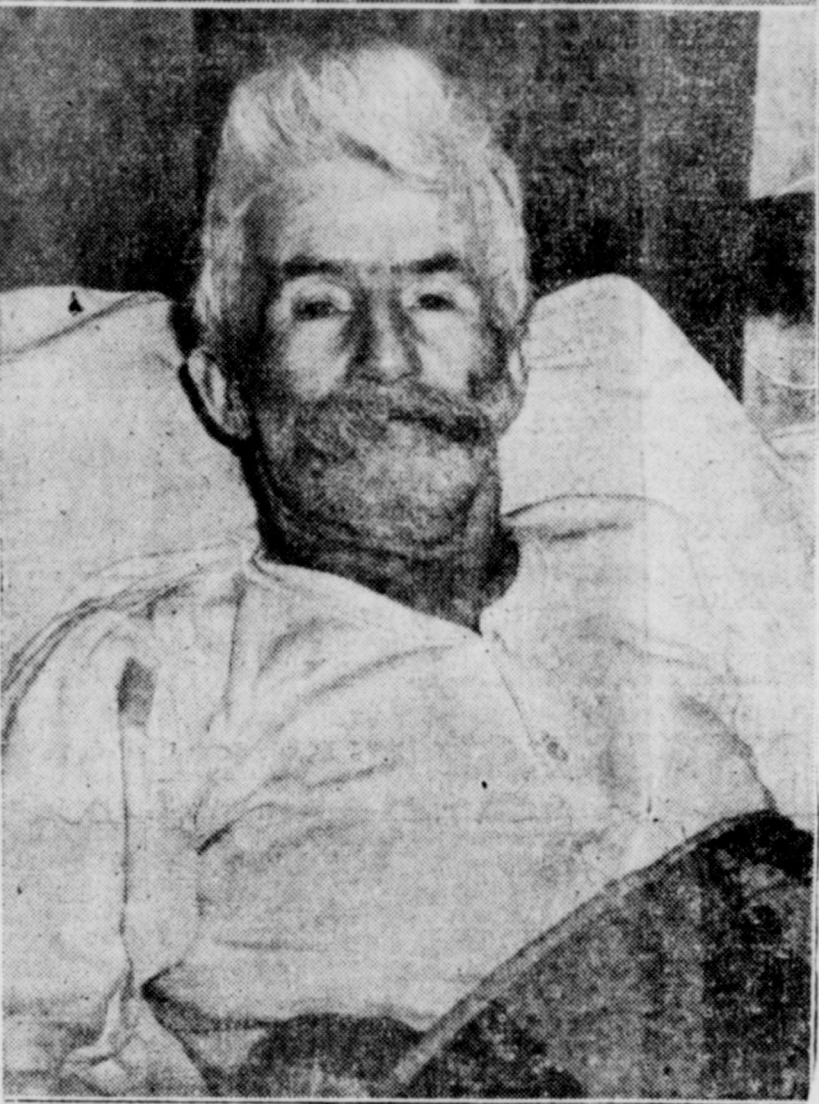

The Chamber of Commerce will again offer shrubs and flowers to people of Burkburnett at wholesale prices.

The plants have been ordered from a Texas nursery and will be here in a week, provided that weather conditions are favorable for shipping. They will be bedded down as soon as they are received and the public will be notified of their arrival.

Better Outlook In Industry Occasions Change In The Price

Bell Oil and Gas officials announced late Thursday that beginning Friday, February 10, they will pay 97c for 41 gravity oil, which is an approximate increase of 6 cents over the present rates.

J. I. Dyer, manager of the Crude Oil Department is quoted as saying: "Due to improvement in local demand for refined oils, it is with considerable gratification that the Bell Oil & Gas company posts these raises in the price it will pay for its crude oil. It is hoped that still further improvement in the refined oil markets will soon occur in order to permit additional raises in crude oil prices."

Their new schedule of prices is based on the use of 100 per cent tank tables for computing volume, deduction of all B. S. & W., and correction for temperature when the oil is above or below 60 degrees. This method of computation is in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Railroad Commission of Texas.

Scouting has succeeded in becoming a part of the American boy's world because it is a program of action plus idealism. So it has a two-fold appeal, demonstrated by its growth in popularity each year, in many sections limited only by the lack of leaders or adequate funds of extension. Measured in terms of boys who want to be Scouts there is still much room for growth. Measured in terms of results produced the Boy Scouts of America has already paid any debt due the American people for the operating charter granted it by Congress many years ago.

In our own community now there are many men, part of the 8,400,000 who have been included in the Scout family since 1910, who believe in the principle that "Once a Scout, always a Scout" and who are doing their best to extend and interpret in practice the concept of civic and moral responsibility that came to them in their Scout Troops. For this reason, if for no other, America has every right to be proud of its Boy Scouts.
