Burk Gasoline Dealer Succumbs After Months Fight For Life At Hospital

#### ACCIDENTALLY WOUNDED

Jo Coffey, 28, Magnolia salesman for this district who was accidentally shot in the chest with a 32 caliber pistol, Sept. 5, died at Wichita Falls hospital Wednesday night at 10:20 o'clock Coffey had been in the hospital since the day following the accident. The fatal accident occured near the Cashion school when Coffey stopped for a brief conversation with his wife after he had started to Wichita Falls.

Coffey had started to Wichita Falls for a load of kerosene and his wife Noted had gone after him to tell him of an emergency order for gasoline that had been phoned in to Burkburnett. #### PUBLIC MARKET

Burkburnett ought to do one of two things-either forbid the sales of products on the streets, such as fruits, vegetables and other farm products, or establish a centralized and controlled market for the peddlers. One of the unfairest things that can possibly be allowed is to permit the persons to come into our city and compete with local merchants on a basis that is entirely unfair to the local business man.

In addition to that it adds another inconvenient problem to already overcrowded streets of the city, although ordinance forbids parking in fire zone. Of course Burk has every sympathy for the farmer and trucker that brings in fruit and vegetables to sell here. However, we have noticed that most of the products are sold by persons not even remotely connected with our trade

In the sale of food in store, the conditions of health and sanitation, are strictly regulated by government ordinance. That is just. The occupation tax is applied to the same people. On the other hand without either health certificate, sanitation regulation, the street salesmen are allowed to compete with our merchants for small fee of \$2.50 per six months.

So in order to protect our own farmer and the merchant at the same time, some official regulation of such markets-probably a centralized official market with strict regulations in every phase-should be established.





One of the chief causes of fires the firemen is accumulated trash and old paper in attics and closets. A clean building seldom burns. We hope that everyone will clean out all rubbish that has been piling up both indoors and outside. Another major cause of fires is

improper electric wiring and the use of defective electric equipment. All fires that start because of these conditions are preventable. The fire department has expressed its willingness to give suggestions on eliminating the electrical hazard to any citizen who wish to make their property more safe.

Heating appliances should also be one over before cold weather starts Many stoves and their flues deteriorate during the summer months. Then when they are put into operation they start fires. Have your heating system inspected before you start it up this winter.

The firemen will be glad to make an inspection of any building for fire hazards. They are naturally fitted to detect dangerous conditions and to isuggest remedies, because prevent-ing fire is one of their duties just as much as fighting fires.
