

#### THE RELIEF PROBLEM

The federal and state governments are now spending billions of dollars annually in relief work. We are assured it constitutes a necessary expense, and that unless it is kept up this country will undergo a revolution. This is probably true. But certain leaders of thought are commencing to ask questions. They are not worried over the fanancial end of it. They are afraio, as any Burkburnett citizen will be who studies the problem, that it is breeding a type of citizenship that will never Buy Xmas Seals; seek to earn its bread by the sweat of its brow.

We have in this country today a virtual counterpart of the British dole system, and we are beginning to reap the evils of that system. We are creating a class of people who will never willingly work again. They are finding out that the taxpayers will not let them starve; they are learning that they can live without working, and they are growing louder in their demands for what they call "their share." Already in many of the larger cities they are demanding "cash relief" instead of Seal Campaign that is conducted factory work. fuel and food and clothing. And that is a dangerous demand. from Thanksgiving Day to Christ-

We are going to have in this country the problem of relief for a long time to come. Isn't it about time, therefore, that government agencies approached it in a scientific way? We cannot continue as we are doing, for we are merely breeding discontent and bankrupting character. We are spending billions annually, but pleasing neither those who receive nor those who give it. We are facing a problem for which we have not even begun to find a solution.

#### NO FOOD SHORTAGE
