To be sure, he was turned loose as soon as he reached Spain, but the chagrin and disappointment of it broke his heart. Columbus had accomplished one of the most amazing and courageous feats in history. And yet what did he get out of it? He had expected to make a fortune, and he died a pauper. He had been promised the title of "Admiral of the Ocean and Viceroy of India.

Yet he got no title whatever. The continent that he discovered was not even named for him. It was named for the maker of maps, Amerigo Vespucci.

However, Columbus has received one "break." He is given credit for being the first man to discover America, when he wasn't at all.
