Clyde Man Gets Probated Term

BAIRD—Jerry Wayne Appleton, 35, of Rt. 1 Clyde was given a three-year, probated, prison term Thursday, following his guilty plea to felony theft charges before 42nd District Judge Don Lane.

Appleton had been indicted for burglary, but the indictment was dismissed and he pleaded guilty to the reduced charge of theft. Charges involved the theft of four guns from the Thomas Lee Butler home, also on Rt. 1, Clyde, earlier this

year. As one of the terms of his probation, Appleton was ordered to make restitution of \$150 for one of the guns which was not recovered.

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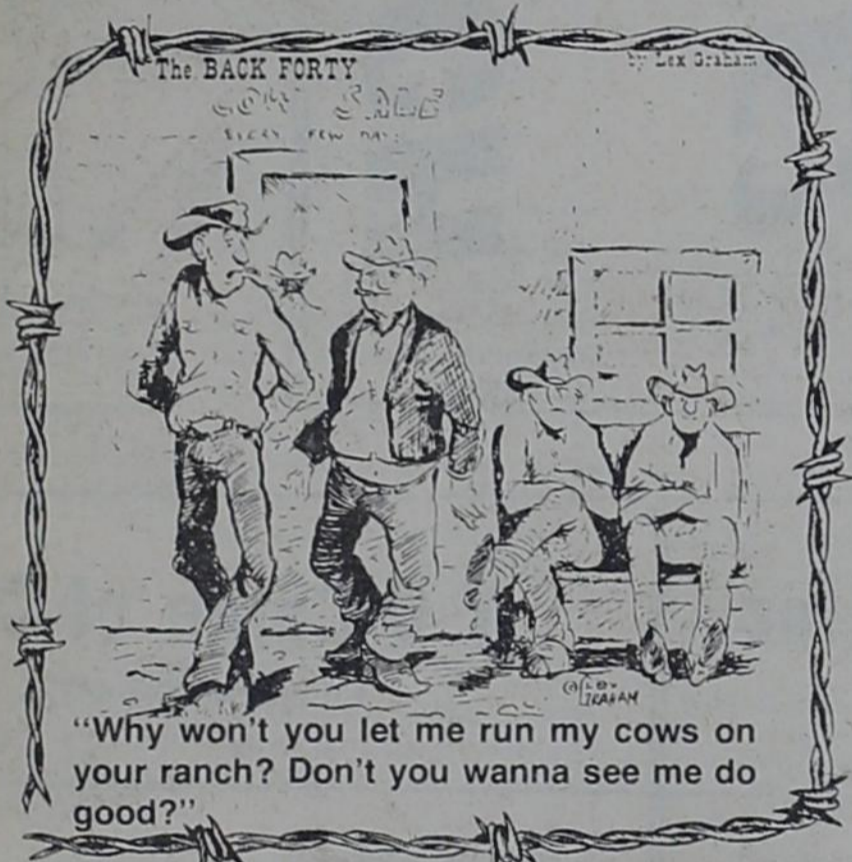
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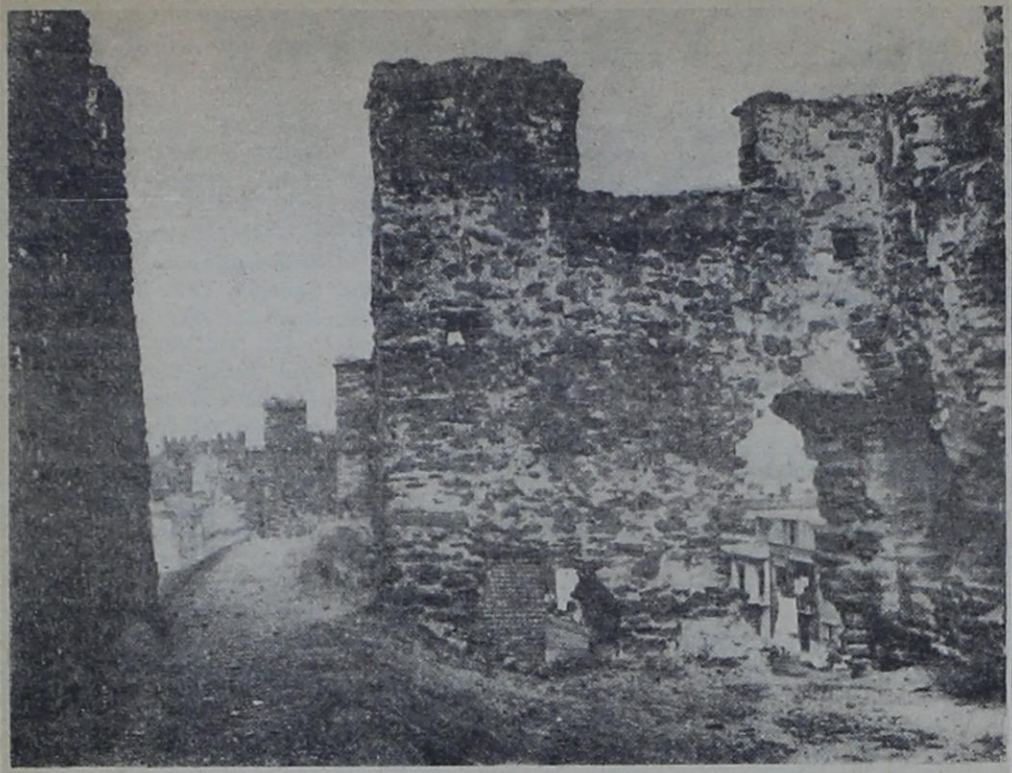
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"HOLY DAY" OR "HOLIDAY"
