One of the most brilliant editorials printed recently was the one in the Rockville, Conn. Journal. It was titled "Daddy we miss you." A man was killed in an auto accident, and his pockets were searched, there was found a telegram from his small daughter. It was a message that would make any man happy. Just ten words... "WE MISS YOU DADDY. WHENARE YOU COMING HOME?" Quoting the editorial: That was all. It was a message sent by one of the children. He received the message and was homeward bound. The clothes were minus money, but in the pocket he carried that message.

Could there be a more bitter indictment against our carelessness. Little children waiting. A mother, with high hope and love in her heart. The husband trying to find a job or trying to make a living at the one he had—he was hurrying home. Some good luck on his tongue to share with the family.

The father did return home—DEAD. Little children waiting there received the terrible blow—father came home in answer to their petition, but what a life they face without him. The children said that they missed him. How much more they will miss him in the years to come. No one else will ever be able to take the place of that jolly man that was killed so instantly due to somebody's carelessness.

One life more or less doesn't mean much to us. We have to sacrifice to the God of Speed so many thousand each year. Yet we criticize the barbaric practices of savages because they take on an altar one human sacrifice each year to their God. To our own stupidity each year we give these thousands, and each of them may have a child waiting at home—saying—"Daddy We Miss You."

OUR RESPONSIBILITY

A young man was recently convicted and sent to the electric chair in a Northern state for murder. That happens often, and it is not worth editorial mention as a mere incident. However, this time the young man convicted was a graduate of M. I. T., the greatest technical school in the world. He graduated with high honors and was from one of the best families in the state—not a rich family, but an old family that never showed the slightest trace of criminal tendency. The murder for robbery was his first crime. His excuse was that "hunger was stronger urge than morality."

Recognized by the United States department as a clever inventor and a good engineer, he couldn't find a job. A high honor student of a great school, capable and hard working, recognized by every man he worked for as energetic and able. Easy to get along with, but he was hungry.

In that lies our responsibility. In these days, unless a young man has political pull or influence in a company, when he graduates, no matter how good he is, he hasn't much of a chance to get a job. What we ought to do is to make the most important course in our school to be on "How to Get a Job." Then as a social group here in Burkburnett we ought to set about making some organization seeing that capable young men and women are placed in positions where society will benefit.

When society gives a man the technical knowledge that it gave this young man, society will naturally place a dangerous weapon into the hands of a man that it does not protect. A serious indictment it is that we are so careless and indifferent.

HITCH HIKERS

There are plenty of people that are willing to ride at some one else's expense, and in our city we have found people of the same temperament. We are thinking specifically of the clean-up campaign staged each year by the Chamber of Commerce. That civic organization has intended to keep the people reminded of how essential the keeping of our yards and home at all time is. They mean for the people to keep the yard as clean as possible through out the year, and what ever problems the home owners meet with, the organization will help to solve in the spring.

Instead of keeping this spirit manifest, some of the citizens have positively indulged as a sneaking bit of hitch-hiking. They allow the trash to pile up for a whole year. Then when the C of C comes around in the spring, the citizens gets his whole years trash supply hauled away free of charge.

That's what we call a shame. To take advantage of the generosity of a beneficent organization, it is not creditable to anyone. Therefore we are approving of the resolution that the C. of C. is passing to urge the city council to pass a compulsory sanitary and trash hauling ordinance. We hope that the resolution or ordinance includes a stiff enforcement provision. It should require a weekly or monthly inspection and police power sufficient to demand the clearance of blocked and dirty property.

Hitch-hikers are bad enough on the high ways, but when they become a part of the municipal affairs they are infinitely worse. We think all the civic minded citizens should get behind the council and urge that they pass such an ordinance if none exists at the present.

Copper Mine Report Indicates Metal In Paying Quantities

Bureau Of Mines Submits Assay For Local Owners Last Week

The report received by Messrs. Batts, Bell and Gilbert last week indicate that the assay made by the department of interior and the bureau of mines in Washington D. C. indicated that the mines located three miles east of Burkburnett would produce copper in paying quantities if the vein is large enough.

"Specimen No. 1 is made up of small nodules of chalcocite (copper sulphide). If in sufficient quantity, such material would of course make available copper ore.

"Specimen No. 2 is fossil wood largely replaced by pyrites (iron sulphide, FeS 2) which has been weathered into iron oxide.

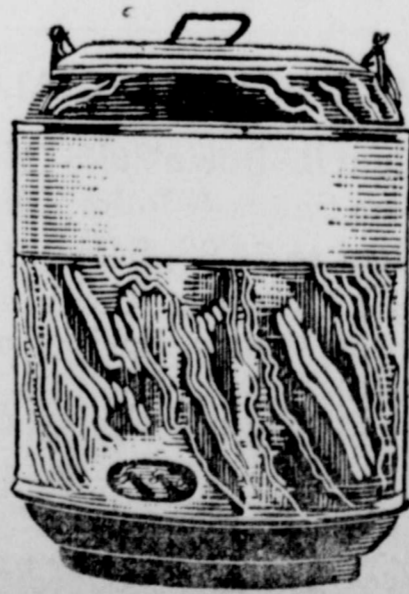
