Now is the time to start thinking about the party which we must give June

First of all, we hope that it is placed in the calendar of the chamber of commerce as one of themajor activities for the year. The banquet of that organization will be held in the near future, and the project ought to be emphasized

Then the idea should be adopted by the major organizations of the city. The schools, clubs and churches should start gathering material, plans, and ideas for such an occasion. The newspaper has already started gathering historical matrial and pictures for proper discussion of the period.

The celebration should be handled by a separate committee. This should be appointed from the combined clubs of the civic groups and start functioning immediately. Advertising, expenses, entertainment, invitations, and other incidentals should be arranged during the first few months of next year.

Burkburnett has not yet held any special celebration this year during the centennial. The city deferred its program for the other communities that were filling the program. But the 30th birthday ought to be a big occasion. It will be, if the people start now and work out the details. Let's get started.
