BURKBURNETT LIBRARY

Before many days the people of Burkburnett will be asked to support the library for the second time. Last year the initial campaign for the institution brought a generous response from almost every person in the city.

There is one element of pride that seems justified. In the face of all the support that has been given libraries over the state for federal aid, it is remarkable to notice that so small a town as Burkburnett has remained independent of that type of aid.

The wide spread pleasure and educational service rendered by the library is shown in the annual report of the librarian. Starting with fewer than a thousand books, the library has loaned 18,000 books during the 12 month period.

During the summer time the school children will find the library valuable. The school library will be closed to them, and they will desire to read. Reading books will be infinitely more valuable than the reading of some of the cheap periodicals that can be purchased.

By that means the library becomes an institution of social service for the community. For every moment that a child is reading, his behavior is guaranteed, and the future of the child is influenced—probably for the better.

In addition to the new books the board has kept in service a large number of rebound books. The children's shelf has increased in volumes many times. Very popular selections for all ages have been bought for the children.

So when the library asks the support of the public, the public can gain by its own generosity.

PAN-AMERICAN ALLIANCE

There is one reaction to the Ethiopia-Italy struggle that came as a complete surprise to most of the statesmen of the world. The fact that the league of nations was unable to stop the conquest of a smaller nation by a larger and greedy nation offended the South and Central American countries.

This attitude represents a complete change during the past year. Even the most avowed enemies are speaking in friendly terms toward the United States in the South American countries.

The impotence of the league of nations in preventing Mussolini's conquest of Ethiopia has so completely discredited that organization that the Latin-Americans who have clung to the illusion as a means of protecting themselves are turning to America.

This failure of the league of nations may have a perpetual result that no one ever conceived. It staggers the imagination of the average statesman to think of the possibilities of a strongly united America. With the 21 nations of North and South America strongly allied, there is no power or group of powers in the world that would have the courage to start a scrap.

In addition to the protection in case of war, the advantages to business and scientific development are beyond comprehension. In a self-sustaining group with every variety of climate and product under the sun, these nations could and would become independent of the rest of the world.

Markets could be highly developed; and, to the vast improvement of the entire group, transportation and communications could be organized on a scientific basis.



Peeps at Politics

Negro Vote—The Southern candidates are not faced with the necessity of making a special appeal to the negro voters since Democratic nomination means election in most of these states. The rules of the party exclude the negro voters. For that reason the vote of the millions of negroes was generally considered republican in every campaign since the Civil War.

Change of Attitude—Veteran newspaper men have observed that there has been a change in the attitude of the negro the last two elections. In 23 Northern states the change has been very apparent. It was encouraging to the Demos when Mitchell said in his recent speech: "For more than 50 years my people have been almost solidly registered in the Republican party. It is only during the last 4 or 5 years that Negroes have found that the Democratic party is a safe place to live and vote."

Governor's Salary—Judge Williams of Dallas, withdrew from the governor's race. He stated that thousands were being spent to secure a \$4,000 job, and that he knew there must be some extra gain in the office on that basis.

Perpetual Graft—Anybody with as much sense as a grasshopper knows that the governors can't live on the \$4,000. They have to have other "sources of income," that is why I advocate the amendments of the constitution, providing the raise in the governor's salary. It might keep the state executive in a less tempting position.

Other Amendments—I promised to give my opinion on the amendments that would be voted on in last week's column. One of the most important is state owned and controlled liquor stores. The state should have voted on it at the start of repeal. Private enterprise has become entrenched, and the readjustment would be difficult.

Teacher Retirement—The teacher retirement and compensation for employees in the state is one of the most sensible proposals submitted. The law will make it possible for the teachers and the other workers to deposit against the future. The gain in case of teacher will be for the benefit of both state and the teachers.

Pardoning Power—One vote here. I have always been opposed to the governor's having the right to set aside the verdict of a court where a man has had a fair and just trial. In the first place the governor is usually incapable of deciding the merit of the case.

Maximum Representation—The small and weak are always jealous of the large and the great. But why disavow a democratic principle for selfish purposes. If more people live in the five big cities, they are the majority.

Katy Reports An Improved Business

The Katy is out of debt and is looking for continued improvement in business here and all through this territory, according to J. W. Butt, agent. The statement was based upon press dispatches from New York early this week saying Matthew S. Sloan, local chairman and president had handed a check for \$2,500,000 to representatives of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation in full payment of a loan made May 23 last year.

Mr. Sloan was quoted as saying the Katy's decision to liquidate, its note was based upon the company's sound financial condition. The fact that the Katy's revenues are up 30 per cent over last year and that prospects for further improvements had been reported from all over the company's stations.

The Katy has remained solvent all through the depression and has always met its interest charges when due" said Mr. Butt. "but last year had to borrow the \$2,500,000 to complete payment of its fixed charges. The loan was made for three years, but conditions have since improved so rapidly all through the Southwest that it was possible to pay off the loan two years before it was due."

Everyone connected with the Katy feels encouraged over the fact that we have come through the depression without any financial embarrassment, that the company is now out of debt and has a sufficient working capital in the treasury to enable us to carry on the extensive system-wide program of improvements and betterments which Mr. Sloan authorized last January."

News of the Week

Dr. F. E. Townsend has adopted the wrong plan of action for a man who is innocent of the charges that have made against him. It is always a good thing for an innocent man to give willingly and completely a full revelation of everything that he knows. He may be harmed temporarily, but eventually the facts will clear him. Any evasion or refusal to answer, especially before a congressional committee will indict him in the minds of many people who up to this time have thought him a victim of persecution.

English Scandal It is not often that the people of this nation secure the news of an English governmental scandal and the nation was shocked to hear of the resignation of J. H. Thomas, colonial secretary, and to note the faint whispers of the scandal about the resignation. The English do not let it be known when there is a scandal in their government. The nature of the case was simple. The colonial secretary was a member of the cabinet and his company sold insurance against a rise in taxes. The inside information proved very valuable to his firm.

Dum Dum Bullets Every war that starts or is fought brings out the charge by both sides that dum dum bullets had been used. Therefore, it was not surprising to hear the report by Italy that England had supplied the Ethiopians with the very deadly and destructive bullets. The bullets were generally supposed to be flattened on the nose so that they spread rapidly when entering the body of any victim, and the natural result is that they leave a gaping hole in the victim. Several years ago the nations outlawed the use of the method in war.

Gibraltar Strengthened The English are taking no

chances about the possibility of a future war in the Mediterranean sea. Since the start of the Ethiopian conflict, the British have steadily improved their fortifications at the strategic point of the gateway. Every half an hour day and night a ship passes through the narrow pass, and it carries more important commerce than any other two places in the world. Huge guns that can reach farther than any others in the world are protected in rock caves and yet are in position to control the entire ocean pass. In addition 10 Spanish air fields are in half hours flying distance of the pass on both sides of the famous point.

Atlantic Airway The successful flight of the Hindenburg has given impetus to the plans for an all American airway to the European countries. Lindbergh has made an official survey of the routes to be used. The routes will probably be by the Pan American, which already has successful routes throughout central and South America. The famed solo pilot will make recommendations as soon as he returns to America. The route will probably follow the "great circle" to the north, and it is probable that only heavier than air crafts will be used. This country is not yet sold on the idea of the huge gas bags.

Closer Alliance The conquest of Ethiopia by Italy has had one reaction that was not expected. The South and Central American countries have passed resolutions to cooperate with the United States rather than with the league of nations. In several of the countries the opinions were expressed that the American protection was stronger than the league of nations protection. The failure of the league to stop the conquest may force the American peoples into a very strong alliance of all North and South American countries. That would be the strongest alliance in the world.

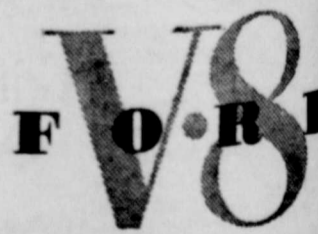

Oklahoma Couple Crash Into Burk Bridge Fri. Night

Two persons who gave their names as Mrs. Johonie Hall of Ryan and Jake Smart of Wau-

rika, Oklahoma, crashed the barriers of the Burkburnett bridge and crashed into the construction section 55 yards away last Friday night as they failed to negotiate the detour on the fashout.

In a statement to the officers, the man admitted driving the car which belonged to his wife; and the woman was admitted to the general hospital after receiving emergency treatment in this city. The Thomas ambulance carried the woman to the hospital.

The X-ray examination at the Wichita hospital indicated a fracture of the hip bone. Previously the woman had received a fracture in the same bone in another automobile accident.

The next morning he was given into the custody of Sheriff Lee Henderson and the county attorney, Floyd Jackson, of Walters, Oklahoma. The Oklahoma officials indicated that they would file charges of driving while intoxicated at the county seat. The charge is a felony in the state.

The automobile was traveling at a high rate of speed. It crashed through the barrier and splintered the heavy wood, leaped over a pile of crushed rock and sand, bounced from a pile of heavy 12 by 12 bridge timbers and angled onto the bridge sideways.

Most people viewing the wreck believed it impossible for the car

to carry as far as it did and fail to fall from the temporary structure on which it finally came to rest. The car was returned to Waurika for repairs.

citing story which shifts between London and Biarritz.

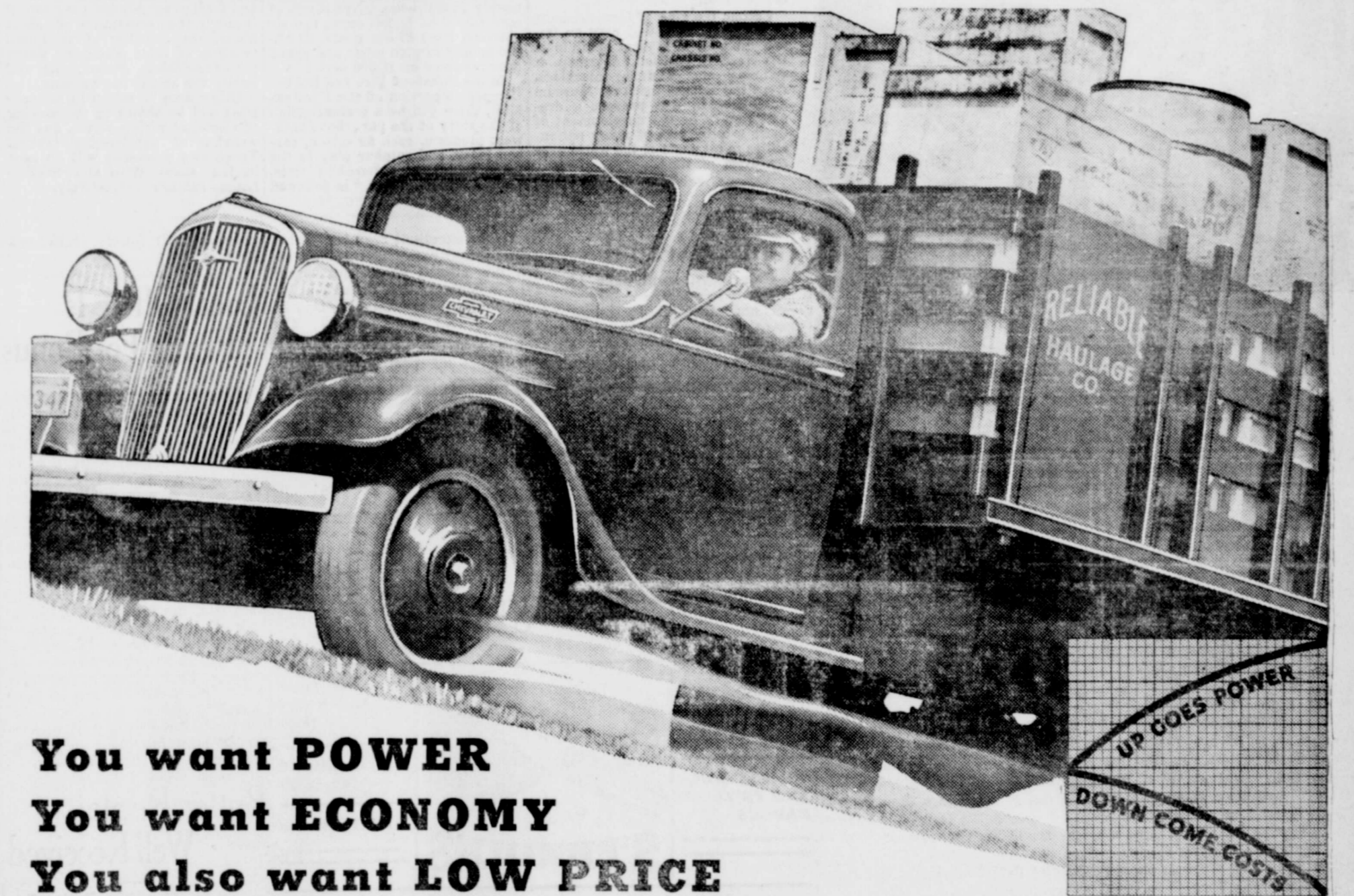

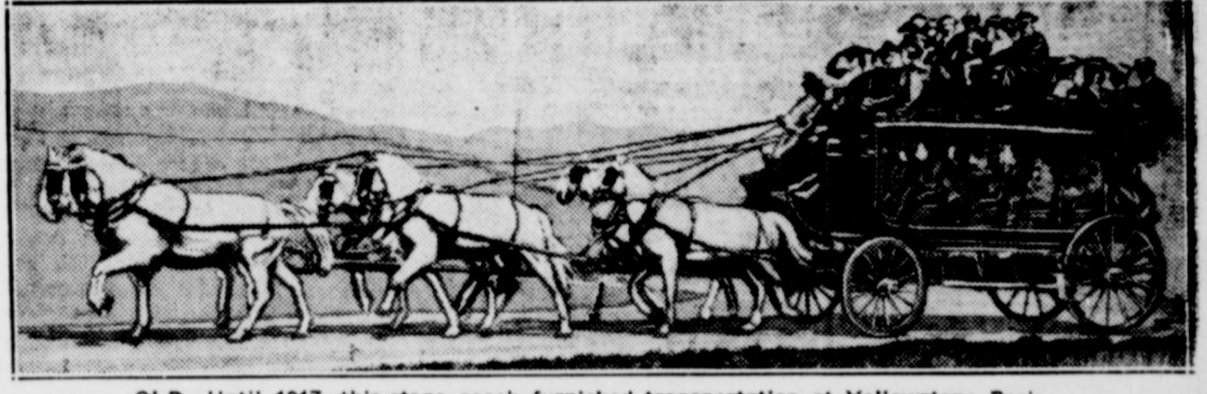

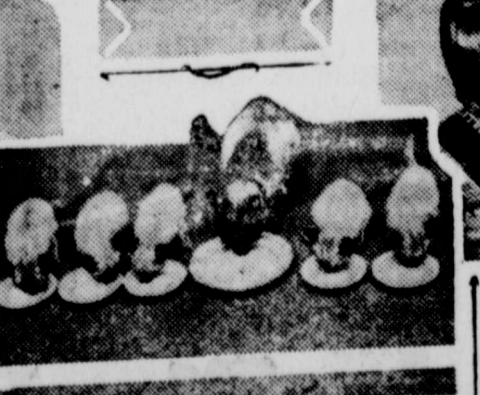

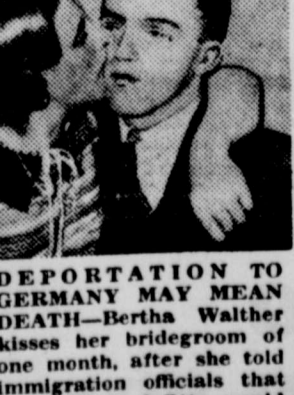
