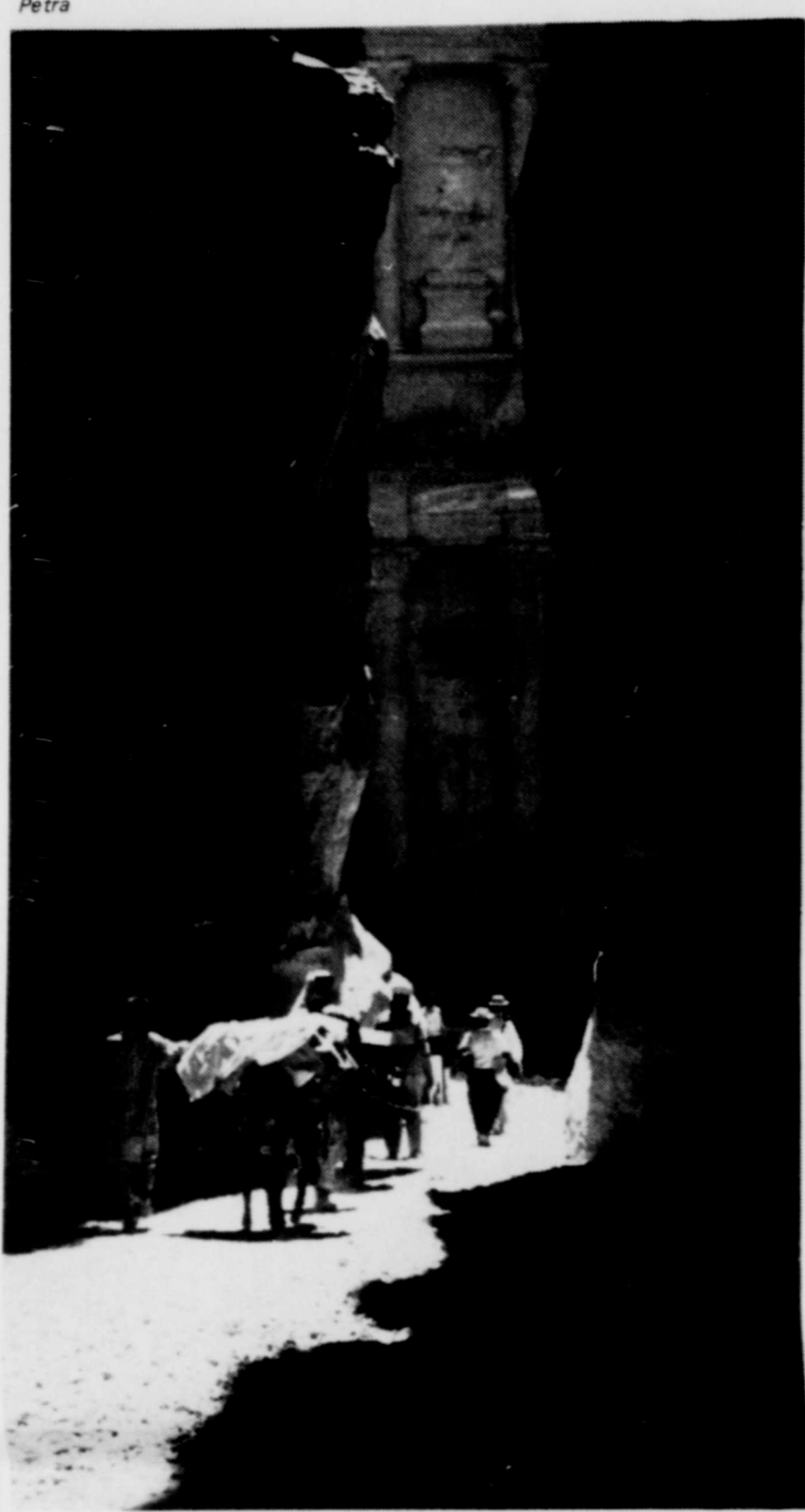

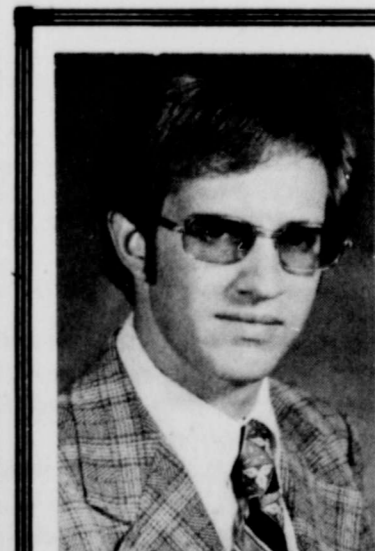

**LIVESTOCK INDUSTRY FACING UNCERTAINTY**--Rising feed costs, financial losses on slaughter steers and a six percent decrease in consumer consumption have combined to make this an uncertain time for cattlemen. Probably the main factor affecting the industry has been the rising cost of feed, said Agriculture Commissioner John C. White. But, he added, the housewife's cutback on beef and the supermarket's contentment at selling less beef at higher prices are contributing to the industry's problems.

# County Agent News

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has recently announced an increase in the interest rate of commodity loans to grain producers, effective with 1974 crop year loans. The increase from 5.5 to 7.25 per cent per year, will more nearly reflect the borrowing costs of the money to the Commodity Credit Corporation.

Warehouse and farm storage loan service fees have also been increased to reflect additional costs in processing commodity loans on grains. Warehouse storage loan service fees are increased from \$4 to \$6 per loan plus \$1 for each additional warehouse receipt over one.

Service fees on farm stored loans are increased from \$8 to \$10 per loan plus \$1 for each additional bin over one. These increases will also be effective with 1974 crop year loans.

Screwworms could reach record levels this year due to the unusually mild weather just ended unless livestock producers take special precautions. Livestock surgery is a primary reason for many screwworm cases and should be avoided. Animals should be inspected frequently, all wounds should be treated, and all worm samples should be sent to the Screwworm Lab.

Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White recently noted that Texas ranks third nationally in total farm income.

A livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service gives several reasons for declining feeder cattle market in recent weeks. First of all, feeder animals were over-priced compared to fat cattle. Also, feeder cattle supplies were up, as reflected by a 17 per cent increase in the January sales of cattle and calves at Texas auctions compared to a year ago. The price drop in the fed cattle market further weakened feeder prices.

Instead of staking and pruning tomatoes this year, you might like to use wire cages to support the plants. Caging rather than staking and pruning offers the home vegetable gardener several advantages, including less sun burn of the fruit, fewer disease problems and higher yields, all with much less work.

The cages can be constructed from concrete reinforcing wire, hog wire, or any other sturdy wire mesh that has openings of at least four to six inches and is three-and-a-half to five feet wide. Cut and bend the mesh material into cylinders 16 to 20 inches in diameter, fasten the ends together and snip off the bottom rung so the cages can be pushed into the ground about six inches deep for support.

A "mini-garden" or growing vegetables in containers, is just the thing for apartment dwellers and others who don't have enough space for a full-fledged garden. Vegetables suitable for growing in containers include eggplant, tomatoes, peppers, green onions, squash, radishes, parsley, and herbs. Containers can be placed on a window sill, patio, or doorstep--anywhere they will receive plenty of sunlight. Container vegetables do best in a synthetic soil mixture.

Consumers deserve an explanation on the costs that make up the price of bread. Looking at a 47-cent pound-and-a-half loaf, here's the cost breakdown: Farmer, 8.5 cents; miller, 2.5 cents; baker, 28 cents; retailer, 8 cents. The baker's costs include such items as profit, transportation, advertising, overhead and packaging. The pound-and-a-half loaf contains a little less than a pound of wheat. For this loaf to cost \$1 as some bakers have recently speculated, the price of wheat to the farmer would have to jump more than 60 cents, or about \$30 a bushel, compared to a current price of \$4.58 a bushel.

## WEEKLY MARKET REPORT

Beef prices are "more pleasing" than they have been for some time, according to one observer.

Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, listed round steaks and roasts, ground beef, arm and blade pot roasts and steaks as showing best values currently.

"Pork values include shoulder roasts and steaks, end-cut loin roasts and chops. Some brands of bacon are down in price, too."

Citing turkey and turkey parts among the most economical, high-quality protein foods available, Mrs. Clyatt suggested roasting a larger turkey and using leftover cooked meat for later meals.

Turning to fruit counters, the specialist noted that ample quantities of apples, grapefruit and oranges are available in the moderate price range.

"Reasonable Temple oranges are still around at attractive retail prices."

"Murcotts (honey tangerines) are slightly higher priced than Temple oranges--but they're very good, and pineapples from Mexico are plentiful."

Strawberries, bananas, cantaloupe, honeydew and watermelon are available at various price levels, and soft-shell squash prices are trending downward.

Fresh vegetables in good supply at the most economical prices include cabbage, carrots, mustard, collards, turnip and greens, broccoli, radishes and green onions, the specialist said.

**CONSUMER WATCH--** WORDS: There's no saving in buying a less expensive cut of meat if most of it is bone and fat. In roasting beef, slow cooking keeps meat from drying out and shrinking--and that saves money.

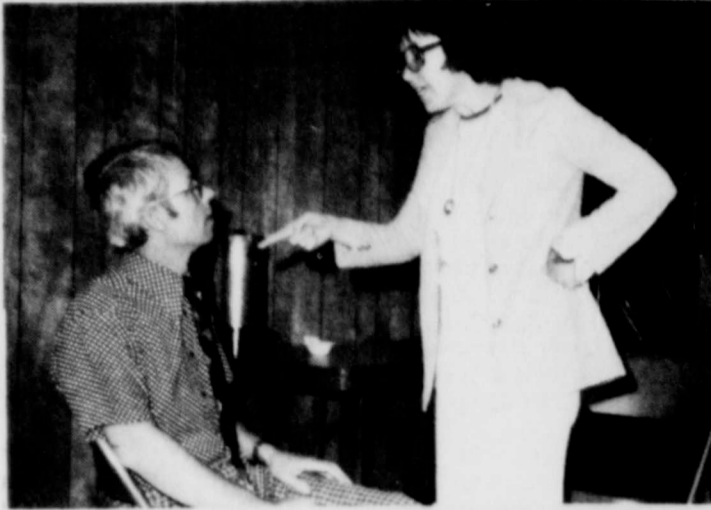

**Peanut Hulls Provide New Fuel Source**

It's not peanuts, but their hulls that are warming the hearths of ecology-minded homeowners this year. A non-smoking, long-burning fire log made from peanut hulls is agriculture science's newest approach to

the energy crisis. Produced commercially for the first time this winter, the logs are made from ground hulls mixed with waxes and compressed into standard fireplace-size. Besides providing a new fuel for home owners, the logs solve a disposal problem for surplus hulls. Traditionally, hulls left over from usual uses like

cattle feed, poultry litter, and garden mulch have been burned in large incinerators near shelling plants.

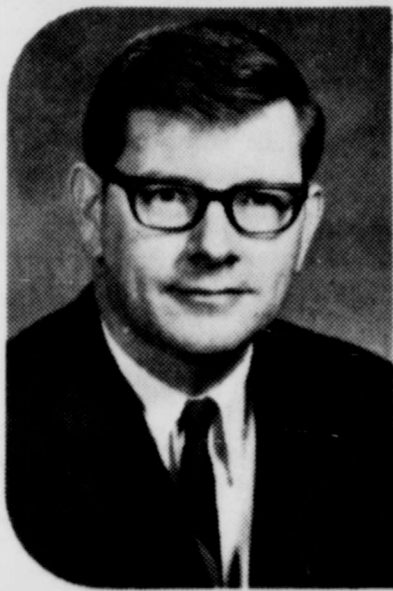

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## Grant Is Announced

One hundred thirty-three children from low-income families are being served through an Office of Human Development grant that Governor Dolph Briscoe announced Friday.

The grant to the Community Action Corporation of Wichita Falls and North Texas Area includes \$27,862 in new federal funds and authorizes use of \$4,825 in carryover funds for full-day Head Start. Funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act, the grant is effective retroactively from March 1, 1974 through Feb. 28, 1975.

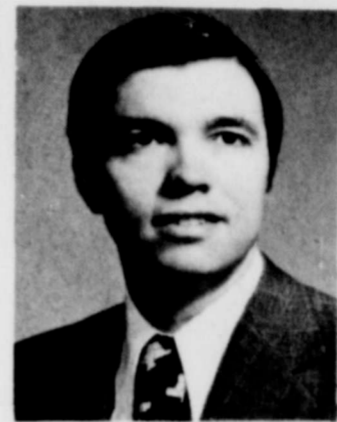
Objective of the program is to provide a comprehensive preschool program for children ages 3-6 in Burk Burnett, Henrietta, and Wichita Falls.
