## Indian Marching Band earns first division

It is five years and counting. The Haskell Indian Band turned in its fifth consecutive first division

performance at the UIL marching competition held October 20, at Memorial Stadium in Wichita Falls.

The band is under the

direction of Mike Aston, now in his seventh year with the school district. He is assisted by Teresa New. The 53 member band performed

four contemporary pieces. The first is "I Don't Want to Stop" followed by "On the Floor." The third song, "El Caribe" features the

percussion section. The performance concludes with "We Found Love."

The competition included fourteen Class A bands.

Aston gives credit for the positive results, to the students willingness to work hard, including giving up several days of their summer. They practice, not only during the school day, but also at least one evening a week until contest. Aston says, "If they did not commit to this kind of work ethic, then the results would be quite different."

This year's Indian band includes ten seniors, which have been a part of the band since starting sixth grade.

High school bands, according to their classification, advance on an alternating basis. Class A does not advance this year.

## Early voting ends Fri., Nov. 2

In a few short weeks, registered voters will be going to the polls to cast their votes in the general election scheduled for Tuesday, November 6.

Early voting began Monday, October 22 and continues through Friday, November 2. A request for a ballot by mail must be received, not postmarked, by October 30.

Topping the ballot is the presidential race. Republican Mitt Romney and his vice presidential nominee Paul Ryan are going head to head against democratic opponents President Barack Obama and Joe Biden. Candidates for the Libertarian Party and Green Party are also on the ballot.

Texans will elect a U.S. Senator and all 36 United States Representatives. Vying for the senate seat of retiring Senator Kay Bailey Hutchinson is democrat Paul Sadler and republican Ted Cruz. They are joined by John Myers of the Libertarian Party and Green Party candidate David Collins.

Current representative for district 19, Randy Neugebauer will represent the republican party, with no challenger on the democratic side.

Several Justice, Supreme Court places, Court of Criminal Appeals judges, Railroad Commissioners and State Board of Education positions will be decided.

For district 28, State Senator Robert Duncan is the republican representative, with no democratic candidate challenging. The state representative for district 68 seat is being sought by republican Drew Springer. Rick Hardcastle chose not to run for reelection.

On a more local level, there are several unopposed county positions on the ballot.

The contested races in Haskell County include Precinct 1 Commissioner. Democratic incumbent Johnny Scoggins is being challenged by former commissioner and republican Billy Wayne Hester.

Hoping to serve as Haskell County Sheriff is Sheriff's Deputy Winston Stephens and write-in candidate Gregg Hearn.

Early voting will be at the Haskell County Courthouse.

On election day, voting locations are: Box 1, St. George's Catholic Church; Box 2 Assembly of God Church; Box 3, Extension

building; Box 4, Experienced Citizens Center; Box 5, Rule High School Library; Box 6, Rochester Fire Department; Box 7, O'Brien City Hall; Box 8, Weinert School; Box 9, Paint Creek School Library Main Building; and Box 10, Sagerton Community Center.

Not only is voting an opportunity to have your voice heard, but it is also the duty of all Americans. Be informed and go vote.

Doug and Frances Parker's revealing of their connection to the famous Quanah Parker was a highlight of the day for many, and a good preview to the artifact exhibit and explanations presented by Eryv McGreger.

All present left with a better understanding of the different kinds of points and tools made and used by Texas

Plains Indians.

Over eighty guests attended the program with punch and cookies being served afterward.

There is one more reason to connect Knox County to Indian times, the water of Knox County. Yes, the water of Knox County. In his book, The Springs of Texas, Gunnar Brune gave over three pages to Knox County springs, many of which he noted as

having had signs of Indian usage.

Some of the springs are of good water, some are salty or gypsy, or both. But, any water may have tasted good if twenty or more rangers, settlers, or even soldiers were on your trail as you urged your horse toward the far safety of the Caprock, which Cross Timber horses of settlers might be unable to reach.

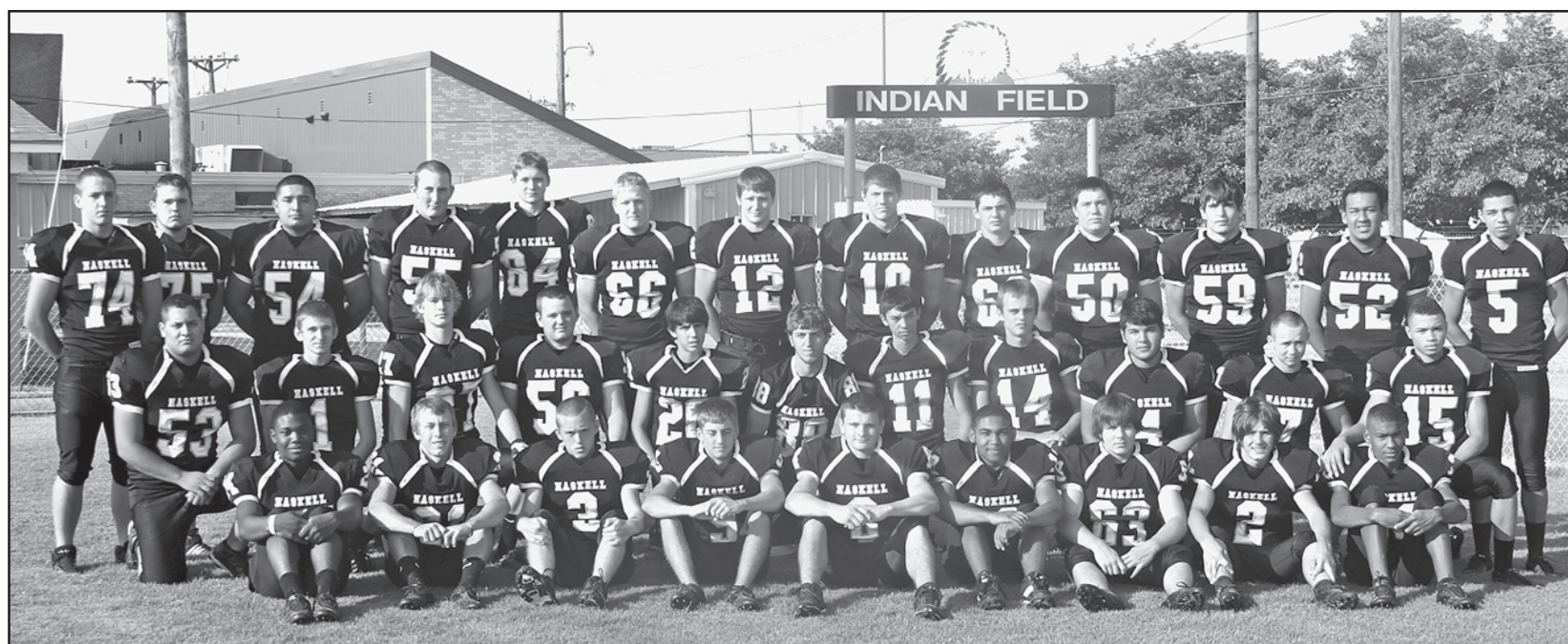

## Harsh styling can be a brush with disaster for hair and scalp

Dermatologists at UT Southwestern Medical Center warn that certain hairstyles can wreak havoc on your hair as well as your scalp.

"Pulling hair into tight ponytails or braids; using hot rollers, curling irons, or straightening irons; and applying chemical relaxers can all lead to structural damage of the hair shaft as well as thermal and chemical damage to the skin of the scalp," says Dr. Josephine Quintanilla-Dieck, a UT Southwestern dermatologist.

Regular and sometimes even occasional use of these hair techniques may lead to hair breakage and hair loss from the root. Although usually reversible, hair loss occasionally can be permanent with longstanding or severe cases.

Tips for healthy scalp and hair include:

- Regular washing to eliminate dirt and oil buildup.
- Minimizing the use of heated devices and chemical relaxers.

•Using natural hairstyles that put less tension on the root of the hair.

If you do use chemical relaxers or heating devices, you can reduce the risk of damage by using them infrequently or incorporating "hair holidays"—styling-free days that allow for natural recovery.

Because there are many causes of hair loss, if you have already experienced some hair loss but are unsure of its cause, it is best to seek evaluation by a dermatologist familiar with hair-loss diseases.

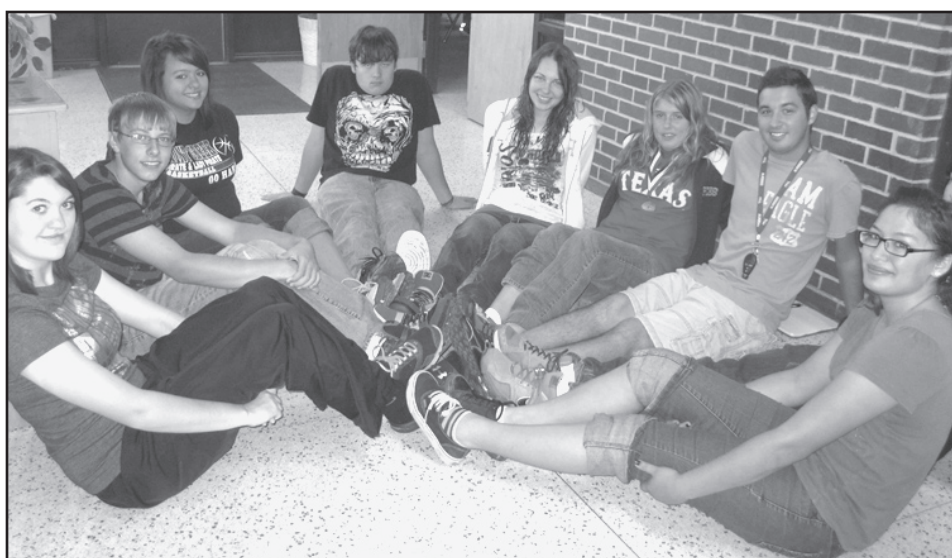

# October sales tax receipts distributed to area cities

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs has announced that state sales tax revenue in September was \$1.96 billion, up 11.6 percent compared to September 2011.

“Continued strength in the manufacturing and oil and natural gas sectors led to the sales tax revenue increase,” Combs said. “Collections were also boosted by improvement in consumer spending at restaurants and retail stores. State sales tax revenue has now increased for 30 straight months.”

Combs sent October local sales tax allocations totaling \$551 million to cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts. October local sales tax allocations are up 9.1 percent compared to October 2011.

The sales tax figures represent monthly sales made in August.

Haskell County had a 1.78 percent increase for October 2012 of \$40,385.44 in comparison to \$39,678.40 for October 2011. 2012 payments to date of \$427,962.07 reflect a 5.47 percent increase over 2011 payments to date of \$405,765.84.

The City of Haskell had a 4.10 percent increase for October 2012 of \$36,937.53 in comparison to \$35,481.22 for October 2011. 2012 payments to date of \$397,898.85 reflect an 8.60 percent increase over 2011 payments to date of \$366,378.76.

The City of O’Brien had a 56.93 percent increase for October 2012 of \$314.55 in comparison to \$200.43 for October 2011. 2012 payments to date of \$2,283.87 reflect a 9.76 percent decrease over 2011 payments to date of \$2,530.98.

The City of Rochester had a 78.69 percent decrease for

October 2012 of \$199.73 in comparison to \$937.28 for October 2011. 2012 payments to date of \$4,597.60 reflect a 20.25 percent decrease over 2011 payments to date of \$5,765.07.

The City of Rule had a 4.82 percent decrease for October 2012 of \$2,718.37 in comparison to \$2,856.08 for October 2011. 2012 payments to date of \$20,961.31 reflect a 27.26 percent decrease over 2011 payments to date of \$28,818.93.

The City of Weinert had a 5.83 percent increase for October 2012 of \$215.26 in comparison to \$203.39 for

October 2011. 2012 payments to date of \$2,220.44 reflect a 2.27 percent decrease over 2011 payments to date of \$2,272.10.

"The IRS gets many reports of fake websites like this," said Clay Sanford, a Dallas IRS spokesman. "Criminals use these sites to lure people into providing personal and financial information that may be used to steal the victim's money or identity."

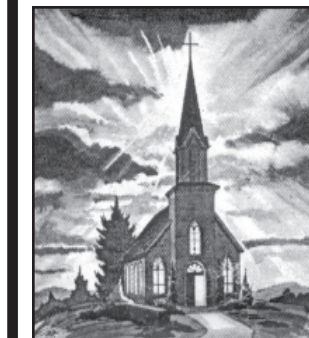
The address of the official IRS website is [www.irs.gov](http://www.irs.gov). Don't be misled by sites

claiming to be the IRS but ending in .com, .net, .org or other designations instead of .gov. If you find a suspicious website that claims to be the IRS, send the site's URL by email to [phishing@irs.gov](mailto:phishing@irs.gov). Use the subject line, 'Suspicious website.'

Be aware that the IRS does not initiate contact with taxpayers by email to request personal or financial information. This includes any type of electronic communication, such as text messages and social media channels.

Sheriff David Halliburton reported that a dispatcher has given their two week's notice, and that there will be an opening for a late night shift dispatcher.

No change was made in the burn ban.

A motion to renew the contract lease with the Texas Parks and Wildlife for storing a boat at Scott Memorial Park at Lake Stamford for one year and renew the contract lease yearly was approved.

The County holidays for 2013, including Dec. 24-26 for Christmas, were approved.
