## FRENCH REVOLUTION

France is the next natural objective of the movement toward domination by either extreme of communism or of nazism. The French people are tempermentally fitted for this type of government. It has worked before during the early revolution regimes and during the Napoleonic period. The impetuous and fiery tempered Frenchman is easily swayed by political prejudice and hatreds. Therefore they become naturally the unreasoning adherents to any politi-

In France today the set-up is ready for one or the other of the two extremes of government. The communists are in nominal control of the government. They have dominated the political policies of the nation for several months, and their sympathy for the Spanish government is indicative of the political sympathies of the nation.

Students of current events remember that the prelude of 312 Ave. C the Nazi victory in Germany and the Facisti victory or coup in Italy was social and political chaos characterized by the communist control or threat of control.

That situation is paralleled in France today. Strikes, financial crises, government scandal, and other similar social phenomenon that accompanied the pre-dictator period in Germany and Italy. Such uncertainty causes disturbances of political loyalties and creates a saddle in which dictators ride into power.

The state police director named Capt. Homer Garrison, Jr., assistant safety director and veteran police training instructor, as supervisor of the school. Twenty-six outstanding crime detection specialists from Texas, other states, and federal bureaus have been chosen as

"We have obtained the services of the best instructors available to give peace officers of Texas an opportunity to become versed in scientific and modern methods of enforcement," Col. Carmichael said. "Science is playing an important part in the apprehension and conviction of modern crimi-
