Five Known Dead Seven Missing

The raging flood which sent Red river on its greatest rampage of destruction since 1908 had claimed at least three lives in the Altus area in addition to the two known read at Burkburnett. Seven persons were missing, including four near Altus

Highway and railway traffic alike were completely demoralized thru this section extending across Hardeman, Wilbarger and Wichita counties in Texas. Railway refused to sell tickets to through travelers. Many motorists found their routes blocked, necessitating long detours.

John Pickerell, who alone lived to tell of his car's tragic plunge from the Burk bridge, was rescued by four Burkburnett men after he had been located from the air by Manager Fulcher Armstrong of the Wichita Falls Air Transport company. Mr. Armstrong landed his plane in a small field near the river to direct searchers to the marooned

Jack Brumley, Charlie Grace and Frank Kelly made two unsuccessful attempts to reach Pickerell but found their small motor unable to cope with high waves and the strong current of the river as it passed the island. They were joined by Jimmy Amyx, who provided a larger motor for the third attempt and were able to reach the island.

Brumley was the first to step from the boat.

"The rest are all gone I guess, aren't they?" were the first words Pickrell said to Brumley. Brumley said "yes.

"I don't know how I got through myself," the rescued man declared. He then described to Brumley how the car was swept into the flooded river, as he was making a desperate
