## LONG STAPIE

 IN HASKEIL CO.Last spring Mr. F. G. AlexanLast spring Mr. F. G. Alexan-
der gave Mr. G. W. Bedford of this city about a dozen seed of long staple cotton.
Mr. Bedford planted the seed and got some stalks of the cotton. This cotton fruited well and Mr. Bedford gathered about two pounds of the cotton. He will save the seed for planting. We examined a boll of the cotton and found that the lint was one and a half inches long. Mr. Alexander says this cotton is worth 26 cents per pound. The experiment of Mr. Bedford seems to demonstrate that long staple cotton may be successfully grown in Haskell Haskell county.
