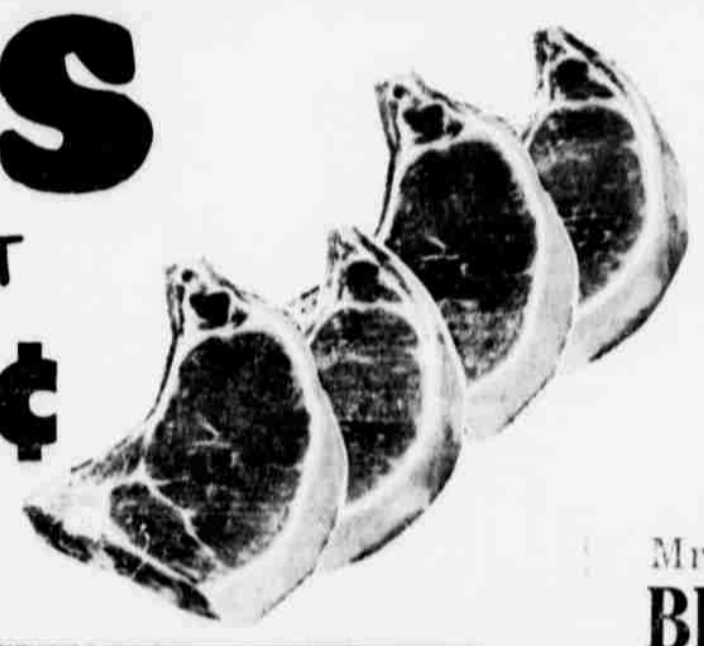

The Good Earth

H. T. Wilkinson, one of elementary school teachers instilling the love of "the earth" in her pupils.

The nature loving young-uns have planted various seed varieties. The children derived many days of pleasure and many hours of instruction by watching the miracle of sprouting, growing seed.

Wilkinson also has several window plants growing in the Boat, or as some call it, a Boat, is extremely interesting to the children. Canoe shaped around the tiny white



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flower. Bracts and underside of the leaves are dark purple. The upper side of the leaves is a luxuriant dark green. Rhoecol discolor is the botanical name for Moses-in-the-Boat.

Mrs. Wilkinson's mother, Mrs. C. T. Jones, gave me one of these interesting plants.

Propagation is by cuttings taken any time, but preferably in the spring. Seeds can also be planted. These should be sown in any good potting soil. Here again, spring is the best time to plant Moses-in-the-Boat seed. The best temperature for seedlings is 70-75 degrees.

Rhoecol discolor thrives in a terrarium. They are natives of the West Indies and Mexico. There is another variety called Rhoecol discolor Vittata. Each leaf of this flower is striped lengthwise on the upper side with pale yellow. It, too, makes boat like bracts.

Mrs. Wilkinson has her pupils paint pictures of the vegetables they plant. It is amazing what such young ones can do. The pictures they paint are realistic.

We should thank our teachers for the good job they are doing in educating our children. So many youngsters in cities and towns know nothing of growing things unless they learn at school.

My daughter, Yvonne Gaskins, who lived in an apartment up north, had a window box planted with different seed so her children could learn the miracle of growth.

Haskell Garden Club members: Do not forget to visit your garden for dried materials before frost comes and weakens stems. Take a trip to the lake or explore a pasture. They each hold a treasure of dried material used in arrangements

Consumers often ask why bonded fabrics separate. The type of manufacturing process determines the longevity of the bond. There are three types of laminating methods used in making bonded fabrics.

(1) Adhesives glue the fabrics together. This is the least expensive process and the least successful as the glue is easily dissolved by solvents used in a dry-cleaning process.

(2) Heat setting is polyurethane foam between two fabrics, is more expensive but lasts longer since it is not destroyed by dry-cleaning solvents. This middle layer, however, is so thin that it is difficult to distinguish it from an adhesive.

(3) Locklined fabrics are made of low layers connected during the weaving process. This is rarely found in clothing because of the expense of the construction process.

Mrs. Elliott suggests that consumers buy bonded fabrics carefully and look for the guarantee of permanent bonding on the fabrics.

59 Crashes; 3 Killed; 30 Injured In Haskell County Past 9 Months

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated three accidents on rural highways in Haskell county during the month of

September, according to Sgt. Frank Jirek, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$500.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county from January through September of 1965 shows a total of 59 crashes. As a result of these, there were three persons killed and thirty persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$47,465.00.

a little beyond its expected capacity."

The project entailed the installation of 21 air conditioning units in each room of the local elementary school. The cost of the project was \$2500.00. That sum has been defrayed by public contributions and the sponsorship of annual fall carnivals for three successive years.

This year's carnival receipts totaled approximately \$773.00. The sum of \$117.00 was collected in advance contributions to pay for food sold in the cafeteria, which amount is being held in abeyance to offset any expense incurred. The balance of the air conditioning project was \$655.00, the payment of which left a residue of funds which will be transferred to the PTA general fund pending the adoption of a new project at the will of the association.

The elementary teachers, as

well as many pupils, have time and again expressed their appreciation of the air conditioning, which has, according to one teacher, "delightfully cooled the rooms in such a way that the educative process has benefited greatly. The students and the teachers feel better during the hot months, and are therefore, better able to do their work. It is a benefit which is absolutely beyond question."

The Stamford Elementary School PTA adopted the plan augmented in Haskell, even to using the same type of air conditioners. Their project has also been brought to a successful conclusion.

Rev. Finch paid special compliment to Mrs. Hess Hartsfield for her work in the project. Mrs. Hartsfield was treasurer of the PTA when the project began, and consented to serve an extra term in order to administer the affairs of the project. "She did a superb job, and deserves the commendation of every interested citizen," Rev. Finch said.

Aspermont Bank Will Act As The Depository SBDC

First National Bank of Aspermont will act as depository for the Aspermont Small Business Development Center. Local banks will be able to participate in the loans from 10 to 100 per cent. They will be protected by a government guarantee.

Dedication for the newly approved Small Business Development Center was held Wednesday afternoon at Aspermont with ribbon-cutting ceremonies.

Aspermont Small Business Development Center, the first such office approved for Texas and the first rural project in the nation, received a grant of \$25,800 from the Office of Economic Opportunity.

The grant went to the Small Business Development Corp., of Aspermont, headed by Alton Willingham of Paducah, Williamson, in cooperation with Stoneham County Chamber of Commerce, organized the development center to serve a 15-county area.

The center will approve loans up to \$25,000 to private or small businesses, with an interest rate of between 4 and 5 1/2 per cent.

Although the national average on such loans is \$8,000, the Aspermont center will be authorized to loan up to \$25,000.

Counties to be served from the center are Childress, Cottle, Dickens, Foard, Fisher, Hardeman, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Hall, King, Knox, Stonewall, Motley and Briscoe.

Three board members from each county will screen applicants from their own county before the loans are presented to the entire board. The three board members for Haskell County are Clyde Grice, Jetty V. Clare and Jim Alvis.

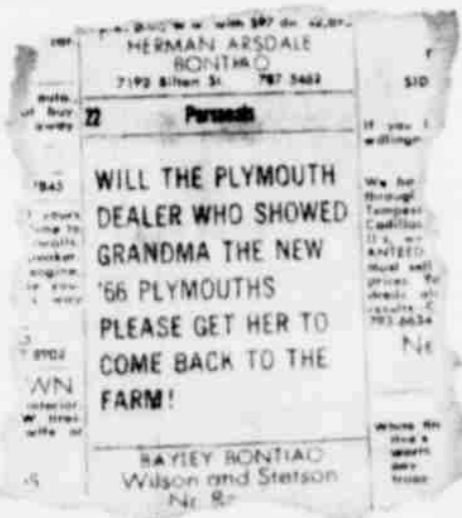
