City Manager Ross Reagan is completing the plans as authorized by the city council for application for a project totaling \$6,772.00 for the chairman of the committee. extension of the sewerage system in the South part of the city. Farmers Sign AAA Contracts Saturday

The farmers of the Burkburnett area signed the AAA contracts for the control of 1936-39 in Burkburnett Saturday and Monday. The contract signing was supervised by Buster Morgan. The new program is the result of a vote that was taken on a national scale last spring, and the farmers of the entire United States voted by huge majorities to continue the type of control through the next two or three years.

The farmers in this area that failed to make the contracts here last, week-end will be required to go to Wichita Falls for the papers. For the privilege of control bonus, the papers must be signed before Nov. 15. The indications from the first reports are that there will not be as many signers of the contracts as there have been in the past.

At the same time of the signing of the contracts an attack is being made before the supreme court of the United States on the processing tax by which the bonus is paid to the farmers. A tax of from 30 to 60 cents per bushel may be assessed to pay the expenses of the control program for the government.

For Filing Cotton

The farmers of this area have been marned by the authorities that Friof the certificates of cotton sales on cials for the extension of his service bales that were sold previous to Oct. 23. The limit on the report of sales has been set at seven days, and in order to qualify for payment under and many important features of the the cotton adjustment program, the farmers are allowed the week in which to file the certificate of sale with the county agent.

The county agent G. D. Everett will be ready to receive the certificates of sales any day in the future on all sales. Some of the farmers who have not been informed of the new ruling may lose the benefit under the adjustment if they do not file quickly enough.

For that reason the farmers have been asked to not delay, but to file report immediately. Further the Rexall Drug Store farmers are asked to keep track of the average price of the date of sale. It is on that basis that the adjustment will be made.

The blank forms for making the Burk Star reports are at the office of Mr. Unique Cafe Everett, and the adjustment will be made on the difference on the market price and 12c. The maximum benefit wil be 2c paid on the date of sale for the producers cotton.

Early Tax Payers

The state supreme court recently declared unconstitutional a law which offered a benefit of from one to three percent to the people and companies that paid taxes ahead of time. That was one of the most sen-be thinking out some means of folsible laws that we have ever seen a mutton headed legislature pass. That state body stumbled around and fit by the increased public interest, accidently allowed something really sensible to get by. Then only to factors by increased civic pride and have it declared null and void by the supreme court.

Every business enterprise speeds up collections by allowing a discount for those who pay early. The advantage of having cash on hand is a large one for any corporation or organization. Materials can be bought at an advantage for cash, and better bargains can be driven so a private company feels like allowing the discount for cash in advance.

We would rather see the who constitution re-written, but that is an impossible dream. However, if it is necessary an amendment ought to be passed along the lines of the law declared null and void. Since they have dismissed the penalties for late payment, and since very few people are being dispossessed for lack of tax payment, the man that pays ahead of time ought to get some advantage. If it is nothing else we ought to give him a button or

We once jokingly suggested lottery tickets with each payment. That is impractical, but the discount rate is not impractical. It ought to be put into force immediately-as soon as an amendment can be submitted to the people of Texas.

It is not often that we who live here would find it necessary to have a loafing place in the city, but many people would find such a center a Godsend. On Saturdays and many other days hundreds of persons come to Burk and during the winter would appreciate a community center where they could make appointments or wait while other members of the family were doing shopping. We noticed last Saturday some people waited two or three hours hours in cars.

The Star would like to suggest that from now to Christmas the Chamber of Commerce assist the merchants in providing such a place. There are a few vacant buildings down in town that would serve ideally for such a thing. A few chairs heat and a little light, would be about all that was needed.

There is nothing that we can think of that would create more goodwill for Burkburnett than such a project. The building could stay open Fridays and Saturdays from now 'till Christmas week and all


