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POULTRY

SHOULD BREED FOR HIGH-PRICED EGGS

Size as Well as Production Equally Important.

Since big eggs make for increased poultry farm income because of the emphasis placed on size in grading eggs, and since the ability to produce big eggs is heritable, poultrymen should breed for egg size as well as for production and other inherited traits.

The nearer the poultryman can come to produce pullet laying flocks which yield eggs of such size and quality as will command first-grade prices, the more profitable will be the egg farming enterprise.

In the practical application of such principles two methods are offered: First, if trapezoidal is being done, pullets which show 60 per cent or more of first-grade eggs, or eggs weighing 24 ounces or more to the dozen should be separately banded with a legband. Future breeders, other things being equal, are best chosen from that group.

Figures gathered on several hundred layers indicate that the addition of the 24-ounce-to-the-dozen minimum, or preferably the 26-ounce-to-the-dozen minimum, for hatching eggs will accomplish distinct improvement in the average egg size of the resultant pullet flocks.

Cites High Standards in Choosing Hatching Eggs

Selecting eggs for hatching according to a definite standard aids materially in improving the size, shape and color of eggs produced on the poultry farm, J. C. Taylor, associate extension poultryman at the New Jersey College of Agriculture, Rutgers university, tells egg producers.

The standard of egg selection for hatching suggested by Taylor is that no egg shall weigh less than 24 ounces to the dozen nor more than 28. "The size," he says, "should be uniform and the shape normal. Do not use eggs which are long, short, round or oddly shaped. The color should also be uniform—no cream colored or other tinted shells in the white eggs and the brown eggs should be of a shade most characteristic of the flock."

The care of eggs before they are placed in the incubator determines to some extent the success of the hatch. Collect the hatching eggs frequently, at least two or three times a day. Store the eggs in a clean, cool room or cellar where the temperature does not go above 55 or 60 degrees Fahrenheit. Be sure that all hatching eggs are turned once a day and do not hold eggs longer than 10 days before putting them in the incubator.

Raising Broiler Birds

The cross of Rhode Island Red hens and Barred Rock males is a popular broiler bird. It is said that they grow faster and are easier to raise than most pure breeds. Broilers are started on a chick starting ration and can be given hard grain after a short time or raised on an all mash feed. A special broiler ration gives well fleshed birds. The loss in dressing broilers ranges between 13 and 14 per cent.

**The President's Budget Message**  
 Tuesday, the President sent his Budget Message to the Congress, giving his views and recommendations regarding expenditures of this and next year. His Budget Message shows a net deficit for this year of \$2,248,000 and a surplus for 1938 of \$1,537,000,000, exclusive of any work relief appropriations.

The March income tax returns for this year show income taxes will produce \$267,200,000 less than the former estimate for this year. The receipts for the first nine months of this year indicate all other revenues \$337,000,000 less than the estimate made last year.

Information available indicates 1937 expenditures \$295,000,000 below estimates of last January, thus making the deficit for the fiscal year 1937 \$2,557,000,000 or an increase of \$309,000,000 over the January estimate. For the fiscal year 1938 it is believed the receipts will be \$387,600,000 less than anticipated last January, the reduction of \$410,000,000 in the estimates of income taxes being slightly off-set in increases of sales taxes. Thus we see the revised estimates of receipts and expenditures according to the President's message for the fiscal year 1938 indicate a net deficit of \$418,000,000, which includes estimates of expenditures of \$1,500,000,000 for work relief for the next fiscal year.

It will be remembered that the writer on February 18, 1936, while the tax bill for 1936 was pending, spoke on this subject and pointed out the loopholes in existing laws and called to the attention of Congress the necessity of eliminating loopholes in the tax laws, through which wealth was escaping more taxes than it was paying and pointed out the loopholes through which they were escaping. A recent press confer-

ence of the President indicates that he will recommend that these loopholes be eliminated. It is to be hoped this remedy will be carried out rather than the addition of further sales taxes, always suggested by the wealthy in order that they may escape taxes and further place the unfair tax burden, not based on income or ability to pay, but entirely upon consumption or a tax poverty.

**The Supreme Court Issue**  
 The President's Court proposal still continues to occupy the center of the stage. The Senate Judiciary Committee concluded its hearings on this bill Friday of last week. This measure will now be considered in executive sessions in the Senate Committee until it is reported to the Senate for its consideration.

The Labor Non-Partisan League held a series of joint discussions nation-wide last Monday evening, April 19th, at which time about 40 members of the Senate and the House and other speakers from throughout the nation spoke in many of the principal cities favoring the Court proposal. Congressman Wright Patman spoke at Houston, Texas; the writer spoke at Birmingham, Ala. A copy of this and other speeches made by the writer on this question are available upon request.

There has been a good deal of jockeying and bitter opposition to the Court proposal by the same enemies who have opposed the President and this administration during the past three elections. Their plan so far has been to block any hearing in the House Judiciary Committee until after the Senate Judiciary Committee had reported out and the Senate had passed upon this question.

The plutocracy feels, and justly so, that if they can block consideration in the House and can turn the heat on the Senate, that they will thus stand the best chances they have of defeating this legislation. They have used

ABILENE, April 29—J. C. Kellam acting director of the National Youth Administration of Texas, told the Texas Conference of Social Welfare here April 22 that the NYA is the American approach to the problems of grown-up youth.

After describing methods used in some European countries, he pointed out that the NYA is the outgrowth of a "middle-way" philosophy, one which rejects the ideas that the state should do nothing and that the state should do everything, and holds that the state has an obligation to guarantee a certain basic security and to maintain opportunities for its citizens.

"By giving young people equal opportunities to show their ability in education and vocational fields, plenty of room is given them for individual growth and improvement," Mr. Kellam asserted. "Qualities like self-reliance and initiative are not destroyed by an abundance of opportunities but rather by a lack of them. Nor are young people pampered by a system of social security which insures them against starvation. On the whole they do not wish merely to exist. They are ambitious and eager and energetic, with their hearts set on a definite goal."

Former Burk Man Killed In Auto-Train Collision

A. E. Hamilton, 41, Arlington druggist received fatal injuries when the auto in which he was riding was hit by a Texas and Pacific passenger train at the Center Street crossing in downtown Arlington at 7:37 a. m. Wednesday, April 21st. Mr. Hamilton was en route to the drug store located in the Cooper Hotel, operated by Mr. Hamilton and his brother, Tee.

According to Police Chief Cribb of Arlington, Hamilton was driving north and the train was traveling west toward Fort Worth. He was thrown out of his car by the crash. The impact hurled the auto about 25 feet onto the main line of the railroad. An eastbound passenger train, the crew of which was unaware of the accident,

crashed into the wrecked auto, which narrowly missed smashing the ambulance that took Mr. Hamilton to the hospital.

The injured man did not regain consciousness after the collision. Examination revealed fractures of his right arm and leg as well as internal injuries and a brain concussion.

Brief funeral services were held at 9 a. m. Sunday at the Hugh Moore Chapel in Arlington. The body then was taken to Wichita Falls where services were held at 2 p. m. at the First Baptist Church with Rev. Miles B. Hays, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Burkburnett, officiating.

Military services conducted at the grave by members of Pat Carrigan Post No. 120 and Oscar Frye Post No. 264. Mr. Hamilton who trained at Camp Bowie, was one of the first to go over the top in France.

Survivors are the widow, Mrs. Ethel Myers Hamilton; the parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. P. Hamilton of Burkburnett; two brothers, Tee of Arlington and B. M. of Burkburnett; two sisters, Mrs. P. A. Wheeler of Kilgore and Mrs. B. F. Gilchrist of Burkburnett.

Social Security To Be Basis Of Meeting May 6

More than 230 youths between the ages of 16 and 25 who are attending emergency classes conducted by the National Youth Administration, according to A. Ziegler, NYA Assistant Supervisor.

Instruction is given in typing, English, spelling, writing, home-making, music, art, vocational agriculture and physical education. Emphasis is offered to those who are furthering their education as well as those who for some reason did not have the opportunity to re-school.

It is stated that youths benefited from attending these classes in NYA County Ad-

visory Boards, County Officials, and County Welfare Workers, as well as by this office because the need for this training is so apparent. Youths employed on NYA work projects work about one-third of their times and they can attend these classes without interference with their work. The education and job-training phases of the program of the National Youth Administration is being given more thought and attention and it is planned to enlarge on these activities.

## EMERGENCY REMEDIES

When an individual becomes seriously ill, it is necessary that desperate efforts, sometimes efforts calling for courage and rare intelligence, be undertaken to attempt to offset the ravages of the disease. We of Burkburnett this week have witnessed the ravages of land which is subject to the most destructive of all soil diseases—erosion.

A blinding sandstorm swept down Friday afternoon that came near being the worst that has been recorded in this community. The origin of the dust was uncertain, but it came from what is classified as the dust bowl.

Like a cancer eating away the life of an individual, erosion is sweeping across the midwest, eating the life out of the soil that was at one time the rich prairie land of the nation.

Cancer calls for the application of the desperate remedy of surgery, radium, or x-ray. But only in such processes can it be halted.

Erosion control must call for just such a type of remedy. Temporary relief is necessary. Feeding the starved farmers and their families is only a temporary opiate in the emergency of the suffering. Costly and radical methods must be attempted to save the land. No one thinks of tomorrow when grinding the last ounce of productive power from the soil, and the result is exhaustion and chaos for the farmer who was short sighted.

But that history will not help in the cure. Now is the time for the nation to cooperate in saving a valuable natural asset.

## BLUEBONNETS WILL GROW HERE

With proper care the state flower, the Bluebonnet, will grow profusely in Burkburnett. This has been illustrated in the gardens of Mrs. W. R. Hill and Mrs. D. A. Westbrook and others. These two gardens particularly have lovely beds of the glorious blooms, and this week there are masses of the small flowers. The luck that these gardeners and other gardeners of Burkburnett have had illustrates the possibilities in proper planting and care. Two years ago, before the centennial celebration, the Star advocated more widespread planting of the flowers.

We would like to see Burkburnett become famous for its interest in the state bloom. There are many other beautiful additions to the garden interests here, and the garden clubs have done some remarkable work. However, we have a weakness for Bluebonnets.

## DEEP OIL DRILLING

The enthusiasm that was recently created by the appointment of a committee for the investigation of the possibilities of drilling deeper for oil in this territory must be kept. The committee has investigated several possibilities including specific propositions that have been made by individuals and companies for the exploration of lower levels in the district.

This committee should be assured the cooperation of the business men of the city in some definite plan that could bring about exploration either by local citizens or by foreign companies. So far as the final affect is concerned, it does not matter who does the drilling in Burkburnett. The only thing that is demanded is that the process be attempted.

## THE BIRD MAN

When Clem Sohn, "The Bird Man", fell 600 feet to his death in Vincennes, France, last Sunday, he was attempting to do what every normal person has hoped to do some time during his life. Stepping from the wings of a plane 10,000 feet in the air, the dare devil swooped gracefully toward the earth, soaring on artificial wings. Suddenly the wings gave way, and the man crashed to his death.

The stunt had been repeated many times in the United States and in Europe. As he approached the earth each time after the thrilling descent, the stunter would release a parachute and light before the amazed crowd.

As old as the race itself is the urge to fly. The birds have been the objective of envy of every man that has the slightest imagination. Icarus, of the Grecian mythology, tried his waxen wings that were melted by the angry sun god. Since then many famous men of history and literature have attempted to soar above the earth defying the natural laws that made them earth-bound.

The rapid development of aviation has been the result of the age old desire. Still cumbersome machinery is necessary for the flights which carry man across the skies like at speeds which should induce envy in the hearts of the birds.

So in this conquest of the air man has not yet achieved that complete freedom that his heart desires. For that reason the apparently effortless flight of Sohn captured the imagination of thousands of people, and pointed the way toward escape from the bonds of reason and logic.

Still deep in his heart every man cherishes the desire to fly effortlessly and easily. Icarus symbolizes a dream of the race. Sohn attempted to make it real.

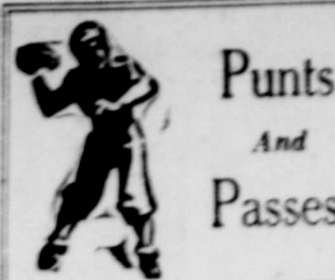

## Punts And Passes

Being a Center on the Bulldog team seems to be a hard job for the local boys. Last week we recorded the fall of the first string pivot man, Dorace Hageman. Hageman was injured slightly in the most prosaic way possible. Then Pete Grace the substitute number one on the squad went riding with a bunch of boys last Sunday afternoon and was injured slightly when the car swerved from the gravel road. It seems that Coach Hill will have to keep a ready supply of centers handy if this sort of thing keeps up.

Since We Started talking about center, it might be well to mention that Burkburnett has had some very good and very bad pivot men. Few fans realize the importance of the position. The spot is the most important position in the line. The center must handle the ball accurately and cleverly. He is responsible for the smooth working of the team as much as any other player. After he has tossed the ball to the back, his work has just started. Like any other lineman, he has an assignment to carry out in the way of blocking.

There Was Weeping and wailing in the Bulldog camp last year when the season started. The center position looked like the weakest on the team. To make the outlook more dismal, Hageman was flanked by two inexperienced guards, Elliot and Whittin. However, before the season ended that spot was plenty tough. So far as I can recall, the middle of the line justified the recognition that it received.

There Are Many theories about the proper way for a center to play. There are as many theories as there are coaches, and sometimes each coach has several pet ideas all his own. I remember a famous center on an excellent team in the southwest conference a few years ago that violated every rule about defensive play. His coach benched him several times, and finally gave up hope of reforming his erratic tendencies. That player had what few athletes have, a sense of diagnosis that made it possible for him to violate rules and still be a valuable man. He would have looked mighty silly had his judgement been wrong very often. Most athletes are merely mechanical machines, and must strive to perfect the routine ability. There is an occasional "Dizzy Dean". The rest of the mere mortals must be content to doing things the orthodox manner.

This Art Of Playing a good center position can mean more to the team than anything else. That means that Hageman and his subs have one of the hardest jobs on the squad. It means further that they will have to work a little harder than the average player to be valuable to a team. But the crowd on the whole doesn't know that his judgement as to where to throw it means a lot more than is apparent from the side lines. The center does not throw the ball at the back, rather he throws it where he knows that the backfield man ought to be a few seconds later. If that back fails to get there, the center is often blamed by the crowd. Furthermore the ball has to be tossed differently for each type of play. Deception and elusiveness of the backfield man often depends on how he receives the ball. The timing, height, speed and accuracy of the ball must be just right. On quick kicks, or on well plan-

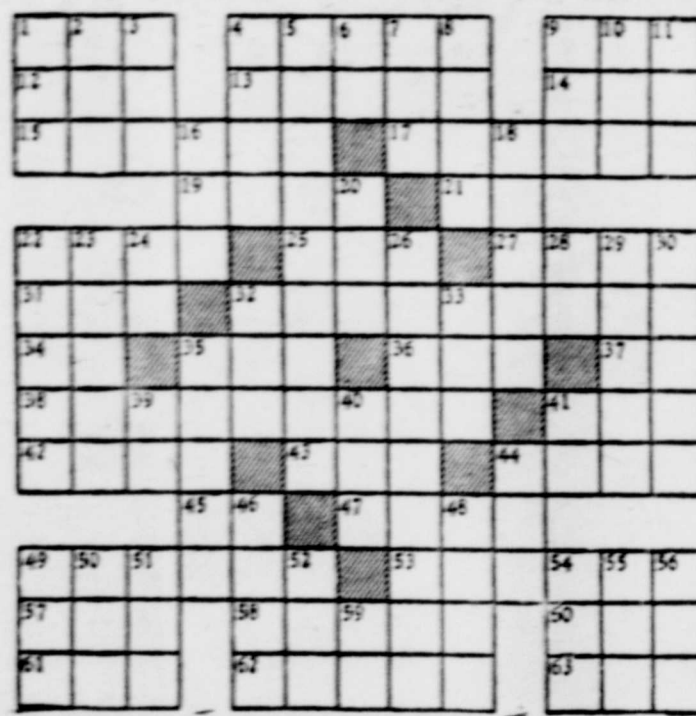

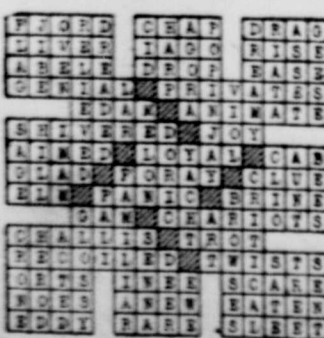
