Historical Collection

material from the museum of the North Texas State Teachers College, Denton, that were used during the Colonial Period. Mr. Reaves has shown to his history classes, and has also made several interesting remarks about each article. Some of the articles are:

1. Sugar cutter: Used for cutting home-made sugar into cubes similar to the cubes we are familiar with today

2. Ink well: Used during the Revolutionary War.

3. New England Primer: This of course was their type of text book. This is an original copy.

4. Flint-Lock Blunderbuss gun: Usually the first thing a child thinks about when you mention colonies is this type of gun and a turkey representing Thanksgiving Day. This gun was made in England and was used during colonial days.

5 Bleeding Knife: In the early days little was known about medicine, and when a person became ill it was thought that his blood was bad and if he was freed of this disease he must get rid of this bad blood, so his veins, usually in his wrist were pierced with this knife. This is the cause of the death of George Washington. Incidentally, Mr. Reaves gave a demonstration, using Gayle Preston as his helper. 6. Bed warmer: Coals were put in this container and it was pushed around under the bed clothes im-

mediately before retiring. 7. Santa Maria: This is a fairly correct model of Columbus' ship, "Santa Maria,"


