A PROMINENT HASKELL LADY DEAD

MRS. J. F. CLARK DIES FROM HEART FAILURE. REMAINS LAID TO REST IN THE CITY CEMETERY AT ABILENE HER FORMER HOME.

The many friends in Haskell of Mrs. J. F. Clark were shocked to learn of her sudden death which occurred last Saturday. Mr. and Mrs. Clark have lived here only a short while, but have won many warm friends, whom the Free Press joins in sincere condolence to the bereft husband, son and daughter, and other sorrowing relatives.

The remains were taken to Abilene for interment.

We clip the following notices from the Abilene Sunday and Monday Daily Reporter, with reference to her death and burial:

From Abilene Daily Reporter

Abilene was inexpressibly shocked to hear of the sad death of Mrs. J. F. Clark, which occurred at Haskell, Texas, a few minutes after midnight Saturday morning.

Death came very suddenly, Mrs. Clark having eaten a hearty supper and retired, feeling well as usual but later in the night she was suffering from insomnia and took a dose of powders she was accustomed to take for such trouble and fell asleep.

Near the midnight hour Mr. Clark awoke, and finding Mrs. Clark breathing unnaturally, hastily called a physician, but death came before his arrival.

The attending physician pronounced that death came from heart failure.

Relatives here being notified, Mrs. L. T. Young and Geo. S. Brown, sister and brother respectively of Mrs. Clark, left on the early morning train for Haskell, and the funeral party reached this city at 9:35 last night on the Abilene & Northern train.

The funeral will take place from the J. F. Clark old home-stead, 410 Cypress street, this afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Mrs. Clark was a member of the Methodist church and always took an active part in church work and church society work and was much beloved here where she resided for more than a quarter of a century. She was fifty years of age and came from one of the best families in the South.

She leaves a husband, two children, Miss Nannie B. Clark and Julian Clark, both grown and the latter living at Dallas, a sister, Mrs. L. T. Young; a brother, Geo. S. Brown, both living in Abilene; a nephew, W. G. Swedson, Abilene, and niece, Mrs. E. G. Batjar, Abilene; Mrs. Walter Jennings, Abilene and Mrs. John T. Woodson, Kirkland, Texas, and Miss Nannie Louise Brown, Abilene.

The family and relatives have the heartfelt sympathy of all the citizens of Abilene in the loss of a noble, christain wife, mother, sister and aunt.

SOME BRIGHT PROSPECTS FOR OIL AROUND HASKELL

OIL MEN AND COMPANIES LEASING LANDS AND WILL BORE FOR OIL. PROSPECTS ARE BRIGHT AND IT IS CONFIDENTLY BELIEVED THAT RICH DEPOSITS OF OIL, GAS AND MINERALS WILL SOON BE DISCOVERED NEAR THE CONCRETE CITY

For some time there has been some excitement over the oil prospects in the eastern part of the county. A company at Stamford was organized some time ago, and stock was sold to raise funds to put down a test well on a tract of land in this county owned by Dr. Bunkley of Stamford. As soon as this became known, there was a rush of oil experts to this county, to make leases. A man by the name of Clemenger of Houston has leased a number of large bodies of land in the southeast part of the county. J. F. Colt,

of Shreveport, La., has leased the north part of Judge Scott's ranch, and Dr. Bunkley of Stamford has leased the south part of the ranch for the Stamford Company. Both leases cover several thousand acres. Mr. Josselet, who owns several thousand acres five miles north of Haskell, has leased his land. T. E. Ballard and J. L. Baldwin have leased their ranches in the east part of the county, which involve about ten thousand acres, and we heard rumors of many other large leases that we have not been able to verify. One of the

lessees has a geologist from Harvard University and is going about his business in a scientific way.

From a rumor we have not been able to verify, there is reason to believe a test has already been made, by sinking a well in the northern part of Shackelford county, near the south line of this county, and the hole plugged up until the parties can make leases on adjoining lands.

It is believed the Haskell Prospect is in the Electra oil belt and is soon to become one of the most famous oil fields discovered

in this State.

In this connection, we may say, there are other nice things coming to Haskell in 1912. We look for the year 1912 to bring the greatest development Haskell has ever witnessed. Now is the time to invest in Haskell town property. Neither city nor town values will ever be as low again. It is almost impossible to realize what the near future promises. PRIMARY SENTIMENT GROWING

AN APPEAL TO DEMOCRATS TO GET IN LINE AND ADOPT PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARIES IN TEXAS. PROMINENT DEMOCRATS FAVOR THEM.

Mart, Texas, Jan. 8.—The following address has been issued to the Democrats of Texas:

"Previous notice has been given of the organization of the People's Rule (Democratic) League. As outlined in the preliminary announcement one of the objects for which the League was organized is to secure the adoption of the presidential primary in Texas. While our present election law contains a provision which can be utilized to secure a presidential primary, yet the law does not go far enough and it is the desire and wish of a large number of the democratic voters that a presidential primary be held. The state committee will, as a matter of course, follow long established precedents in the state by ordering primary conventions which will select delegates to county conventions which in turn will send delegates to the state convention and the state convention when assembled will select delegates to the national convention and make such instructions as its membership desires. If this procedure is followed the members of the state committee will be acting entirely within their powers and consistent with past methods in this state with but one exception. As the matter stands now no one is authorized to say to the state committee that the Democratic voters of this state favor this or that plan. The only way to ascertain with even reasonable accuracy the wishes of the democratic voters is to circulate petitions among the democrats asking the committee to call a presidential primary. If a sufficient number of volunteers can be secured who will circulate these petitions, the League will prepare and have printed such petitions and when they have been secured will present them to the state committee. Therefore, every democrat who will volunteer to circulate these petitions and will do so without delay is earnestly requested to send his name and post office address to A. M. Kennedy, Secretary of the League, Mart, Texas. As the League has no funds each person who will agree to circulate these petitions should enclose a stamped self addressed envelope for reply."

There was much comment on the fact that Mr. Bryan showed his approval of Gov. Wilson, and it is stated he would so express himself at the right time.

We wish to comment on the fact, that Haskell is better united and there is less strife among her citizens than we have witnessed for years. Best Java coffee, one pound; rye, three pounds. Carefully clean the rye from all bad grains, wash to remove dust, drain off the water and put the grain into the roaster, carefully stirring to brown it evenly. Roast the coffee separately. Grind the mixture and pack in airtight containers. An essence of coffee was prepared by boiling down molasses until hard and then grinding it to a powder and mixing it with a half pound of good ground Java coffee, using four pounds of the powdered molasses.—From the Ideal Grocer.

Water Elephants in Africa.

The scientific world is still discussing the reported discovery of a new mammal in the Congo state, a mammal known to the natives as the "water elephant." M. Le Petit of the Paris Museum of Natural History recently reported that he saw five of these animals plunging into the water on the northern shore of Lake Leopold the Second. He stated that they appeared to have shorter bodies, smaller ears, and relatively longer necks than ordinary elephants, and apparently were not possessed of trunks. He estimated their height at about six feet. It has been pointed out that the description of the water elephant accords almost exactly with Dr. Anderson's restoration of the paleontological creature which dwelt in the Eocene in the lower tertiary age.

Minerals in the Human Body.

The human body contains, among other constituents, about two pounds of phosphorus, which is essential to the health of the bones and the vigor of the brain. This phosphorus, if extracted and put to another use, would make up about 4,000 packages of friction matches.

Besides phosphorus, the body contains a few ounces of sodium and half an ounce of potassium. The quantity of the latter would be sufficient for many experiments in a class of chemistry.

In addition to sodium and potassium there are a few grains of calcium, enough to make the "silver rain" for a family's stock of rockets on a Fourth of July evening or to create a brilliant light visible at a considerable distance.—Harper's Weekly.

A Word for Rural Mail Carriers.

President L. D. King of the Georgia Rural Letter Carriers' Association, says this week:

I wish every patron of rural delivery had to deliver the mail on a route just one cold, rainy day, I am sure it would be a revelation to some of them.

Winter is on with all its discomforts and I am writing this with the hope that every patron of rural delivery will do all in his power to make the carrier have as little trouble as possible, thus showing appreciation of the service. I am sure every carrier will appreciate this.

In the first place see that your box is correctly and conveniently located and that the carrier has the name of every person who expects mail in this box. The box should be on a good, substantial post, about four feet high. It should extend well over on the carrier's side. Both box and post should be painted white, with the owner's name in black letters on the box.

Then take as many newspapers as you can afford, and have time to read—take good reliable papers.

Keep a supply of stamped envelopes, stamps and cards on hand and always stamp your mail before putting it in the box. When you go to the post office you do not drop your letters and pennies in the box.

Another thing. Buy all your stamps, money orders, etc., from your carrier. Most of them have to make reports of business done each month and if you buy from the carrier he can make a better report, whereas if you purchase elsewhere the route loses that patronage.

If your carrier does anything you like tell other people about it. If he does anything you do not like, tell him.

In this connection, if the patrons who appreciate the service or have any suggestions to make for its improvement would write our general editor, F. L. White, at Buckhead, Ga., I am sure such letters will have due consideration.

In the last place there seems to be a well grounded idea in the mind of some patrons that at hog killing time if they were to put a pound or so of sausage or spare ribs in the box for the carrier, he would be terribly offended. This is a mistake.

In conclusion let me wish for all the carriers and every patron

of rural delivery a happy New Year.
